know a great variety of people so that he will be able to choose friends and later a wife or husband.  
 Experience in handling money is important preparation for college. Children can't be expected to understand the value of money if they are given some every time they ask for it. If they are given a very small amount every week when they start to school and this is gradually increased, they will have a good beginning. They will make mistakes—but they will hope that the good judgment you have established in their childhood will carry the adolescents can be increased to include certain items of clothing. High school boys and girls need jobs independent of the family to develop a feeling of responsibility and independence.

The History of Clarkston Schools (continued from page one) ily of my grandfather, William V. Vliet, a constant procession came along for ABC. My own father attended this school for the meager education he received. A Union School building was erected on north Main Street in Clarkston by Nelson W. Clark in 1850. It was an Academy or Select School for tuition pupils. Similar schools in Pontiac and elsewhere in the state preceded the establishment of free high schools supported by taxation legalized by a Supreme Court decision in a case from Kalamazoo some time later. This school was headed by Professor Isaac C. Cochran. The building and site were sold to the Clarkston Union School District in 1862 and a graded school was opened with O. S. Ingham as Principal. Later he was followed by Messrs. Eagle, Allen, Rev. Cleveland VanDorn and A. L. Craft. Among early teachers in the grades were Nettie Vliet, and Emma Brown. This building was a white wooden structure and had one elementary room and a small auditorium with a stage on the first floor and two rooms on the second floor which were reached by a stairway at the back. In 1882 it was remodeled into two rooms for grades on the first floor and a high school room and coat room on the second floor with the staircase and double entry at the front of the building. A better grading of the school was made when A. L. Craft became Principal and the following classes graduated under him: Class of 1887 - Lottie Bromfield, Clarence K. Phillips, Fred P. Holcomb, Will T. Green, Anna Lanning, Lillian Walter and Lillian Stott. Class of 1889 - Anna Urch, Anna Foster, Samuel Jossman Cora C. Kier, Maude King, Ellen Roe, Flora Ballard and Ada Galligan. Class of 1892 - Lena Hammond, Ina Warner, Guy A. Walter and Clarence Vliet. Class of 1894 - Gillman A. Green, William F. Hammond, Charles G. Bird, Harry G. Barry, Albert L. Jossman, William C. Bower, Gertrude M. Walter. Class of 1895 - Herbert Lewis, Jr., Edward J. Hubbard, Grace Ballard, Louis Walter, Zoe D. Smith, Eva Esther Walter Eleanor Goodenough, Edith Urch and Libbie M. Smith. Class of 1896 - Ralph E. Jossman, Carleton M. Bower, Leman J. Gulick, Barney Roberts, LeRoy Addis, Sarah W. Carran, Eliza Shay, Hattie Naughtan, Bessie Lowery, Mary E. Sprace, Etta J. VanHorn, and Durand Ogden. Class of 1898 - Clyde R. Morrison, Charles F. Bower, Estelle G. Gibbs, LeRoy Gibbs, Elizabeth Ogden, Blanche Addis, Ralph S. Walter, Myrtle D. Vliet, Lillian M. Urch, Grace E. Walter Lizzie Netting and Gertrude E. Jackson. Mr. Craft left Clarkston in 1898 to become Superintendent at Rochester and later School Commissioner of Oakland County. He was followed by Clarence Vliet. One more grade was added to the high school so that the next class that graduated was the class of 1901 - Maude DeLisle, Clara Urch, Elizabeth Ogden, Blanche Addis, Elizabeth Bird, Felix Garter and Margaret Hammond. Some years later the wooden building was torn down and the brick building now owned by the Ford Co., was erected for school use and served until the increased enrollment due to the growth of the village necessitated the erection of the present high school and grade building in the southeastern part of the village.
