Clarkston In League Wins 10 Straight

In the last scheduled game of the season Clarkston defeated Fraser on the latter's home court by the score of 46-32. The score was rather close in the earlier part of the game. The first quarter ended with Clarkston leading by the score of 8-7. The second quarter Clarkston increased its lead by two more points and the score was 19-16. In the third quarter the C. H. S. boys found the hoop and really poured in the baskets, marking up 15 points. Fraser was able to get hit 7. The fourth period was a repetition of the third. Clarkston chalked up 12 more while Fraser was getting 9.

John Adams was the scoring ace in this game with 18 points to his credit.

The Clarkston boys are quite proud of the league record they have compiled and are anxiously awaiting the basketball trophy for the case. This is the third straight year that Clarkston has been on the top of the heap. In 1947 they were tied with Log Cabin.

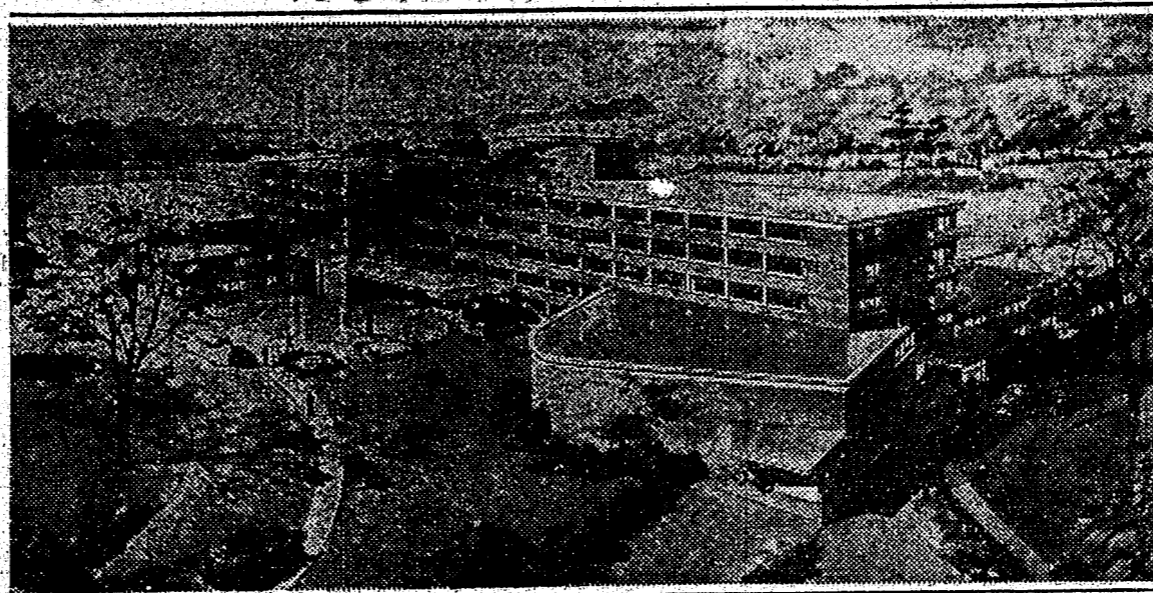

MILEAGE CHARGES CHANGE IN RURAL AREAS

The Michigan Public Service Commission has authorized a reduction of elimination of exchange line mileage charges for thousands of telephone users in former rural areas that are now substantial residential developments in more than 100 exchanges of the Michigan Bell Telephone Company, including Clarkston.

The Commission approved Michigan Bell's program to extend or modify urban-service operating areas in the affected

Proposed Continuing Education Center at Michigan State College



Construction of a large Continuing Education Center at Michigan State College is scheduled to start April 1. The building, shown above in an architect's drawing, will provide accommodations for the college's extensive program of continuing educational services to the people of Michigan. Last year, special conferences and short courses, ranging in subject matter from sheep shearing to government workshops,

brought more than 60,000 Michigan people to the East Lansing campus. In addition, the six-story construction will contain more than 100 guest rooms, 15 special conference rooms, and dining and large assembly facilities. The building will be financed by the W. K. Kellogg Foundation of Battle Creek and furnishings will be provided by the Michigan Hotel Association. The Center will be located on Michigan Avenue, at the northwest entrance to the campus.

GOOD LEASE HELPS FARM

With the approach of March first traditional moving time on the farm, the Michigan State college farm management department is advising consideration of farm leases.

Good leases furnish a written record of what parties agree upon at the time the agreement is made. They protect the interest of the tenant or landlord in case of the death of either party. A good lease also helps encourage better farm management practices.

for the purpose of REVIEWING the REGISTRATION and REGISTERING such of the qualified electors in said TOWNSHIP, CITY or VILLAGE as SHALL PROPERLY apply therefor.

The name of no person but an ACTUAL RESIDENT of the precinct at the time of registration, and entitled under the constitution, if remaining such resident, to vote at the next election, shall be entered in the registration book. ELECTOR UNABLE TO MAKE PERSONAL APPLICATION, PROCEDURE

SEC. 16. Any elector who is unable to make personal application for registration because of physical disability or absence from the Township, City or Village in which his legal residence is located, may be registered prior to the close of registration before any election or primary election by securing from the Clerk of the Township, City or Village in which is located his legal residence, duplicate registration cards and executing in duplicate the registration affidavit before a notary public or other officer legally authorized to administer oaths and returning such registration cards to the Clerk of the Township, City or Village before the close of office hours on the last day of registration prior to any election or primary election. The notary public or other officer administering the oath shall sign his name on the line for the signature of the registration officer and designate his title.

REGISTRATION OF ELECTORS REQUIRED; REGISTRATION ON ELECTION DAY, IDENTIFICATION OF ELECTOR

SEC. 1. The inspectors of election at any election or primary election in this State, or in any District, County, Township or Village thereof, shall not receive the vote of any person whose name is not registered in the registration book of the precinct in which he offers to vote, but the name of a qualified elector may be registered on the day of any election or primary election up to 4 P. M. of said day; Provided, That he shall, under oath, state that he is a resident of such precinct, is at least 21 years of age and has resided in

the State for at least 6 months and in the Township or City 20 days next preceding such election, designating particularly the place of his residence, and that he possesses the other qualifications of an elector under the constitution, and that, owing to the sickness or bodily infirmity of himself, or of some member of his family, or owing to his absence from the Township or City on public or private business, and without intent to avoid or delay his registration, he was unable to make application for registration on final days set for such registration: Provided Further, That he or she is accompanied and identified by a registered voter known to a member of the election board: Provided Further, That the Board of Supervisors of any County may by resolution duly adopted discontinue the registration of electors on primary and election days and such registrations shall not be taken in such County thereafter on primary and election days unless and until the Board of Supervisors rescinds its action in connection therewith.

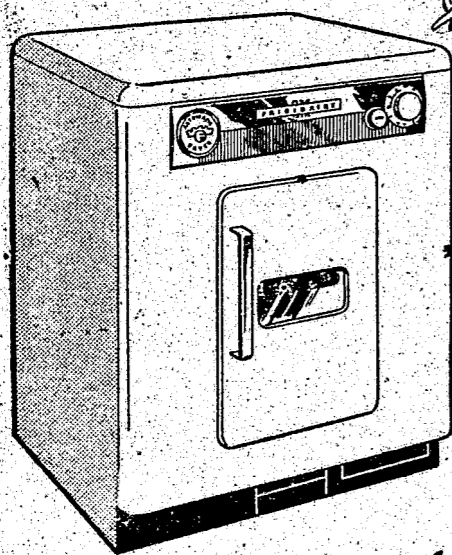

A battle which was begun in 1918 in an effort to protect oats, wheat, barley, and rye from stem rust is being won in Michigan.

Cooperation between the U. S. Department of Agriculture, Michigan Department of Agriculture, and Michigan State college has reduced the annual stem rust loss from 2,600,000 bushels to less than 200,000. To eliminate stem-rust of

grains, the carrier of the disease—rust-spreading barberry—must be destroyed. C. A. Boyer, chief of the Bureau of Plant Industry for the state department of agriculture, says that barberry eradication helps improve the conditions under which small grains may be produced.

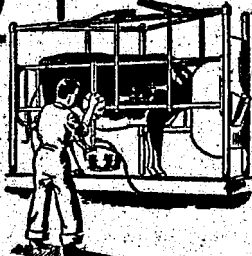

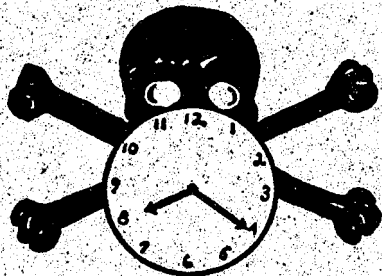
Some child specialists recommend that Michigan children be given a supplement of the sunshine vitamin the year around. The child's physician should recommend the amount and type of vitamin D required.

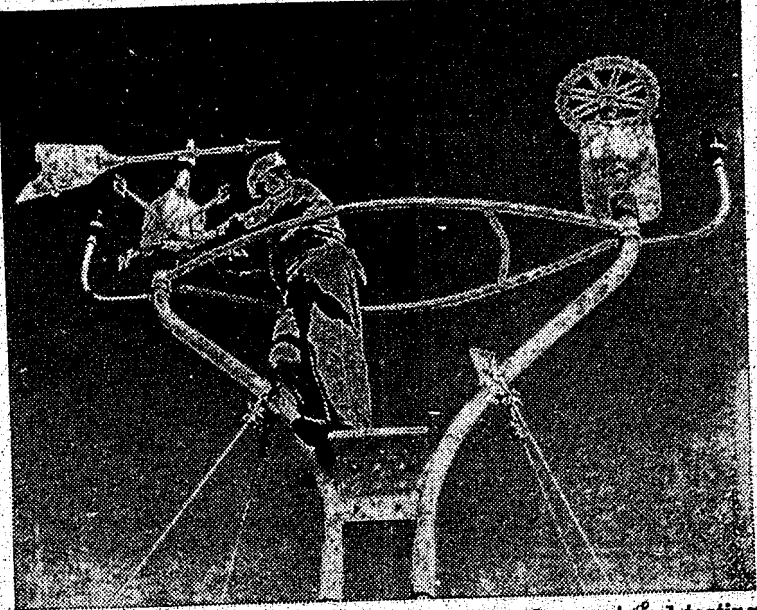

News From Michigan Bell

Although winter weather in Michigan this season generally was mild, damage to facilities of the Michigan Bell Telephone Company as a result of that weather was not.

Approximately \$750,000 worth of replacements and repairs were made during the past few months for lines, cables, and poles damaged by winter storms.

In most cases, telephone lines were back in working order within a few hours. Permanent repairs, however, sometimes required days of intensive effort under adverse conditions.

Scores of communities were isolated when long-distance lines buckled under the weight of ice or wind-blown objects. Local service was disrupted in many instances when "drop" wires leading from poles to homes similarly snapped.

Although winter damage this season was heavier than usual in Michigan, it compares with \$10,000,000 worth of damage to facilities of Western Bell System companies in the month of January alone.

Most of the havoc in Michigan was caused by four storms—a near hurricane in November, the most severe sleet storm in 12 years in December, and another hurricane and a less severe sleet storm in January.

From 10 to 45 communities were isolated during each storm. About

Michigan Bell emphasized that winter storm damage would have been considerably worse had it not carried out its usual "preventative maintenance" work last summer and fall.

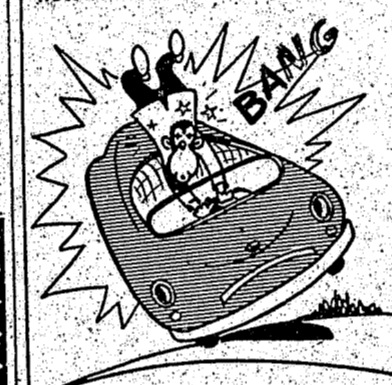
