township of 36 sections, comprising in each section 640 acres, was segregated as a school section. The money obtained from the sale of this land was placed in the state treasury as a special permanent fund upon which the state pays interest each year , which interest is distributed to the severa school districts through the Primary School Fund.

Early surveyors gave Michigan land in the published reports of the government land office a bad name. It was described as consisting of swamps, quaking bogs with lakes galore and not much arable land. The consequence was that the early westward tide of immigrants seeking new and virgin lands flowed strongly into Ohio Indiana, and Illinois and passed Michigan by. In 1817 a better and more accurate report was made and a trickle of immigrants came into Michigan territory. Governo Lewis Cass in 1819 set up Oakland applied to the largest lake in the county and in 1820 two townships were named - Oakland and Bloomfield. In 1827 there were five townships - Pontiac, Oakland, Farmington, Bloomfield and Troy south of Clarkston, after Independence Township in New Jersey
