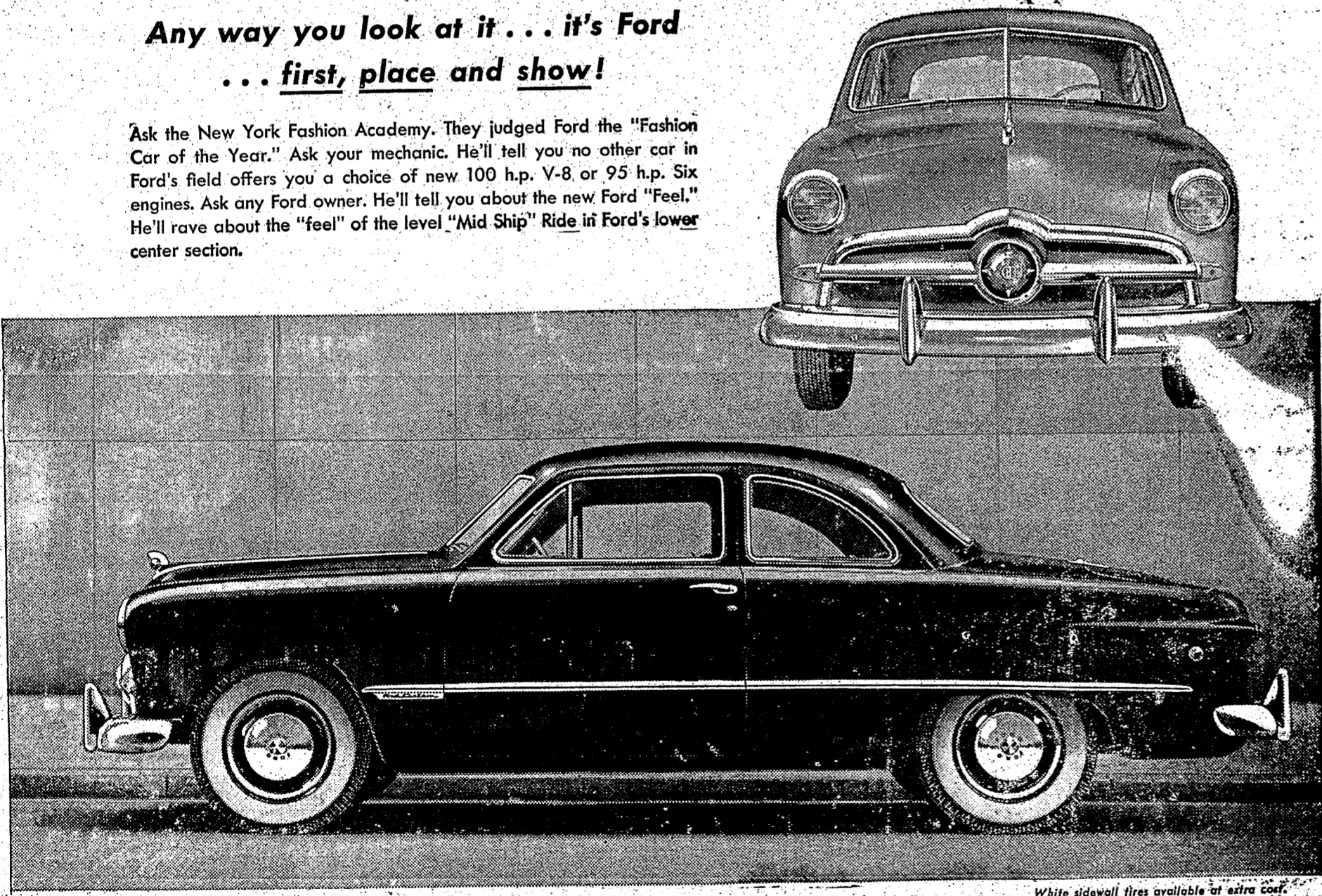

WOMAN ROCKING A CRADLE by Vincent VanGogh, Dutch.

In this canvas painted near the end of his career Van Gogh reveals the full power of color and design which was perhaps his greatest contribution to modern art.

THE BLUE VASE by Paul Czanne, French.

Cezanne is an important innovator whose influence on modern artists has been far-reaching. He studied the Old Masters and drew on them and his contemporaries, the Impressionists, to create his own individual method.

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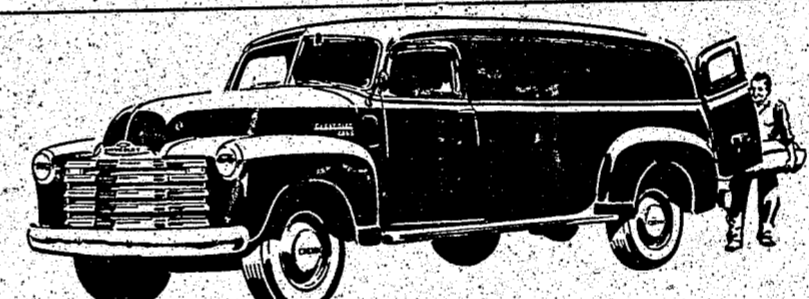

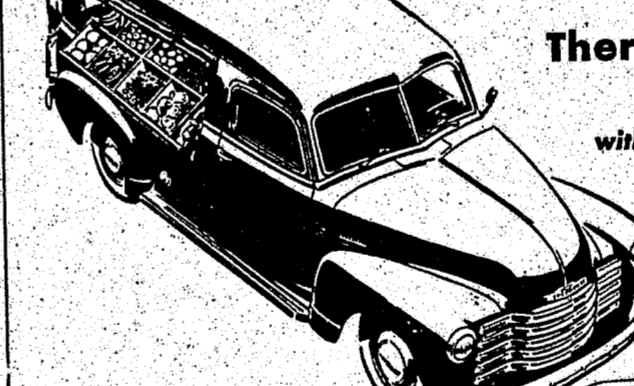

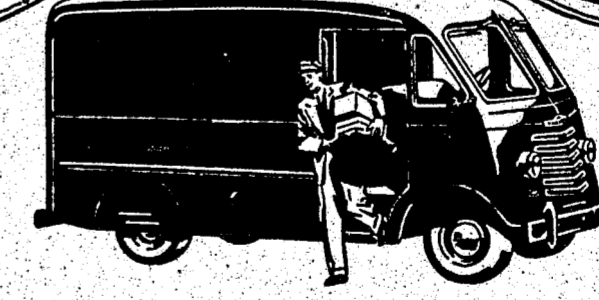

FROZEN APPLE PIE DELICIOUS IF YOU FOLLOW RULES
Warm apple pie for dessert can be on the menu on club day or any day in the week if you take advantage of your home freezer and put several in it at one time. Frozen apple pie is successful whether you bake it before you freeze it or afterward. It is more like fresh pie if baked afterwards. Wrap the prepared pies in moisture-vapor-proof cellophane. One caution comes from Mary Katherine Knight, frozen foods researcher at Michigan State College. To prevent apples from darkening while in the freezer you will need to treat them. This can be done in two ways -- you can sprinkle the fruit for each pie with two tablespoons of lemon juice or steam the sliced apples for three minutes and cool quickly. The apples are then ready to be placed in the pie.
Use your favorite apple pie recipe. Prepare firm, ripe apples and slice them thin. Paper pie plates with metal rims are convenient for freezing pies. If you freeze the pie before baking, do not cut the air vents until it is ready to bake. This helps protect the fruit and keep in the flavor.

Time is saved and the lower crust is less likely to be soggy when the pie is baked without thawing. You may need to put the pie nearer the bottom of the oven. If the pie is to be frozen after baking, cut air vents in the top crust and bake as usual. Cool, package and freeze. When you take the "cooked" pie from the freezer place it in a moderate oven (350 degrees) for 30 minutes.

SMELT WITH GRUBS ARE GOOD TO EAT
Don't throw away the smelt you catch, or buy, because you find grubs in them. Properly cooked, such smelt are good to eat.
That's the advice of Leonard N. Allison, fish pathologist of the conservation department's institute for fisheries research here. Says Allison: "We hope some day, grubs in fish may be recognized by the fisherman and his friends as causing no more harm to man when eaten in fish normally cooked than the sand we occasionally eat with spinach."
Many smelt dippers report finding grubs in fish taken this spring, particularly along the Lake Huron shore. Allison declares that "Grubs
