Miss Floyd expects to fly home for a visit in September, and hopes to be able to thank all those who

were so kind and interested in her case, although as she writes home, she would like to just forget all about the accident. There are lots worse things she sees everyday.

Ann is a graduate of the Clarkston High School, class '41, and a graduate of St. Joseph Mercy College of Nursing, class '45. She was also employed 18 months at the Pontiac General Hospital.
