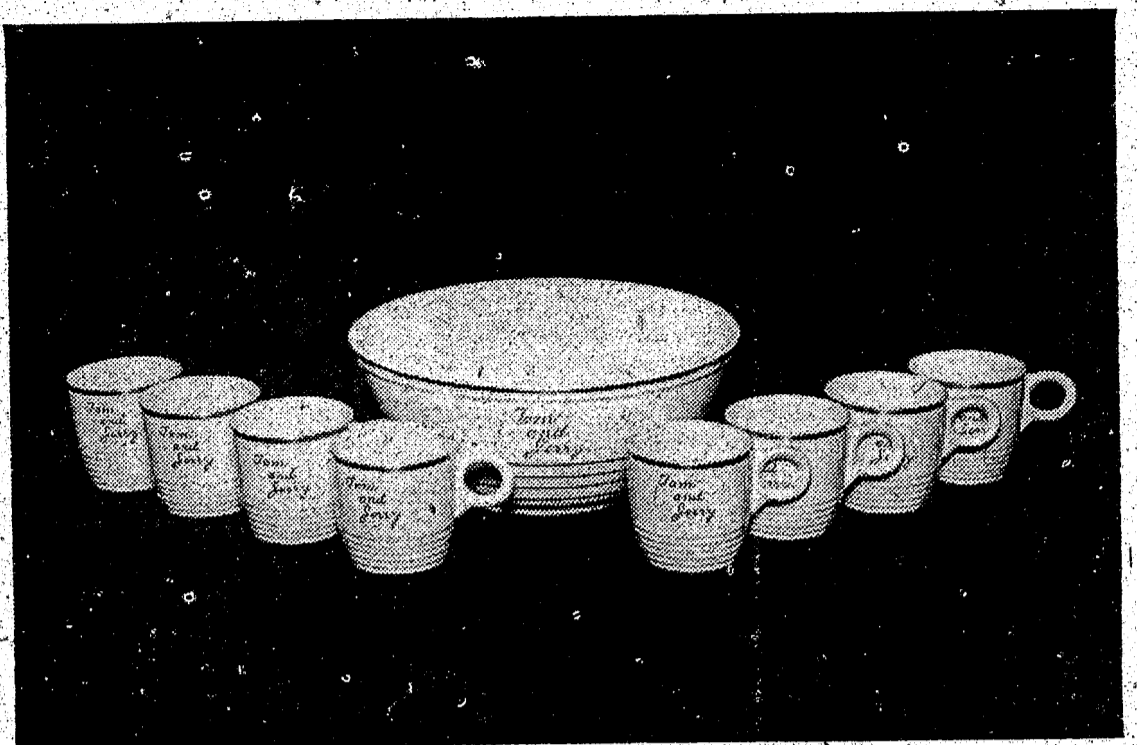

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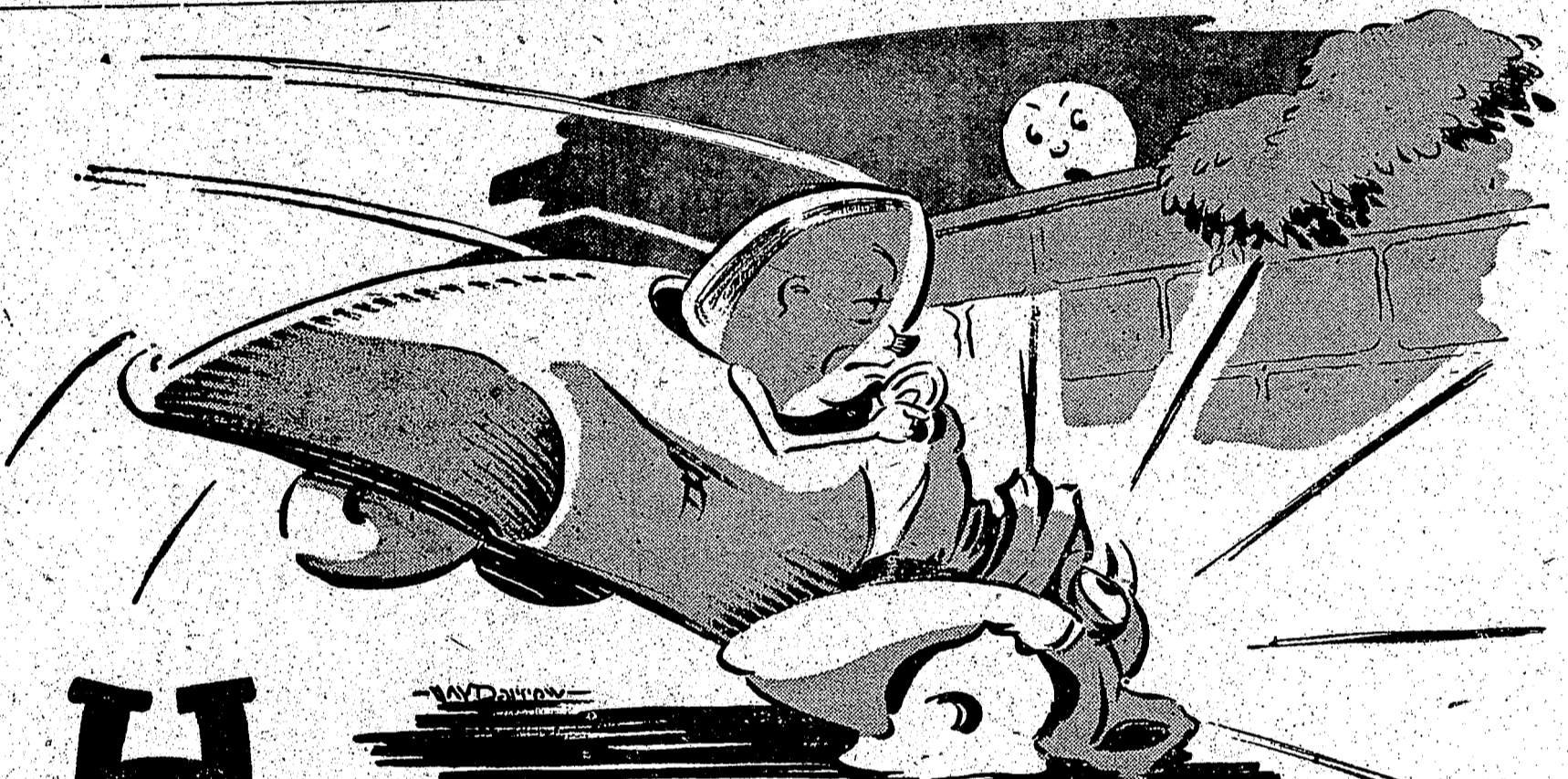

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FINISH OLD YEAR WITH INFORMAL PARTIES FOR ALL

Latch strings are out all over the world this holiday week. What have you planned for holiday hospitality? You may agree with Pearl Jackson of Michigan State college that it's nice to plan something for each member of the family.

If you keep a few snack items on hand you can entertain for

any member of your family at a moment's notice and you still have time to finish off the old year with a friendly note of hospitality. Those little rolled sandwiches wrapped well in waxed paper will keep for a couple of days in the refrigerator. These served with some steaming tea, coffee or hot chocolate will make every guest feel "special". And it's not too late to serve those gay Christmas cookies.

Your husband's friends would enjoy an assorted bread and cheese tray. And they wouldn't object to an apple pie or some homemade cake—with coffee, of course.

For the small fry, popcorn and apples and cider, hot or cold will go over in a big way. An afternoon with the new Christmas games is just the ticket for their entertainment. If a holiday punch bowl appeals to you, float an ice block in it. Hollow it out and pile some crystallized grapes in it with a few sprigs of pine. To make the crystallized grapes, first dip them in slightly beaten egg white to which a little water has been added. Then dredge them in red and green colored sugar and let them dry a couple of hours. You can make colored sugar by adding vegetable coloring to a little sugar.

FARMERS URGED TO USE ACCOUNT BOOK Farmers in Oakland county will find that the revised farm account book issued this year by the

Michigan State college farm management department is simple and easy to keep. County agricultural agent Karl D. Bailey pointed out the advantages of the new account book as he urged farmers to begin the new year by keeping a good set of financial records.

Among the features of the book is the new continuous farm inventory which eliminates the need for transferring the inventory record each time a new book is started. All it takes once each year is just a few minutes to bring the inventory up to date. At the close of each year the inventory supplement can be slipped out of the old book and fastened into the new book.

Cash income and expense items can be summarized anytime throughout the year.

The filing of a federal income tax report has been made simpler and easier with a new section that gives specific instructions. Elsewhere in the book, space is set aside for production and livestock breeding records.

HERD CARE ADVISED FOR WINTER MONTHS

Good care during the winter months is something that a dairy herd needs and deserves, believes George Parsons, extension dairyman at Michigan State college.

It's hard for a cow to keep up top production when standing around in a cold rain or snow. The cow that has to break a skin of ice before she can get a drink probably won't be much interested in producing milk.

Give the cow's udder good care, the dairyman suggests. If it should become swollen or inflamed, check with a veterinarian for mastitis. Prompt diagnosis and treatment will help to cut mastitis losses.

Treating for lice and grubs will make life a lot more pleasant for the herd and help maintain production, Parson concluded.

LAUNDRY LINENS CAREFULLY
 Holiday entertaining is going to mean extra linens in the laundry and most of us worry about the extra care that they require.

Ironing linens will not be such a major problem if you remember a few tips offered by Miss Josephine Hoke, Home Demonstration Agent.

After you have washed them, removed all stains and rinsed them thoroughly, you are well started. But there's many a slip between washing and ironing!

When you hang up linens to dry, hang them square, straight with the thread and never by the corners. Pin a third of the piece over the line. When you take them down, fold them and don't crumple them into a basket. This just makes more work later.

Table linens may be removed from the line when they are dry enough for ironing. This eliminates waiting for dampening to thoroughly penetrate the fabric. If they are dry, dampen moderately with warm water because it penetrates faster and more thoroughly than cold water.

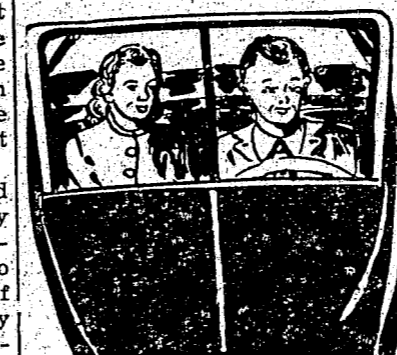
Fold clothes evenly but do not roll into an old-fashioned hard bundle. Place them in a plastic bag which retains all moisture or wrap them in a heavy cloth.

Fold linens selvedge to selvedge and iron. Fold again. Always iron with grain of the material and never against it. Ironing the fiber lengthwise tends to keep the material straighter and smoother. If you want your linens to live long-

er, change the position of folds slightly from time to time.

ORDER FERTILIZER EARLY

Early ordering of fertilizer is advised by county agricultural agent Karl D. Bailey.

After you've planned next year's farming operations and determined the amount and kinds of fertilizer needed, it should be ordered so you have it next spring when you need it.

Fertilizer that you have on hand can be stored so it will remain in good condition. Agent Bailey suggests these storage rules:

1. Store sacks of plant food only in the barn or some other dry building that has flooring off the ground.
2. If you have to use earth or cement floors, stack fertilizer bags on a crib of blocks and boards.
3. Stack the bags closely together. This will reduce the circulation of air from which the fertilizer may soak up moisture.
4. Put no more than seven or eight bags high in a stack. In high stacks the pressure of the top bags will tend to cake the fertilizer on the bottom of the pile.
5. Keep broken bags separate from the main pile. Loose fertilizer soaks up moisture.

New Twist In Biscuits



Orange twistlers are made from strips of biscuit dough, with orange rind and sugar rolled into the dough. After baking, the twistlers have a pebbly surface with a glisten of sugar.

Once a bride has learned to make good biscuits—and that skill is by no means as difficult as the cartoons would have us believe—she's ready for an advanced lesson that includes making orange twistlers. These crisp curls of biscuit dough have an orange flavor accented by a crust of sugar, and the shape is enough to turn them into a culinary triumph for the cook.

To form twistlers, first roll an orange rind-sugar mixture into the biscuit dough. Then cut the dough into strips, double each strip over and twist with one motion. For a variation, you might try braiding three shorter strips together, pressing the ends together firmly. Orange twistlers may be served wherever biscuits would be proper, and they may also accompany afternoon cups of coffee or tea.

ORANGE TWISTERS

2 cups sifted enriched flour
 3 teaspoons baking powder
 1 teaspoon salt
 2 to 4 tablespoons shortening
 2 to 1/2 cup milk
 Orange Sugar

Sift flour, baking powder and salt together. Cut or rub in shortening. Add milk to form a soft dough. Turn out on lightly floured board and knead one-half minute. Pat or roll out into eight-inch square about one-fourth inch thick. Roll Orange Sugar into the dough. Cut into strips about three-eighths inch wide. Double each strip over and twist. Place on baking sheet. Bake in hot oven (450 degrees F.) 10 to 12 minutes. Yield: About 18 three-inch twistlers.

1 3/4 tablespoons sugar
 1 teaspoon grated orange rind

needs for quality eggs. That means eggs that are produced clean and not cleaned by hand, says Howard Zindel, Michigan State college extension poultry specialist.

Hand cleaning is liable to be injurious to the egg's quality. The protective coating of the shell is removed and the egg deteriorates faster, the poultryman revealed.

The specialist says you can have clean eggs by giving the hens clean nests, dry litter, keeping hens in until yards are dry, and by frequent collection. Hens that wander around a dirty barnyard and then track in the laying house are the worst offenders.

REMEMBER, you'll save work and make money by producing clean eggs.
