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TELEPHONE RATES TO BE INCREASED

The Michigan Public Service Commission today approved a new schedule of rates for the Michigan Bell Telephone Company in compliance with an order of October 6 increasing the company's revenues by \$8,217,000 a year.

Effective immediately, the rate increase, which, after taxes, will mean \$5,094,540 to the company, will be applied to each of the company's 242 exchanges and virtually every type of Michigan Bell Service. The rate increase is the first to the company in 22 years.

R. E. Poll, manager at Clarkston for the company, said the order and rate schedule established two sets of rates in exchanges where extended-area service will be introduced.

The first will be an interim schedule until the service is initiated and the other new rates when extended-area service gets under way to eliminate toll charges between exchanges with the same "community of interest."

Although extended-area service was authorized by the Commission in April, facilities will not be ready for the service to be introduced here until early 1950.

For the privilege of making unlimited calls to Pontiac, Commerce, Drayton Plains, Lake Orion, Leonard and Oxford without paying toll charges, customers here will pay somewhat higher rates when extended-area service is in effect.

Introduction of the service, however, will not increase the company's revenues inasmuch as such increases in local exchange charges will be offset by the loss of toll revenue the company pointed out.

The order and rate schedule authorizes relatively higher increases in some exchanges, including Clarkston, to correct inequities, Poll said.

He pointed out that a Commission order of 1942, while dissolving such inequities in exchanges where charges were above the levels fixed in the rate schedule at that time, made no increases in exchanges where rates were below such levels.

"Rates in Clarkston have been on the low side for years when compared with other exchanges of like telephone development and calling opportunities," he said.

Under the extended-area plan, Clarkston will become a zone of the Pontiac district exchange to be inaugurated simultaneously with extended area service. Interoffice cable facilities now are being expanded to handle the expected increase in telephone traffic between zones of the district exchange.

Until extended-area service becomes available, new intrastate toll rates will require a 5-cent increase on calls to Lake Orion. New monthly telephone rates at Clarkston are as follows:

Residence — individual line, from \$1.75 to \$3.75 (temporarily \$2.25); two-party line, from \$1.65 to \$3 (temporarily \$2); four-party line, from \$1.45 to \$2.50 (temporarily \$1.75); rural line, from \$1.50 to \$2.50 (temporarily \$1.75); Business — individual line, from \$2.30 to \$7.50 (temporarily \$4); two-party line from \$2 to \$6 (temporarily \$3.25); semi-public station, from \$2.40 to \$6 (temporarily \$3.90); rural line, from \$2.25 to \$4.25 (temporarily \$2.75); PBX trunk, from \$2.76 to \$11.25 (temporarily \$6); Extensions — residence, from 50c to 75c; business, from \$1 to \$1.25.

Long distance revenues on calls to Michigan points are increased 6 per cent with the following changes. Reduction in the initial calling period (before overtime charges) from 5 minutes for distances of 19 to 15 miles and to 3 minutes for distances over 15 and up to 30 miles. Increase in overtime charges from the present one fourth to one third of the initial period rates. Increase of 5

cents on night and Sunday calls for distances of 48 to 112.

The Commission said its order, which becomes effective more than a year after the Michigan Bell filed its application for an increase, will provide a return of 6 per cent on the adjusted investment. Commissioner Schuyler L. Marshall, however, said that continued inflation might force a drop in that return. "Frankly," he said, "we expect Michigan Bell back in a short time."

The company pointed out that the return is due to shrink because of rising costs of doing business, together with the additional investment required for service improvements and expansion. It said it probably will seek an additional increase soon. It will publish legal notices of its proposal at that time.

"In line with its policy of providing the best possible service at the lowest possible cost," said Poll, "Michigan Bell purposely held its request for a rate increase in August, 1947, to what it considered would be its absolute requirement at that time."

"In the year since the company filed its application, however, its costs, like those of everyone and every business, have continued to rise. Some weeks ago, it became apparent that the company's judgement of a year ago was out of line with the facts of inflation today."

"The company's investment is increasing rapidly and must continue to increase if it is to provide the improvements in service for which the public has been clamoring. Michigan Bell is now at about the half-way point of its 5-year, \$220,000,000 postwar improvement and expansion program."

"When rates are so low as to jeopardize the service and future improvements, the public interest is in danger. Michigan Bell has no desire to charge any more for its service than necessary. The company has no other choice, however, than to ask for additional revenues, if it is to meet its service obligation. It will ask for only enough to maintain the financial integrity of the institution and to attract capital necessary to finance improvements in the service."

"Even under the new rates, a month's telephone service for a typical family will cost no more than a tankful of gasoline or a meal away from home."

The company emphasized that

the rate increase does not provide for any third-round general wage increase. It said the order does little more than take care of the wage increase of last year and pointed out that the company is now faced with further wage demands from unions and has made offers that would raise total payroll costs by \$6,370,000 a year.

Of the \$8,217,000 increase, \$2,956,000 will apply to local exchange rates outstate, \$2,633,000 to such rates in Detroit, \$438,000 in Detroit suburban exchanges, \$831,000 in long distance rates within the state, and \$1,359,000 in miscellaneous service items such as switching and equipment charges.

The order and rate schedule reclassifies outstate exchanges into

8 groups, depending on the number of main telephones in each exchange area. Uniform rates will apply in each of the groups which range from calling areas of 800 or fewer main telephones to those with 50,000 to 100,000 main stations.

The order and rate schedule was handed down by the Commission about a year after the company's application for a rate increase. It followed an extensive inquiry into the company's operations and months of hearings with more than 4,200 pages of testimony.
