STARCH ON THE IRON
 Starch clothes are indirectly the blame for scars on many a ham iron, household equipment specialists of the United States Department of Agriculture say. Wheat starch sticks and scatches on the hot iron, there's a temptation to scratch it off with a knife or another sharp utensil handy. The result is likely to be permanent scratches on the plate of the iron. Once scratched the iron may catch on fabrics and pull threads.

There are several simple ways to remove starch without damage to the iron states Miss Josephine Hoke, Home Demonstration Agent. If the iron is hot, do it this way: Shake salt on a piece of paper and rub the iron back and forth over the salt until the starch rubs off. From a cool iron starch may be removed by scouring with very fine steel wool or with a moist cloth dipped in fine scouring powder. Sometimes just rubbing with a moist cloth will do the job.
 As a prevention against sticking starch, rub a little beeswax or paraffin frequently over the hot surface of the iron. Well-cooked starch is less likely to stick than starch which is not thoroughly cooked, so it pays to prepare it carefully. A wax preparation to add when making up starch is on the market which helps prevent sticking and makes ironing easier. Some experienced housewives believe that adding salt to the starch mixture helps keep it from sticking, perhaps because the salt raises the temperature of the mixture and thus aids thorough cooking.

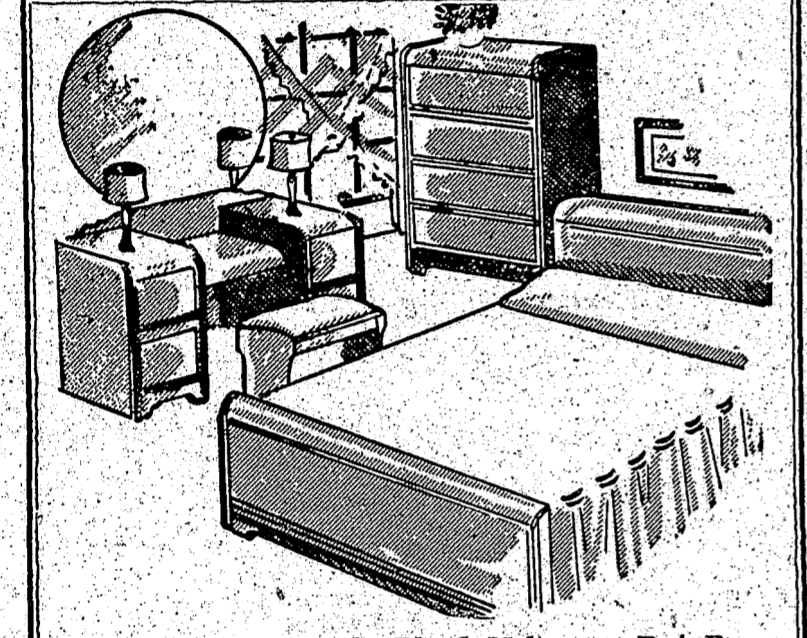

 Suggestions from Miss Josephine Hoke, Home Demonstration Agent, may solve your slip problems for you. If you can make the old slip good for another year you have saved yourself some money.
 You can add a row or two of lingerie lace to the bottom of slips that are too short. If you shrink the lace before sewing it to the slip, there is less danger of it shrinking and pulling from frequent laundering.
 Cotton eyelet embroidery can be added to some slips both at the top and the bottom. By adding a narrow row around the top and dropping the shoulder straps slightly, a little length can be gained. A row of wider eyelet around the bottom will help still more.
 If it's worn shoulder straps that

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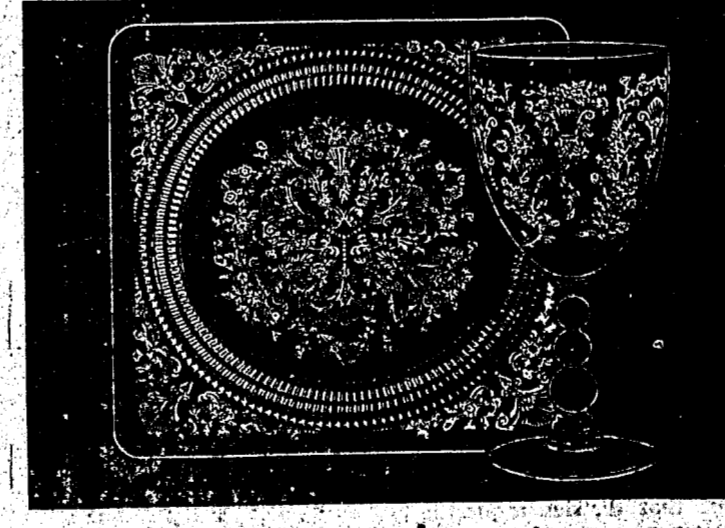

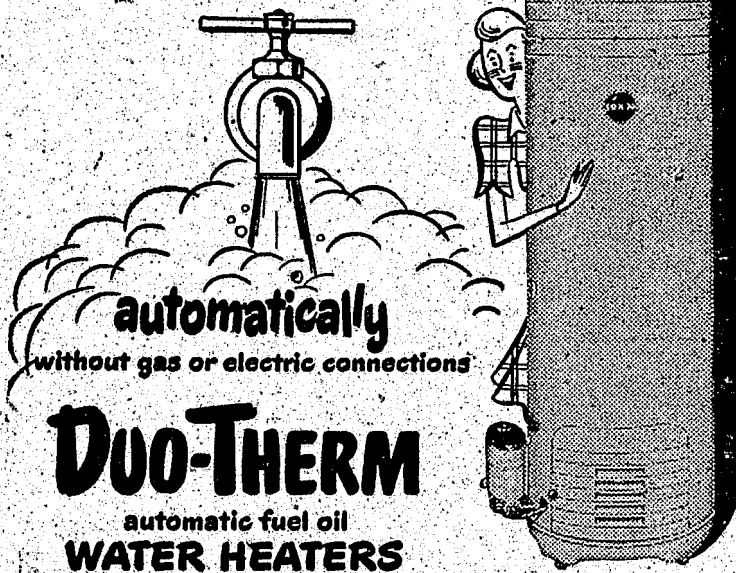

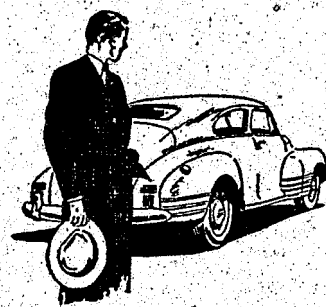

Television viewers in Salt Lake City, Atlanta, Buffalo and cities in between are seeing the sights of Michigan, as photographed in motion pictures by the state department of conservation.

Several television stations, after getting one sample film, are calling systematically for the other pictures in the department's film library -- pictures of Michigan scenery, forest fires, forestry, game, hunting and fishing. The stations have shown a preference for black and white rather than color prints, and for pictures in which the detail is not too fine for the ordinary home receiver.
