



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MICHIGAN PUBLIC SERVICE COMMISSION ORDERS INCREASE IN TELEPHONE

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



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

Shearing the faces of heavily wooled feeder lambs is a good management practice, according, to Graydon Blank, extension animal husbandryman at Michigan State college. The shearing will increase gains in lamb feeding.
