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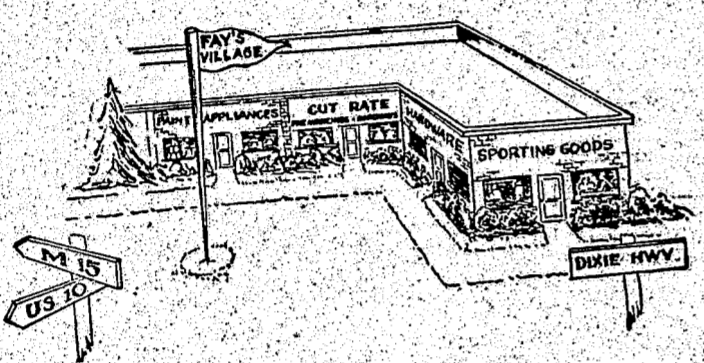

 Section 1. Definitions. Clause (a)

The terms "hawkers" and "peddlers" indicate those who go about from place to place selling, or offering for sale goods, wares, merchandise of all kinds, traveling on foot or in vehicles and selling from house to house, or crying their wares from the street. The term shall also include those who sell by taking orders for goods from samples, lists, or catalogues. . . .
 Section 2. That no person, persons, company or corporation shall engage in carrying on or conducting any of the following trades, occupations, or business within the limits of said Village without first obtaining a license therefor from the Village Clerk of said Village who is hereby authorized to issue the same for which license there shall be paid by the person or party to whom said license is issued the amount mentioned in this section.
 Clause (a) For the business or occupation of hawking, selling or peddling goods, wares or merchandise or refreshments on the streets, or from house to house, \$1.00 per day, for the first six consecutive days and \$1.00 per day for each day thereafter, or \$25.00 for a month. There shall be an additional fee of \$1.00 per day for extra helper assisting the licensee.
 Clause (b) For the business of hawking, selling, or canvassing for any goods, wares, merchandise, books, or other copy, by prospectus, sample or catalogue, \$3.00 per day for the first six days, and \$1.00 per day thereafter, or \$25.00 per month. No half-day license shall be granted except by permission of the Council.
 Clause (c) For the business of selling goods, wares, merchandise or other chattels, or for the carrying on of any business upon the street, public places, or in any building or upon any premises within said Village by itinerant or transient traders or dealers, which shall be held to include all persons or parties who shall be engaged in selling goods, wares, or merchandise or other chattels, or the carrying on of any business in said Village who are not on the tax rolls of said Village, and shall include also all persons, firms, or corporations who shall bring into said Village any such goods, wares, or merchandise or other chattels for the purpose of carrying on a temporary business, and who offers the same for sale at retail to the public, and any person, persons, firm, association or corporation who commences such a business after assessment rolls are completed and filed in each year, and who are not assessed on the tax roll for the then current year, the license fee to be paid shall not be less than \$5.00 or more than \$100.00 for any part of the fiscal year. . . .
 Section 3. This Ordinance shall not be construed to prohibit the sale without license of fuel, food, or feed for man or beast, provided that such fuel, food or feed is produced by the labor of the person selling, or offering for sale or by any member of his family nor to any mechanic of this state who shall sell or offer for sale any article of his own manufacture, not to any wholesale merchant nor his agent in selling by sample to retail dealers, nor to veterans who carry a proper state license.
 Section 4. The Council may in its discretion, depending upon the nature and permanency of said business, require the whole or any part of the license fee paid in advance thereof.
 Section 5. In case the object for which the license is sought shall be a worthy one which may be properly encouraged, the President and the Village Clerk may at their discretion grant a license therefor free of charge.
 Section 6. The provisions of this Ordinance shall apply to all persons who are in actual charge of such stocks of goods, wares, merchandise or chattels, or who make sale therefrom within the Village of Clarkston.
 Section 7. Every violation of or failure to comply with the provisions of this Ordinance shall be punished by a fine not exceeding one hundred dollars and the costs of such prosecution, and in the imposition of such fines, the court may make a further sentence that the offender, on failure to pay such fine, be imprisoned in the County Jail of Oakland county until same be paid, not exceeding the period of ninety days.
 Section 8. It shall be unlawful for hawker or peddler or transient merchant to park a cart, vehicle or automobile anywhere on the streets or sidewalks of this Village while in the act of selling their wares or produce from said cart, vehicle, or automobile except while in the act of peddling from house to house.
 Section 9. This Ordinance shall take effect immediately after its final passage, and upon publication thereof.
 Section 10. This ordinance repeals ordinance No. 4.

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STUDY ROUGH LAND FARMING SUCCESS

Rough land in southern Michigan has long been considered a farming risk but a new Michigan State College bulletin tells of ways many operators have solved their farming problems.

VILLAGE ORDINANCE NO. 42 An Ordinance to regulate and license circuses, menageries, street carnivals, amusement parks, plays, games, outdoor theatrical exhibitions, vocal or instrumental concerts, exhibits of natural or artificial curiosities, outside shows of any kind.

Section 1. No person, persons, firm or corporation shall exhibit or maintain in the Village of Clarkston any circuses, menageries, street carnival, amusement park, play, game or theatrical exhibition or give any concert, vocal or instrumental, or exhibit any natural or artificial curiosity or give an outdoor show of any kind for which any fee is demanded or received, without a license from the president

subject to the approval of Council; and for every license granted shall pay the license fee hereinafter specified. Section 2. The license fee upon a license for any circus, menagerie, street carnival, amusement park, play, game, outside theatrical exhibition or any concert, vocal or instrumental, or exhibition of any natural or artificial curiosity or outdoor show of any kind shall be twenty dollars for the first day upon which any such form of entertainment shall occur and ten dollars for each subsequent day.

Section 10. No intoxicating liquors shall be sold or drunk on the premises licensed hereunder. No persons under the influence of intoxicating liquors shall be permitted to frequent, be in, or remain on said premises. No persons of low repute shall be allowed to frequent such premises. Such licensed premises shall not be conducted in such a manner as to be generally reputed, in the immediate vicinity thereof, to be immoral and a menace to the morals and good citizenship of the community.

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MIGHTY MICHIGAN LEADER IN AGRICULTURE AND INDUSTRY

Section 4. The president of the Village is hereby empowered to issue any license permitted under the terms of this ordinance, subject to terms and conditions hereinafter recited, subject to approval of Council. Section 5. Before any license shall be granted under any section of this ordinance there shall be deposited by the applicant for such license with the Clerk of the Village of Clarkston a cash bond of no more than five hundred (\$500.00) dollars, conditioned that no damages shall be done to the streets, sewers, trees or adjoining property and that no act, paper, litter or other debris will be permitted to remain upon the streets or upon any private property by such license and conditioned further for the faithful observance of this ordinance and the charter and ordinances of the Village, and containing such other conditions as the Village Council of the Village of Clarkston may require. The Village Council shall fix the amount of said bond up to five hundred (\$500.00) dollars, depending upon the nature and extent of the property equipment of such applicant, the length of haul and other pertinent facts.

Section 6. The application for any such license shall be made by petition in writing not less than 3 weeks prior to opening day of such a concession by the owner or owners of such amusement or enterprise or by their lawful agents, said petition to contain and be accompanied by certain statements, recitations and documentary evidence hereinafter set forth. Section 7. Any application for any such license shall contain the name of the owner or owners of the business or enterprise, their residence and business address, the nature and type of entertainment or exhibition, and a record of their appearances in other localities for past year or letters of approval from past performances.

Section 8. This ordinance shall not extend to any exhibitions by the pupils of any private or public school, or any musical entertainment given by members and for the benefit of any resident musical society, or to any exhibition of painting, engraving, sculpture or fine art, executed by a citizen of Clarkston, or any concert or musical entertainment, fair, festival or lecture for the benefit of any church or benevolent object, or to any other legitimate form of outdoor entertainment conducted by any church or resident benevolent association not organized for profit, whereby the proceeds of such amusement are devoted exclusively to the benefit of such church or benevolent association. Provided a license is applied for and approved by the Village Council of the Village of Clarkston which may be issued without charge. Section 9. Places of amusement licensed under the provisions of this ordinance shall be closed to the public

from midnight until nine o'clock the following forenoon and from midnight Saturday to nine o'clock a. m. Monday. Quiet and good order shall be maintained upon the premises and adjacent streets, and no person or persons shall be permitted to loiter or stand in or about the doorway in front of said premises. Section 10. No intoxicating liquors shall be sold or drunk on the premises licensed hereunder. No persons under the influence of intoxicating liquors shall be permitted to frequent, be in, or remain on said premises. No persons of low repute shall be allowed to frequent such premises. Such licensed premises shall not be conducted in such a manner as to be generally reputed, in the immediate vicinity thereof, to be immoral and a menace to the morals and good citizenship of the community.

Section 11. Every person or company operating under this ordinance and in whose place or amusement or exhibition shall be displayed moving pictures of any character, said or description shall present the pictures, films, or plates, so sought to be displayed to the Chief of Police for his inspection, said Chief of Police is hereby authorized and it is hereby made his duty to inspect, or cause to be inspected, said pictures, plates, or films and if in his judgment they are indecent or immoral, he shall reject the same, and notify the person or company operating the place of amusement or exhibition from whom said pictures, films were received, that the same cannot be used; and the person or company using them after they have been rejected by the Chief of Police shall be punished as hereinafter provided.

Section 12. Any license for the foregoing amusements, exhibitions and enterprises before becoming effective, shall be approved by the Chief of Police, the Commissioner of Health and the Chief of the Village Fire Department. Section 13. Any violation of this ordinance shall be cause for the revocation of any license issued, and shall be punished by a fine not to exceed the sum of One hundred (\$100.00) dollars, or by imprisonment for a period not exceeding ninety (90) days, or both such fine and imprisonment in the discretion of the court.

Section 14. Should any provision, section or subsection of this ordinance be held to be invalid for any reason, such holdings shall not be construed as affecting the validity of any remaining portion of such section, subsection or sentence of this ordinance, it being the intent that this ordinance shall stand notwithstanding the invalidity of such provision, section, subsection or sentence. Section 15. This ordinance repeals Ordinance No. 5. This ordinance shall take effect twenty (20) days from and after the day of its passage. Made and passed this 8th day of August, A. D. 1949. 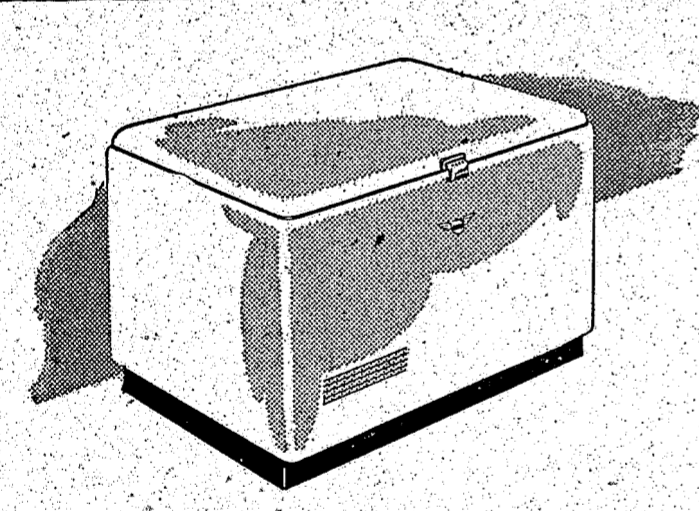

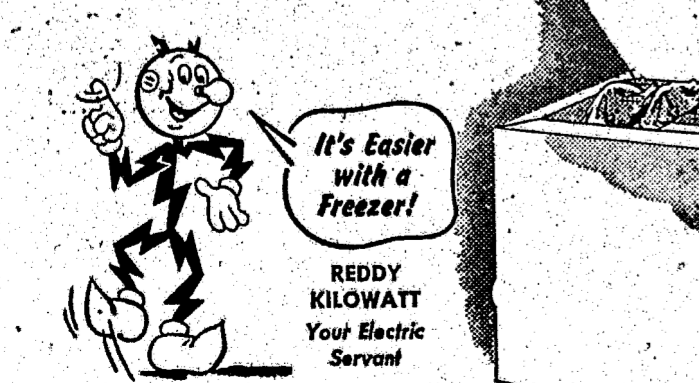

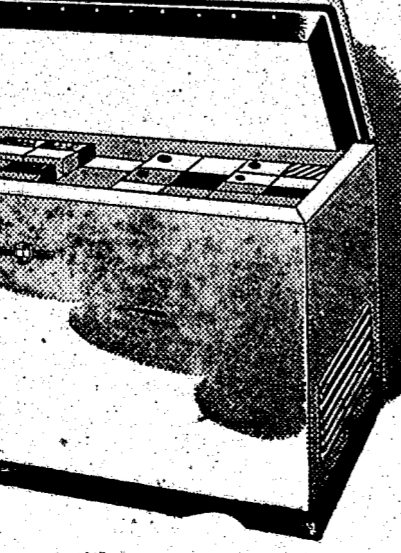

HOMEMADE ELECTRIC FENCES CARRY RISK

You're taking a big risk if you use homemade electric fence equipment on the farm, warns Robert Maddex, Michigan State College agricultural engineer.

Each year, the newspapers report cases of death and injuries to humans and stock caused by electric fences constructed by farmers to operate from the ordinary lighting circuit.

Farmers who make these fences often believe that they are saving money both from the amount of fence needed and the cost of purchasing an approved fence controller. The farmers who use these

fences believe them safe because they arrange to have the current flow through a light bulb of low wattage. This continuous current does not give the needed warning sting but rather gives a paralyzing shock that may keep the victim from pulling away from the wire. Serious burns or electrocution may result.

A good electric fence saves time labor, and materials. Maddex states, but the controller should be of an approved type. The controllers which bear an approval give only a warning sting which causes the person or animal touching them to pull away immediately.

Maddex advises purchase only a fence controller that has been constructed to give good dependable service with no danger to animals or people. Constructing a homemade controller may mean that you are making a death trap on your farm.

In picking a livestock program for the farm, consider (1) feed supply (2) labor available (3) capital, equipment and buildings (4) your own special ability in handling particular types of livestock.

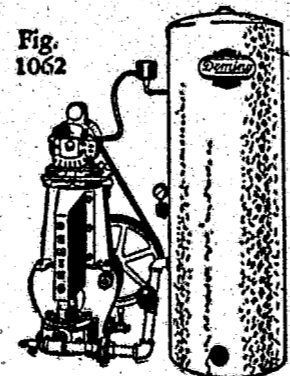

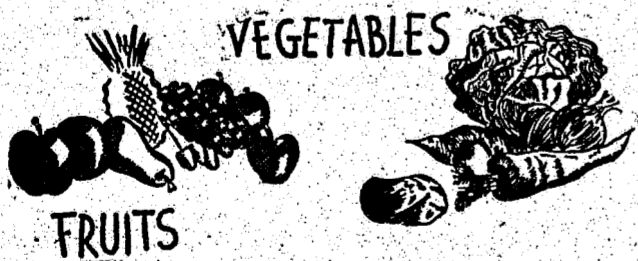
