Isa G. Marley, 53 of 9593 Dartmouth Road, suffered a heart attack and passed away suddenly at his home on Tuesday night.







#### GAINS SHOW IN 1948 BARBERRY REMOVAL WORK

A battle which was begun in 1918 in an effort to protect oats. wheat, barley, and rye from stem rust is being won in Michigan. Cooperation between the U. S. Department of Agriculture, Michigan Department of Agriculture, and Michigan State college has reduced the annual stem rust loss from 2,600,00 bushels to less than 200,000. To eliminate stem-rust of

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grains, the carrier of the diseaserust-spreading barberry-must be destroyed.

C. A. Boyer, chief of the Bureau of Plant Industry for the state department of agriculture, says that barberry erradication helps improve the conditions under which small grains may be produced. The barberry provides a place where the rust may develop during the spring just before infecting grain plants and grasses.

During 1948, project workers destroyed more than 3,900 such barberry bushes on 391 rural and city properties. An additional 970 previously infected properties were inspected but no new growth was found. A total of 1,416 square miles was surveyed.

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

#### CHILDREN NEED WINTER SUNSHINE

Michigan's winter wonderland has many advantages for growing children but it also has one disadvantage — there is not enough sunshine, during the winter months, the Michigan Department of Health said today.

Michigan children, especially in the first few years of their life need a supplement of vitamin D during the winter months to make up for the lack of sunshine. The vitamin is required for normal development of bones and teeth Lack of it may result in rickets, a disease which hinders proper bone development.

Some child specialists recommend that Michigan children be given a supplement of the sunshine vitamin the year around. The child's physician should recommend the amount and type of vitamin D required.

Many Michigan children suffer also from vitamin A and vitamin C deficienc**i**es. These vitamins help the body to resist infection and are essential to tissue building and good growth.

Make an effort to interest your child in eating more tomatoes, carrots, green leafy vegetables, rutabagas, squash, pumpkin, cabbage and other winter vegetables; they are rich in vitamins A and C the Department counselled.
