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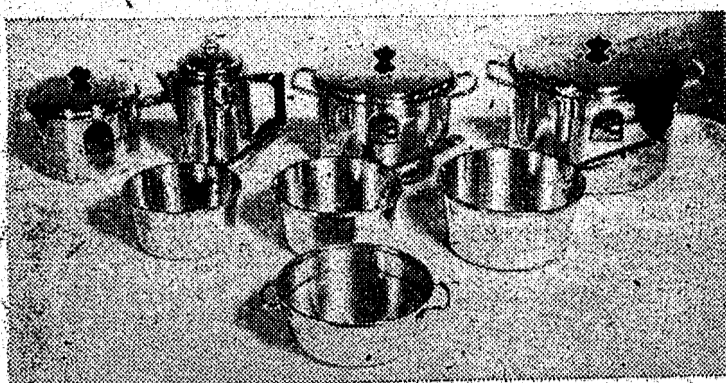
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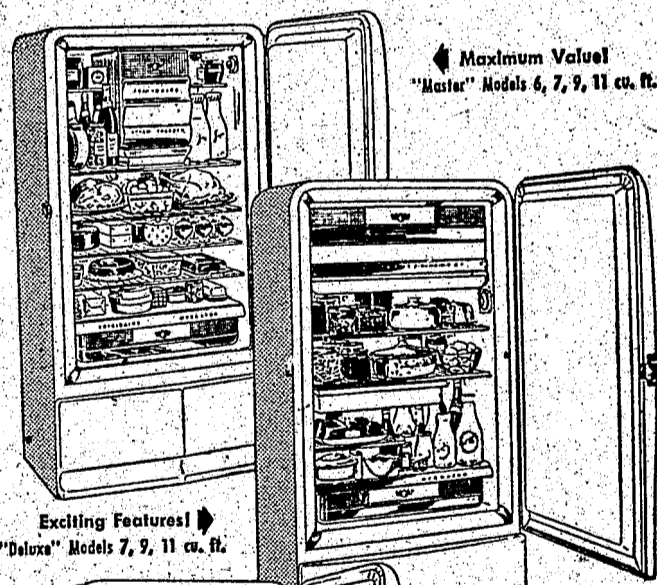

Johnny Adams led the scorers with eight points.

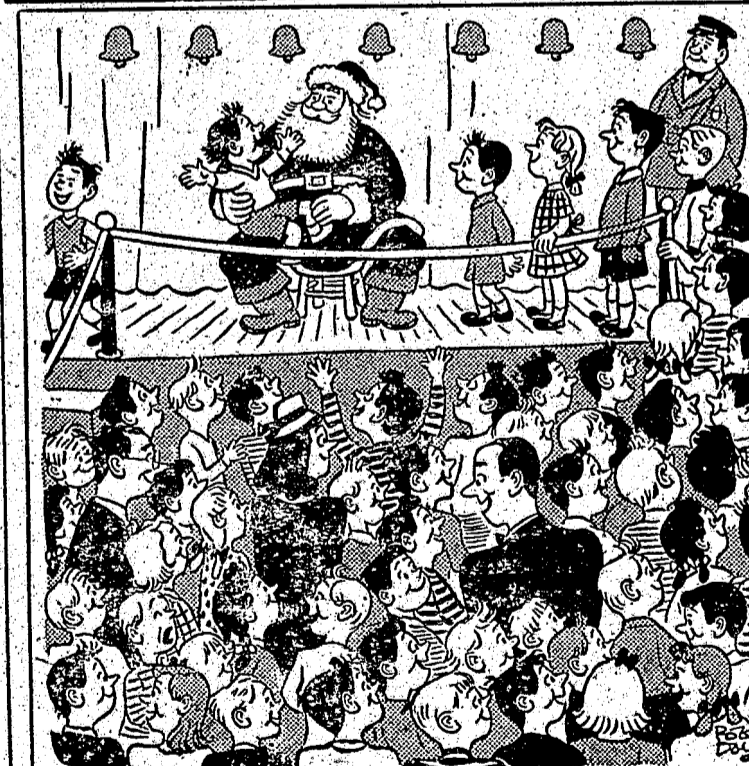
This year Clarkston has a fighting team with averages, 5 ft 10 inches in height. The boys looked good in spots especially when the chips were down.

### KIDS MUST EAT

If you're concerned about the health of your children who are in school again, don't forget your pre-school child. This is an important time in his life.

His bones are growing rapidly and this means he needs lots of calcium, reminds Josephine Hoke, Home Demonstration Agent. Three cups of milk daily is the minimum and four cups are desirable.

If he drinks one cup at each meal, the other cups can be used easily in other foods such as soups, cereals, creamed dishes, custards or simple puddings. If he drinks the milk at intervals between eating the rest of his dinner rather than all at once, it should not interfere with his appetite for other food.

Plan his meals to provide enough of all the food nutrients needed for growth and health and serve them regularly. Give him small servings so that he can clean up his plate.

Food habits are important at his age because they last for many years. At mealtime create a pleasant atmosphere by avoiding excitement, scolding and coaxing. Do not force him to eat. Serve food in an interesting way and provide utensils that the child can handle.

Let him rest a while before eating -- and then enjoy eating.

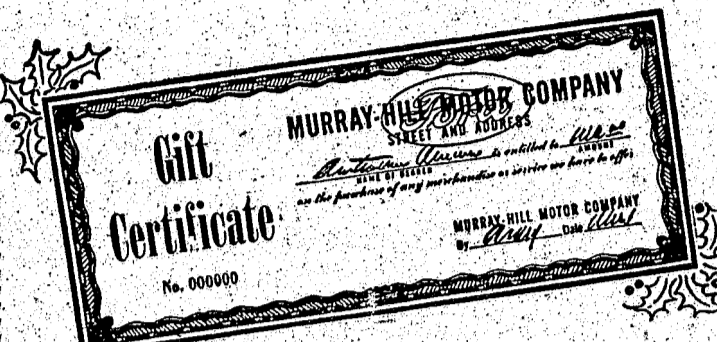
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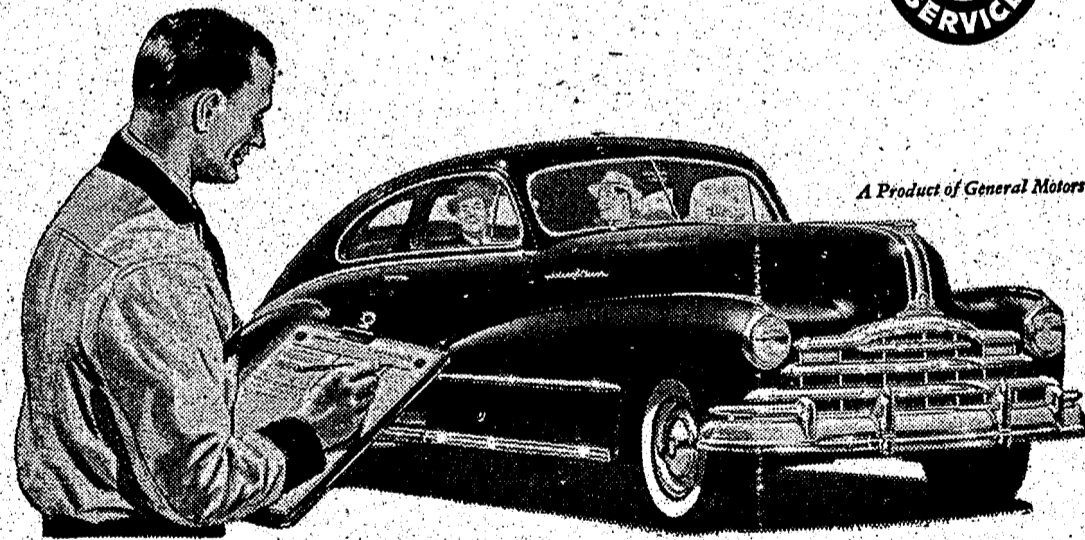

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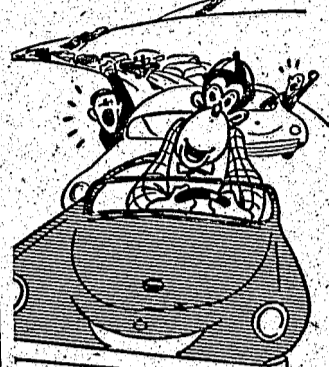
