WOMAN ROCKING A CRADLI by Vincent VanGogh, Dutch.

In this canvas painted near the end of his career Van Gogh reveals the full power of color and design which was perhaps his greatest contribution to modern art. Starting as an Impressionist, he was influenced by the art of Japanese prints, and finally arrived at his conception of a picture as an arrangement of almost flat areas of color and tone. By pooling the broken hues of the Impressionists into a few large areas of almost primary intensity and by letting the warm and cool colors play powerfully against each other he reached a degree of chromatic intensity hitherto almost unknown in painting. His strongly textured brush strokes and frequent use of patterned areas serve to avoid effects of too stark a simplicity.
