



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

Tops of root crops for storage should not be cut too close to the coots. With beets, about one-half inch of the tops shold be left to prevent "bleeding". None of the just before freezing weather in late October or early November. Parsnips, salsify and horseradish are not injured by freezing and may be left in the ground all winter. Better still, they may be dug, placed in mounds and covered with soil in the garden.

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
