Fourth of July weekend accidents took 63 lives in Michigan last year, 14 more than the previous year.

Traffic accidents, swimming and boating, and falls are the major dangers during the liberty-celebrating holiday, the Michigan Department of Health warns.

Last year 24 Michigan people lost their lives in automobile and motorcycle accidents over the Fourth; 23 in drowning and boating accidents; and 7 in falls. Two were killed in airplane accidents.
