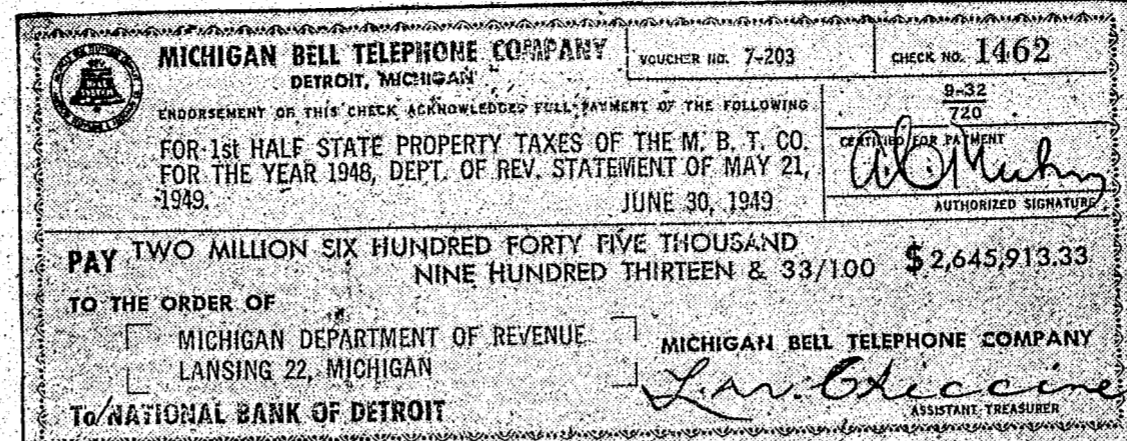

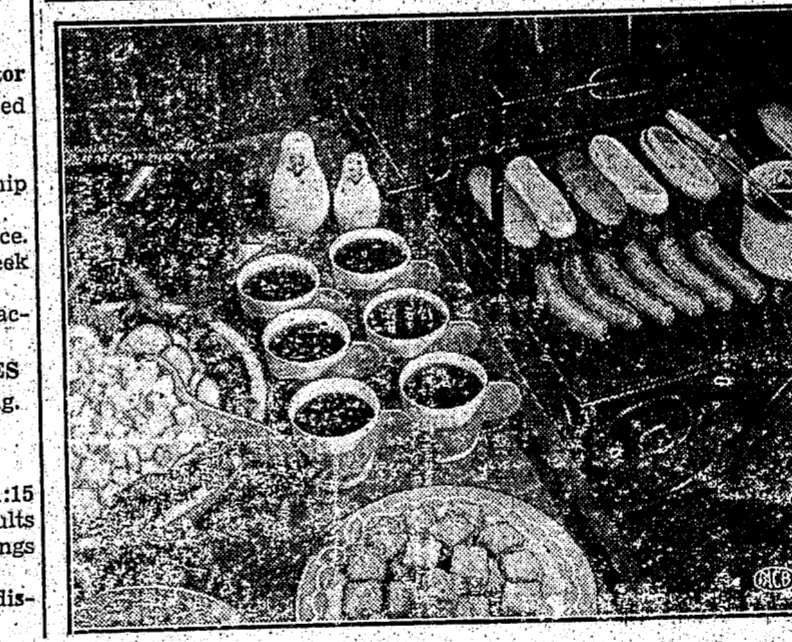

School's-Out Supper Cooked By You!



IT'S getting along toward the end of the school year, and high time for some fun! How about inviting the gang over to your house for something extra-special in the way of a backyard barbecue? (Just in case you don't happen to have a backyard, you can serve the same good-to-eats right on the front porch.)

Barbecued Frankfurters: 1 medium onion, sliced; 1/2 cup butter or margarine; 1 8-oz. can tomato sauce; 1 tablespoon Worcestershire sauce; Juice, 1/2 lemon; 1/2 lemon, thinly sliced; 1 teaspoon dry mustard. Separate onion slices into rings; cook in butter or margarine until soft. Add remaining ingredients; simmer 1/2 hour. Use to brush frankfurters as they are grilling. Serve frankfurters in toasted rolls with a little of the sauce. Yield: 8 servings.

Back-Yard Bar-B-Q Barbecued Frankfurters Toasted Rolls Potato, Cheese and Cucumber Salad Coffee Marshmallows Coffee. Sound good? Just wait 'til you taste the barbecue sauce and those coffee marshmallows! They'll convince your friends that you ought to have a genius rating in the cooking department. Everybody knows how to make potato salad, of course; but this delicious one is about half a pound of American cheese, cut in small cubes, and one cucumber, diced, but unpeeled. Heap the salad in a big bowl and garnish it with water-oress and cucumber slices. We'll tell you how to make the sauce and the marshmallows in a moment. But first, do you know how to make really good coffee to go with this super supper? Start with a shining-clean coffee-maker. Then, be sure of your measurements— one Standard Coffee Measure of coffee (two level measuring tablespoons) to each three-quarters of a measuring cup of water will give you a brew you can be proud of. Begin with freshly-drawn cold water; bring it to a full rolling boil; add the measured coffee.

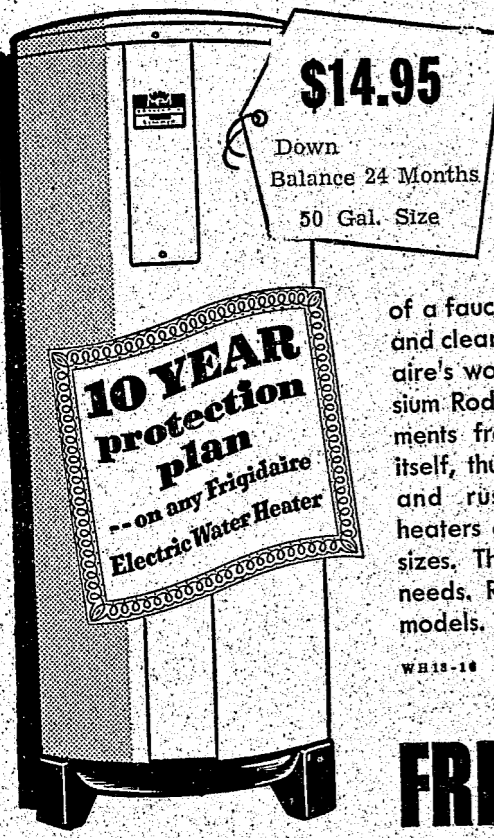

Cinnamon Bread Sandwiches



Thought for a backyard supper or a spur-of-the-moment picnic are flavorful sandwiches made with enriched cinnamon bread.

Because sandwiches are so popular for everyday meals as well as for picnics, make them with a variety of breads to keep them interesting.

Most people like cinnamon loaf, with its wonderful spicy taste. It contributes the same good food values provided by enriched white bread.

When making several sandwiches at a time, cream the butter or margarine slightly so that it will spread easily and go further. Spread butter or margarine to edges of bread, then apply filling with spatula and distribute it evenly over slice. Cover with another slice of bread and cut as desired. Sandwiches keep fresh for picnics or lunchboxes when wrapped and sealed in waxed paper or aluminum foil.

Here are suggested fillings for cinnamon bread: Mix an equal amount of raisins and peanut butter for a rich, crunchy filling. Fill with sliced American cheese or cheese spreads, which blend well with the cinnamon-flavored loaf. Slice thin apple wedges for filling, or spread slices with apple butter. Jams and jellies are also good.

FARM SAFETY WEEK PLANS SCHEDULED

National Farm Safety Week, to urge elimination of costly and unnecessary farm accidents, is to be observed from July 24 to 30 this year. Agricultural leaders are now planning to stress all phases of farm safety during the week to help cut the annual toll in lives, injuries and money.

ADVISE NITROGEN FOR ASPARAGUS, RHUBARB

An application of nitrogen fertilizer to asparagus and rhubarb is advisable now, says Jack Rose, Michigan State College horticulturist.

Harvest of asparagus should stop when growth appears to be weakening. The harvest season on both crops usually ends in late June.

The nitrogen fertilizer application following harvest will stimulate foliage growth. Next season's crop depends on food manufactured by the foliage growing this season.

Nitrogen can be applied to asparagus by using 300 pounds per acre of granular cyanamide or 400 to 500 pounds per acre of ammonium nitrate. The cyanamide is also effective in controlling weed growth. For home garden use, applications of 400 pounds per acre are the equivalent of about five pounds per 100 feet of row.

Cyanamide should not be used on rhubarb. Ammonium nitrate at the rate of 400 to 500 pounds per acre is recommended for this crop.

PLAN YOUR KITCHEN TO SAVE TIME AND STEPS

Now that hot weather is here homemakers are looking for short cuts to lighten housework. One simple device is to cut down needless motions and travel in the kitchen in doing tasks that you must do in spite of hot weather.

Think of your kitchen as having four work areas, suggests Josephine Lawyer, Home Demonstration Agent, and then be sure that the tools you need in each are located in that area. The areas are the sink, the mixing center, the stove and the serving center.

A check list for your storage of equipment is provided by Alice Thorpe, Home Management Department of Michigan State College. At the sink store saucepans, double boilers, colanders, strainers, funnels, brushes and small tools for cleaning, paring, slicing or dicing, measuring cups for liquids, dishwashing and clean-up equipment, garbage can and waste basket.

At the mixing center store measuring and mixing spoons, measuring cups, bowls, sifters, beaters, rolling, grinding and cutting tools and boards, casseroles and baking pans.

At the cooking center store skillets, griddles, covers, kettles, measuring, stirring, mashing, testing turning and curving tools, knife sharpener and cutting board.

At the serving center, store trays, electric pieces for coffee, toast and waffles, serving china, glassware and table accessories.

Keep frequently used items within easy reach to avoid needless stretching and stooping, with the heaviest of the pots and pans used daily at about elbow height. A few steps and motions saved here and there result in less tiredness at the end of the day and fewer hours spent in necessary household tasks.

BOB HOPE TO BE AT MICHIGAN STATE FAIR

Bob Hope will give two performances daily when he appears at the Centennial Michigan State Fair during the first three days. James D. Friel, general manager, announces the State Fair will be held Sept. 2 through 11.

Friel was jubilant in announcing the signing of Hope! "Getting Bob Hope as the opening entertainment attraction at our State Fair is a real scoop," he said. "You can't do better than Bob Hope. This is the first time he has ever played a fair of any kind. Everyone has been trying unsuccessfully for years to get Bob at our fairs."

"The fact that this is our 100th anniversary State Fair had a lot to do with Bob's decision. Another factor is that he likes Detroit and Michigan. He thinks he owes a lot to Michiganders."

Hope will give matinee and evening performances in the 10,000 capacity Coliseum where the shows during the fair will be billed "Hollywood on Parade". He will do his own act and then Emcee the remainder of the program which will include eight top vaudeville acts and other entertainment.

Friel said that the entertainment program for the entire fair will not only be the best ever held at a Michigan State Fair but, "will be the greatest array of diversified talent ever secured for any fair".

"We are not forgetting that the real purpose of the Michigan State Fair is to show the progress of the Michigan agriculture and industry. There is no reason why we can't do a good job of this and have excellent entertainment too". Friel previously announced the holding of a 100-mile big car AAA sanctioned automobile race to be held Sunday afternoon, Sept. 11, the closing day of the State Fair. Bill Holland, winner of this year's Indianapolis 500-mile, Memorial Day classic and many other leading drivers are entered.

The Michigan State Fair has won the National Oxford Sheep Show. This good news for sheep breeders to Michigan, one of the country's high ranking sheep states. Judging will be done September 8 at 9 a. m., by Don Pullin, of Waterloo, Iowa, one of the best judges in the country. There will be 21 classes offering \$2,000 dollars in prizes. All will be listed in this year's premium book. James D. Friel, state fair general manager, complimented four Michigan men who were

greatly responsible for obtaining the national show for the first time. They are Ivan Bursley, of Charlotte, George F. Gunn of Midland, George Merriman of Manchester and Harry B. Kelley of Hillsdale. Bursley and Gunn are members of the 7 man national board of the Oxford Association. Merriman is a State Fair Board member. Kelley, who has directed agricultural and livestock exhibits at the State Fair for the past 22 years will continue in that capacity.

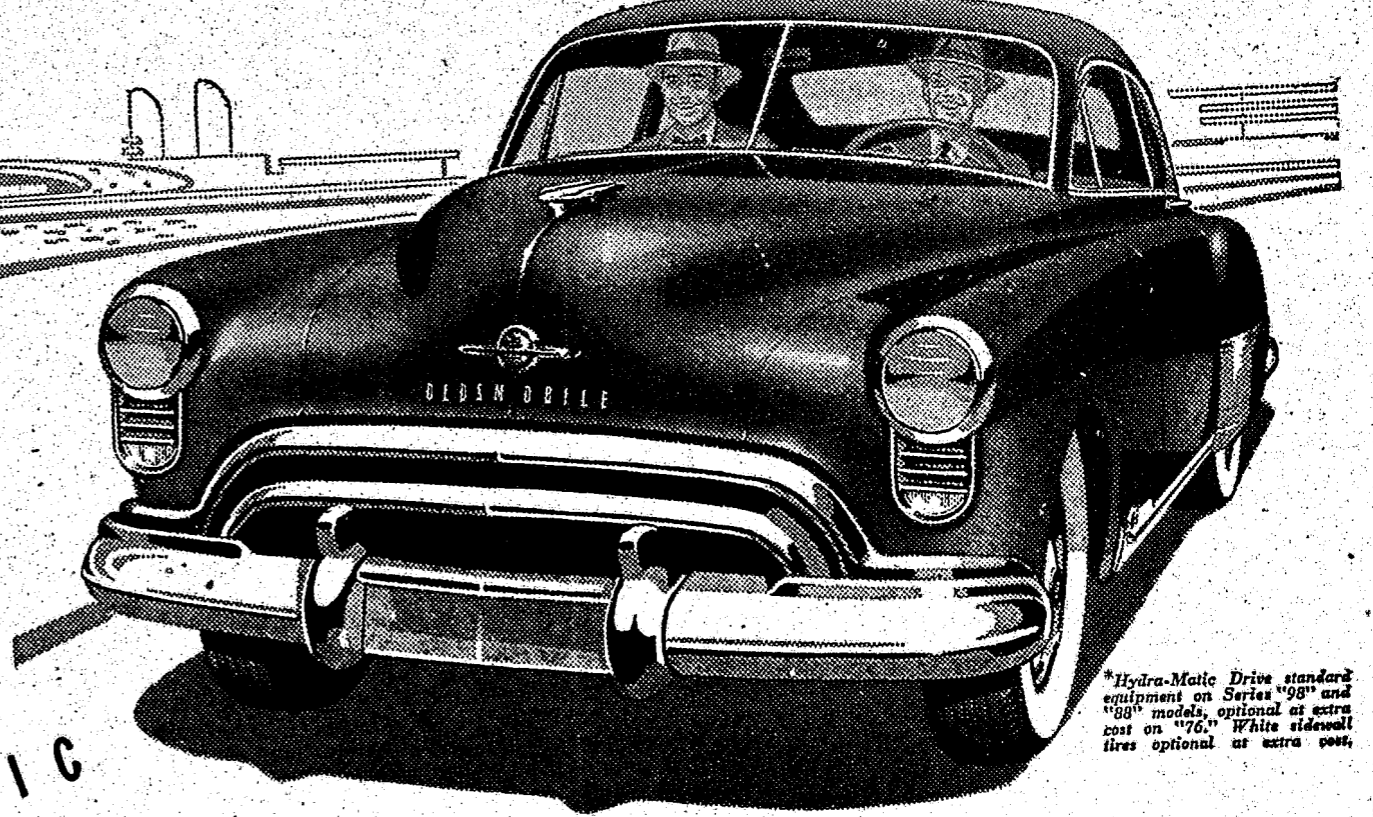

#### JULY 15 IS DATE FOR SHEEP MEET

Commercial sheep flock owners and purebred breeders will find much to interest them at the statewide sheep field day and type conference set for the Eaton county fairgrounds, Charlotte, on Friday, July 15.

Graydon Blanks, MSC extension sheep specialist, reports that each of the 19 recognized purebred breeds of sheep will be represented either in judging and type discussion or in a general breed discussion. Various types of replacement ewes for commercial flocks will be on exhibit and representative ewes and lambs from the high flocks in the Wolverine Lamb Production Project will also be on display.

A highlight of the program will be a parasite control demonstration conducted by Dr. Frank Thorp, Jr., MSC veterinarian. A demonstration with sheep dogs is also scheduled.

The event is a cooperative project sponsored by the Michigan Sheep Breeders' association, Eaton County Sheep Breeders' association, county agricultural agents, and the MSC animal husbandry department.

## Effective July 2— NEW LONG DISTANCE TELEPHONE RATES for calls within Michigan

INCREASED RATES for long distance telephone calls between Michigan points, effective July 2, 1949, have been authorized by the Michigan Public Service Commission.

Last December, Michigan Bell requested rate increases for both local telephone service and long distance service within Michigan so it might continue giving the kind of telephone service the people of Michigan demand.

The Public Service Commission's order provides only for that part of the application which requested an increase in long distance rates (including rates for teletypewriter exchange service messages) within the state. But it will provide urgently needed revenue until the Commission is able to finish its investigation of the complete request and rule on it.

HERE'S WHAT THE NEW RATES MEAN  
Initial-period rates for DAY STATION-TO-STATION calls are increased 5¢ to 15¢, depending on the distance.

Initial-period rates for NIGHT STATION-TO-STATION calls are increased 5¢ to 30¢, depending on the distance.

Initial-period rates for DAY PERSON-TO-PERSON calls are increased 5¢ to 30¢, depending on the distance.

Initial-period rates for NIGHT PERSON-TO-PERSON calls are increased 5¢ to 45¢, depending on the distance.

Rates for each additional minute, which are approximately 1/3 of the initial-period rate, are increased proportionately.

The initial period for 10¢ calls on the new rate schedule is 4 instead of 5 minutes; and for 20¢ calls, 3 instead of 4 minutes.

Rates for teletypewriter exchange service messages between Michigan points are increased proportionately.

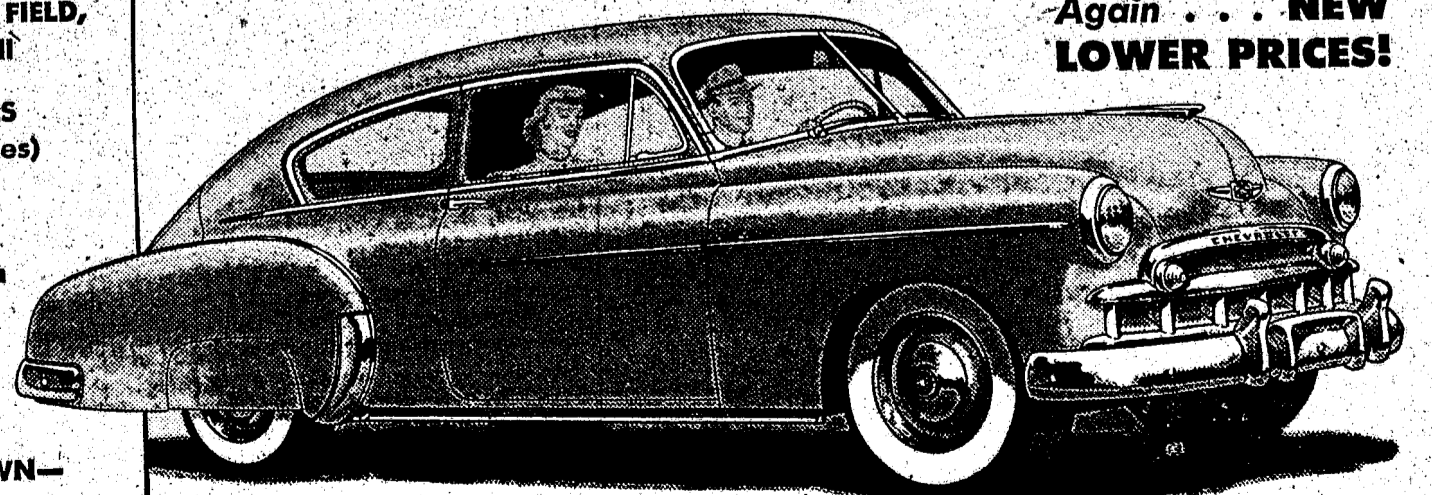

**GRAIN BINS NEED GOOD CLEANING**

Good housekeeping on the farm now means a thorough cleaning

of grain storage space, say agricultural specialists at Michigan State College.

They predict better results in protecting grain from damage by insects if bins are well cleaned. Insects can live over from crop to crop in cereal material that remains in emptied grain bins. They start trouble when newly harvest-

ed grain is stored. An empty bin should be the signal for housecleaning, the specialists advise. The earlier in the season it is done and the bins sprayed, the more hold-over insects remaining in the bins will be killed.

Physical cleaning of the emptied bin includes vigorous sweeping and any necessary scraping of walls, floor, and corners. Cracks and crevices need cleaning to get out old grain. Steel bins should be caulked to make them weather-proof and wooden bins repaired to make them tight as possible. Roofs should be waterproof.

Treatment with an insecticide helps to kill remaining insects. County agricultural agents can give advice about materials to use for this job. Thoroughness is needed and care should be used in the job.

**MAKE YOUR COTTONS LOOK FRESH LONGER**

A few laundering hints may be the secret to keeping your cotton dresses looking as they did when you first bought or made them. Clothing specialist at Michigan State College.

All that truly washable cottons require is warm water and a good laundry soap. Wash dark colored cottons alone or with other dark colors. This will prevent having unattractive lint spots on a dark cotton. If your cottons do not have a permanent crisp finish, a light starch solution will do wonders.

Rinse your cottons well because little soap particles make fabrics look scorched when ironed and tend to weaken the fibers. When hanging on the line, first shake out the dresses to remove large wrinkles and then pin by the hem at the side seams.

Good sprinkling means good ironing. One of the secrets of good ironing is knowing how much moisture to use. Too little moisture makes it difficult to remove wrinkles, while too much adds to the ironing time. A fine spray sprinkler top distributes the moisture evenly.

Always iron absolutely dry as you go along. This will keep the fabric from wrinkling and puckering at the seams. Avoid shine on dark cottons by ironing on the wrong side. Use a pressing cloth to touch up double thicknesses on the right side. Move the iron in unhurried rhythmic strokes so the heat will have time to work. Iron around buttons. To press a pocket turn the dress to the wrong side and press the pocket carefully. Go over the pockets on the right side, if necessary.

**IRRIGATION SERVES AS FROST PROTECTION**

Irrigation is being cited as a practical and economical method to prevent frost damage to crops in addition to serving as a protection against dry weather.

According to Jerry Mandigo, district horticultural agent in Berrien county, the strawberry growers there reported nearly 100 percent success against frost on those crops kept covered by sprinkler irrigation systems this spring.

From data collected by these growers on freezing nights, it was found that temperatures inside the irrigation systems were about five degrees higher than those outside the irrigation. When the temperature rose above the freezing point, there was a slower rise in temperature inside the irrigation; thus protecting against injury from too warm a morning following a freeze.

The growers found the following factors seemed to give the best results in the irrigation operation according to MSC horticulturists:

1. The water should be turned on when the falling temperature reaches about 33 degrees.
2. Six to 10 gallons per minute per sprinkler head is the most favorable rate of operation. Regular sprinkler nozzles can be used by plugging large opening and putting proper sized disc in small opening.
3. Water can be shut off when temperature is rising and reaches 29 degrees. The pipe should not

be moved to new locations during the night.
