## Small Game Season Opens Oct. 15

Hunters getting ready to invade fields and marshes on Friday, October 15 - opening day of the small game season in the lower peninsula and of the duck season everywhere in the state - cannot shoot legally before 12 o'clock, noon, eastern standard time.

On the second day of the season, it will be unlawful to hunt small game before 10 a. m. in southern counties of the lower peninsula; Oceana, Newaygo, Mecosta, Isabella, Midland, Bay, and all of Huron, but duck hunters can start banging away one-half hour before sunrise anywhere in the state.

Legal shooting hours during migratory game bird (duck) season except on opening day are from one-half hour before sunrise to one hour before sunset.

On the third and succeeding day of the small game season the opening hour is 7 a. m. in these southern counties.

The 12-day pleasant season ends October 26.

 Special attention must be paid to crops that are placed in storage. The edible portions of plants placed in storage are living plant parts, and although stopped in development, still function as live plants. Changes take place in tissues and they are affected by temperature, moisture, air, and light.  
 Root crops include beets, carrots, turnips, rutabagas, salsify, parsnips, and winter radishes. The crops require cold, moist conditions with little air circulation. A temperature near freezing with a relative humidity of 90 to 95 percent is recommended. The root crops may be stored in outdoor pits or mounts, in an indoor root cellar, or in specially constructed store rooms in the basement.

Tops of root crops for storage should not be cut too close to the roots. With beets, about one-half inch of the tops should be left to prevent "bleeding". None of the root crops should be dug until just before freezing weather in late October or early November. Parsnips, salsify and horseradish are not injured by freezing and may be left in the ground all winter. Better still, they may be dug, placed in mounds and covered with soil in the garden.

**IMPORTANT TO CONTROL POTATO BLIGHT**  
 Control of potato blight is of major importance to potato growers in Oakland County, according to Karl D. Bailey, county agricultural agent.  
 When blight is present, agent Bailey says, spraying will help to counteract the condition. Use Bordeaux 12-6-100 each week. Spraying both ways, that is, going up the field and returning over the same area before moving over, should be done if possible. Complete coverage is important. Burning vines by one of the new methods, just prior to digging will be an added precaution. Proper storage for potatoes is advised, by the county agent. Store only sound potatoes that are relatively dry and free from dirt. Put late blighted or field frosted stocks in temporary pits or storage.
