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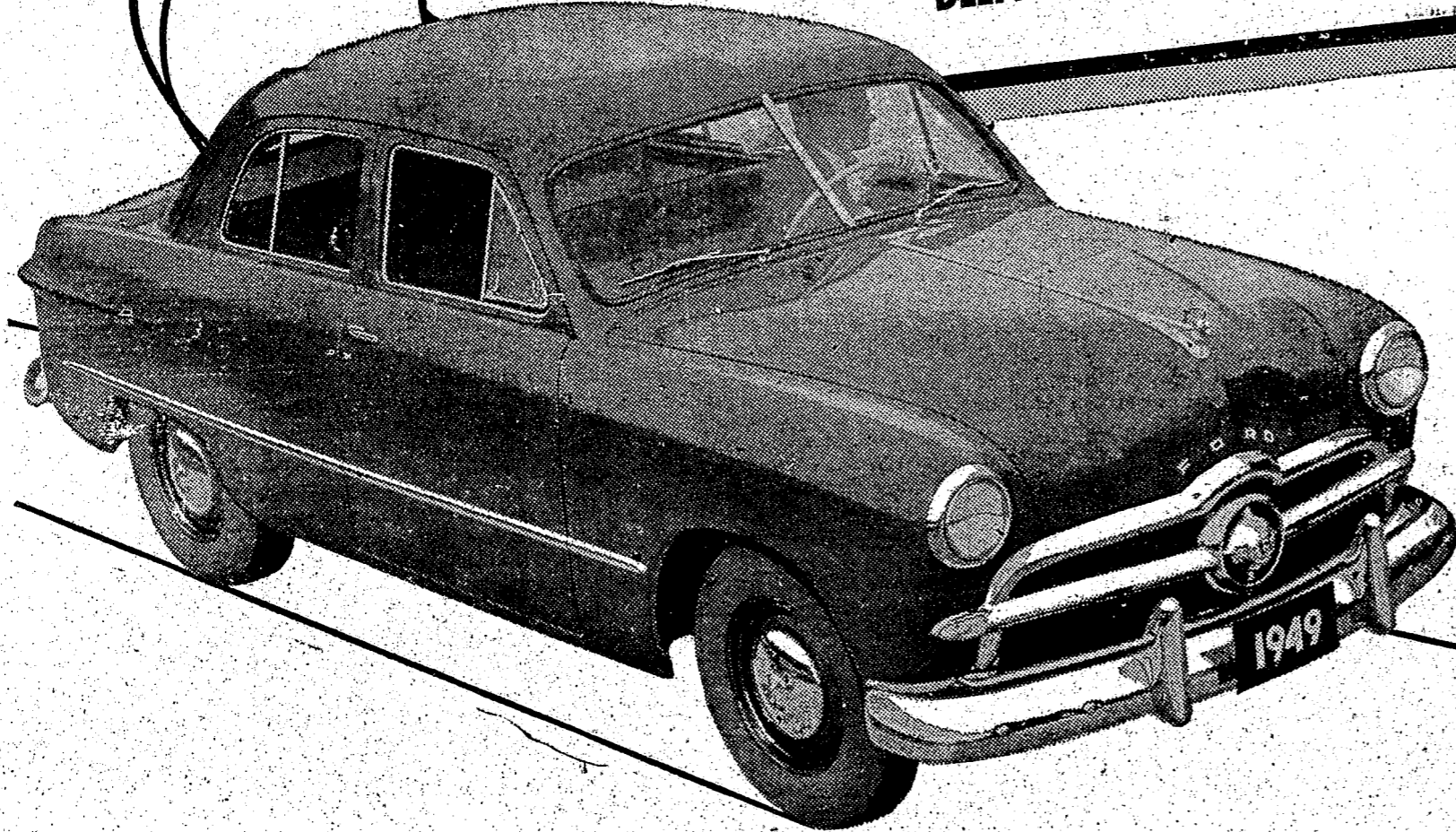
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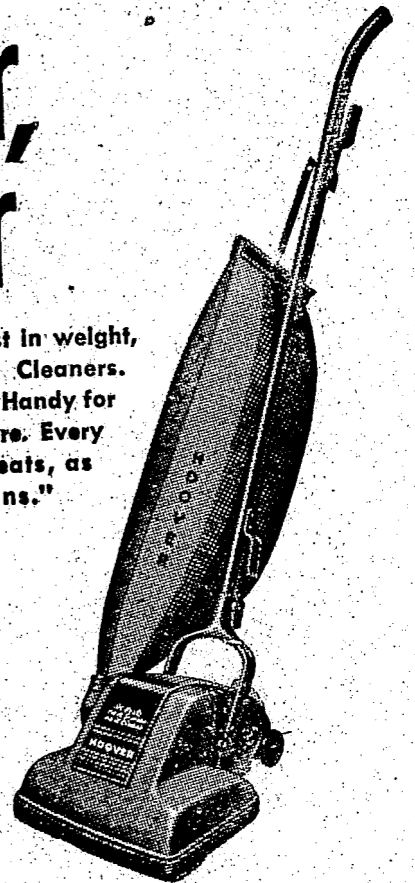
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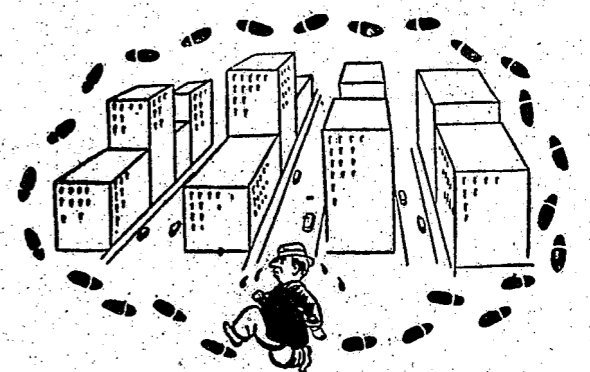
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3rd. GRADE NEWS

1949-ACP SIGN-UP

Farmers of Oakland County can now sign their farm-plans to participate in the enlarged 1949 Agricultural Conservation Program, according to Walter Cook, Chairman of the Oakland County AAA Committee.

The Chairman advises farmers that an increase in funds has been authorized for the 1949 conservation program in Oakland County

which will make possible an increase in the individual assistance payments to farmers and which should provide for a material increase in the over-all conservation work carried out in this county during the year.

The Agricultural Conservation program is open to all farmers in the county who desire to participate. However, only certain approved conservation practices are eligible for financial assistance under the program. In Oakland County, the following practices have been approved for payments: Liming Materials; 1. Ground Limestone, Marl and Hydrated Lime. 2. Fertilizer to be applied to meadows and pastures or to new seedings made without a grain crop. 3. Fertilizer to be applied to Spring seeded small grains that are seeded to Alfalfa, Clovers or Perennial Grasses. 4. Green manure Crops to be plowed down in 1949 as Sweet Clover, June Clover sown in 1948, winter rye or wheat. 5. Cover crops, fall sowing of Spring grains. 6. Mulching Materials applied to Orchards & Vineyards. 7. Establishing Sod Waterways. 8. Field Stripcropping. 9. Complete pasture establishment, Alfalfa and Brom Seedings made alone on land to be used for permanent pasture. Low ground seeded to Reed Canary grass. 10. Tree planting for Reforestation, Gully Control, and Windbreaks. 11. Farm Open Ditches. 12. Tile Drains. 13. Establishing Perennial Cover in Orchards.

Farmers may sign up for the 1949 program by filling out a farm plan on or before March 31, at the County AAA office or at their own township sign-up meeting, with the following schedule: Independence Township, Independence Township Hall, Tues. and Friday, February 15 and 18; Springfield, Springfield Township Hall, Wednesday and Thursday, February 16 and 17.

CONSIDER KINDS OF KITCHENWARE BEFORE BUYING

In spite of the constant pressure on housewives to buy complete sets of certain types of kitchen utensils there is no "best" kind.

Aluminum, stainless steel, iron,

tin, enamelware, glass or earthenware all differ in the way they take in, carry, throw off and hold heat. You'll be wise to have some utensils of each kind believes Lucile Ketchum, extension specialist in home management at Michigan State college.

Before buying new utensils look over what you have and class them according to uses. Then decide what types you need. In checking your supply for usefulness or deciding about new ones to buy there are certain points to watch.

Check the size to see whether it will fit the burner or oven for convenience and good use of heat. Straight sides on cooking utensils save heat and stoye space. Rounded corners and smooth finishes make cleaning easier. Tight fitting lids are important.

Pans with flat bottoms will stand steady and level and if

they have a dull finish they will absorb more heat. Handles should stay cool, be well-balanced, securely fastened and fit your hand. Lids shouldn't warp or rust. Look for durable material and good construction.

Consider which metals are best for your use. Aluminum comes in light, medium and heavy weights. Stainless steel is avail-

able both with and without copper bottoms.

Porcelain enamel may be made with one coat of enamel or several coats. Cast iron is very durable. And then there are still tin, glass and earthenware to choose from.

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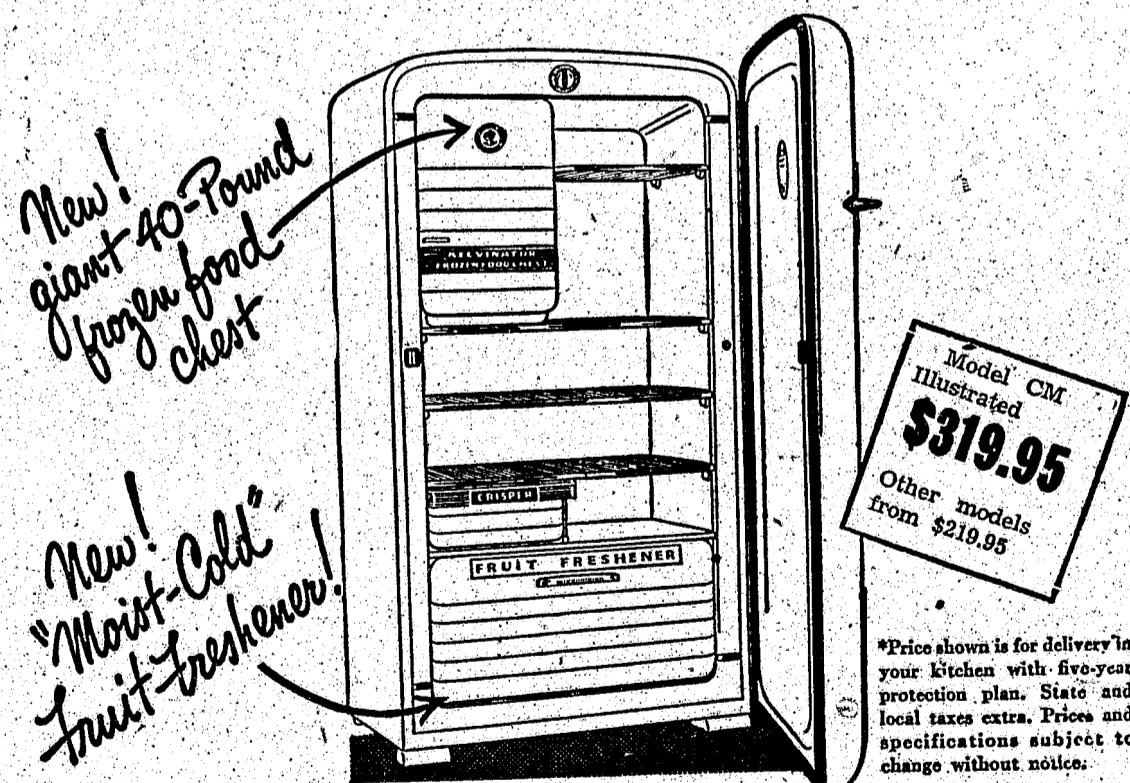
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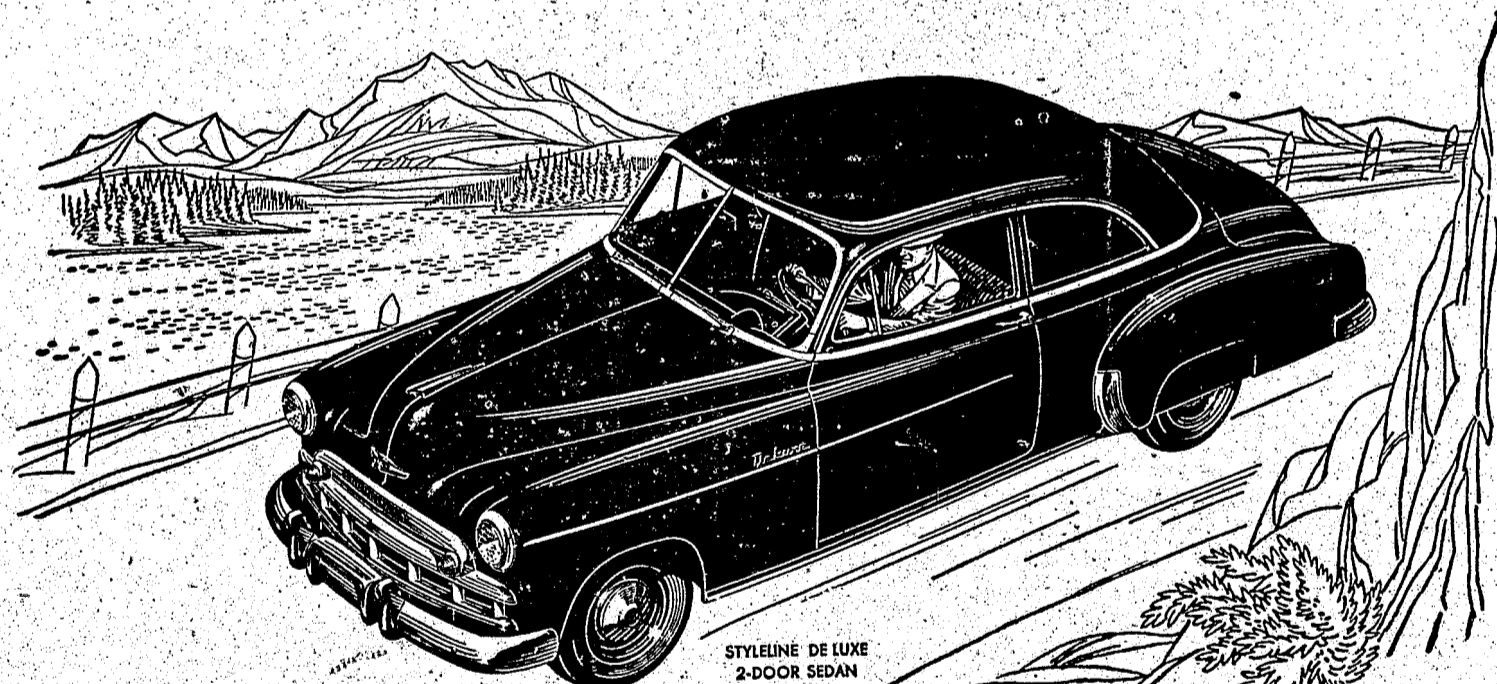
