Each year the Michigan State

College Entomology Department determines at what date the last eggs of the Hessian fly are laid for the spring brood. This year Mr. Ray Janes, Extension Entomologist has set the date as September 16. Mr. Janes says that the Hessian fly lays its eggs on the blades of new wheat in the fall. This brood winters in the wheat, emerges the following spring and the spring hatch is the one that causes the damage to the wheat.

WATCH OUT FOR KIDS

There will be a million of them on the way to school next week. Superintendent of Public Instruction, Dr. Lee M. Thurston, today announced the launching of a Child Safety Program for the month of September.

"Nearly 4,500 school children were killed or injured in pedestrian and bicycle accidents in Michigan last year", he said.

Dr. Thurston emphasized the fact that with the reopening of schools over 1 million children once more will be crossing the



street. Tens of thousands of them will be crossing the street on the way to and from school for the first time.

The September Child Safety Program is sponsored by the Michigan State Safety Commission, of which the State Department of Public Instruction is a member and its 69 Member Advisory Committee. The Commission has conducted a series of 9 zone meetings throughout the state at which the program was presented to law enforcement, school and safety officials. Over 200 communities and over 300 law enforcement agencies will participate in the program.

Michigan will invite a law enforcement officer to participate in its safety program," Dr. Thurston said.

The schools of Michigan, with the cooperation of the safety agencies, are doing one of the best jobs in the country of teaching children to walk safely. But even the best trained child is apt to forget, especially in September when they have been away from their teachers for three months. Thus, all drivers should adopt the slogan "Watch Out for Kids".

Nearly 9,000 parents had their homes saddened by traffic accidents to their children last year. I appeal particularly to the parents in Michigan to support this program. "Remember, the next saddened home may be your own".

Dr. Thurston expressed appreciation for the assistance being given to the public educational part of the program by the Michigan Oil Industry Public Information Committee. The oil industry is contributing 127 outdoor advertising billboards, 3,700 posters in filling stations, 50,000 leaflets, 400 street car and bus posters and over 100,000 safety buttons for children, all carrying the message "Watch Out for Kids".

STORY OF BEANS SPOTLIGHTED AT MICHIGAN FAIR

Michigan beans will be spotlighted in the agricultural exhibit at the Michigan State Fair at Detroit, September 2 to 11, according to H. R. Pettigrove, Michigan State College farm crops specialist.

The story of Michigan beans, how varieties are developed, cultural practices required to grow them, how harvested, processed and packed will be told in the exhibit. A feature will be a demonstration of the electric eye grader which sorts good beans from defective ones.

The exhibit, in the agricultural building, is a cooperative effort by many groups including the Michigan Department of Agriculture, Michigan State College, Michigan Bean Shippers association, elevators, growers and processors of the famed Michigan product.

Small cups of baked beans will be served each day with the principal bean growing counties each being responsible for distributing one of the days. County "bean queens" will attend on the day the counties are in charge.

Awards are being offered to farm or city women who can provide the best and most unusual bean dish with recipe.

Pettigrove pointed out that it is planned to feature one of Michigan's principal agricultural crops each year in the agricultural exhibit. Last year potatoes were spotlighted.

GOOD EXAMPLES IMPORTANT TO CHILDREN'S DIETS

"When your child is learning to eat solid foods probably the hardest thing you have to do is keep from over-anxiety and urging. Think how you would feel if someone were to sit tense and anxious throughout your meals urging you to try this or that or to eat all of this or that."

Winston Osborn, home economist at Michigan State College, emphasizes the importance of a good example in getting your children to eat well-balanced meals.

Food dislikes have many sources but the earliest and most difficult to overcome are those acquired at the family dinner table. A recent study showed that 35 percent of food dislikes could be traced to similar dislikes of members of the family. Children are the world's best imitators although at the same time they are going all out for individuality.

Young children tend to follow the example of older ones both at home and at school. So another influence you have to watch is that of your child's friends and schoolmates, the home economist contends.

The old saying that forbidden fruit is always sweetest certainly applies to food habits. Much as we would like to remove the temptation of too many sweets from our children, it is unwise to make a definite issue of it since it often has the opposite effect, she reports.

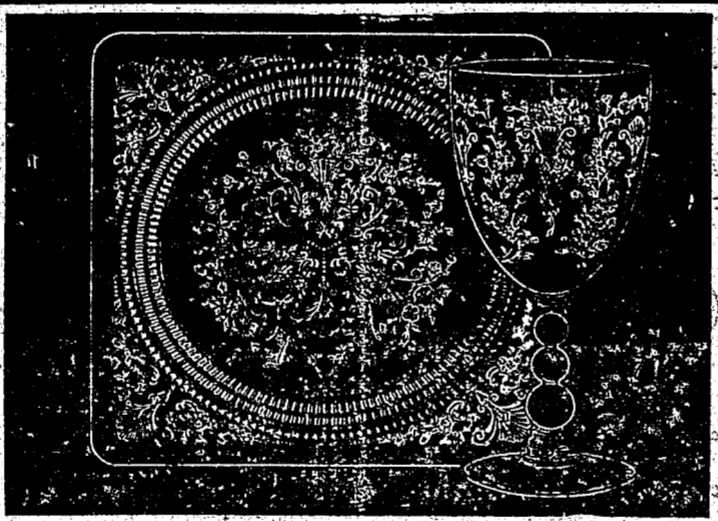
The wisest solution to this problem is to build up good food habits from pre-school days — the rights foods, regular meals, pleasant surrounding and sociability and good example. Miss Osborn believes the well-fed child has less inclination to go on sweet sprees and a craving of sweets is often found in children whose diets are poor.

AT MSC ACCREDITED JOURNALISM SCHOOL

The department of journalism of Michigan State College has received national accreditation by the American Council on Education for Journalism, it was announced recently.

Approval of the department came as the result of a three-year investigation into the quality of journalism instruction in colleges and universities all over the U. S. MSC thus becomes one of 38 major universities recognized by the ACEJ for its journalism curriculum.

Recognition came after a committee, headed by Earl English of the University of Missouri, visited the campus April 18-19.



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WOMAN WILLS MSC ESTATE OF \$74,203.80

Michigan State College has received a gift of \$74,203.80 from the estate of Mrs. Eliza Erb, Buffalo, N. Y. Mrs. Erb, who died in 1946, was a former resident of Waterford, Michigan.

The estate was among \$83,353.80 in gifts and grants accepted by the State Board of Agriculture Aug. 16, according to Karl H. McDonel, secretary.

Mrs. Erb's will specified that the money is to be used to establish scholarships honoring her father and mother, Nelson R. and Anna Ganong, former residents of Waterford. One boy and one girl from Oakland county are to be selected each year for the scholar-

ships on the basis of character and leadership, together with literary and scholastic or artistic ability and attainments.

ADVISES KILLING GRASS HOPPERS YET THIS FALL

It's still the time to kill grasshoppers, although the 1949 crop season is nearing an end. Dr. Ray James, Michigan State College extension entomologist, warns that there's another year ahead and the more 'hoppers killed this fall the fewer there will be to lay eggs for the 1950 hatch.

Following a survey of the state, James reports infestations very spotted. Where crops are cultivated, damage was not extensive,

But near marginal and out-over areas there has been greater damage.

Farmers in areas where second cutting of alfalfa has been allowed to seed report heavy infestation. He advises spraying with chlordane or toxaphene to keep the grasshoppers from damaging the seed crop.

In pasture areas where vegetation is not heavy, James believes the use of poison bait has been most effective and it is definitely less expensive than spraying if the area to be controlled is large. Where vegetation is heavy, spraying is more practical. Whether you spray or bait he advises killing the hoppers yet this summer and fall to prevent a heavy crop in 1950.

NAVAL RESEARCH UNIT ORGANIZED AT MSC

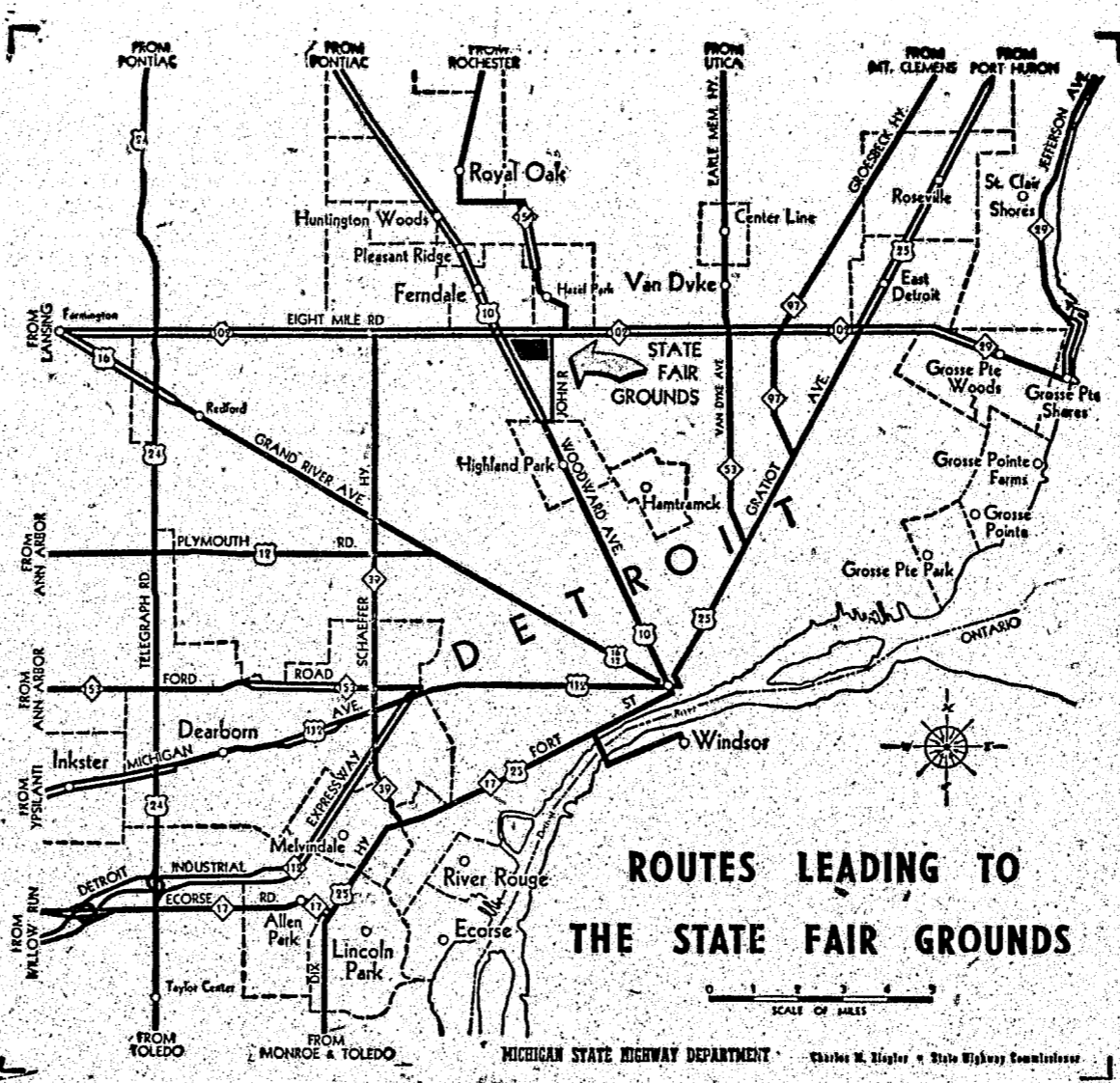
A volunteer naval research unit has been formed at Michigan State College with Elbert S. Churchill, MSC bacteriologist, named unit commander.

The unit, under direction of the Federal Office of Naval Research, is composed of former naval officers now engaged in research and teaching at the college.

"Members hope to utilize their experience and training in promotion of experimentation and research materials" that would in turn be made available to ONR and other research units in the U. S.," Churchill said.

MSC WORKSHOPERS APPROVE MICHIGAN ECONOMIC COUNCIL

Members of Michigan State College's first Economic Workshop ended their three-weekend course August 19, after voting unanimously to set up a Michigan Council for Economic Education. They elected Austin F. Bates, superintendent of Clare public schools, head of a 12-man organizing committee.

The council will be patterned after the national Joint Council for Economic Education which has sponsored similar economic workshops throughout the nation during the past two years.

"Whole purpose of the workshop and new council," said Bates, "is to bring our critical economic problems to the level of the man in the street."

He pointed out three functions the council will carry out: (1) to act as a clearing house of information to be used in Michigan schools and communities; (2) to supervise publications which will point up vital economic information to Michigan school teachers and community leaders; and (3) to act as a consultant service in assisting lay leaders in organizing local meetings and workshops.

INDUSTRIAL ENGINEERS WILL MEET AT MSC

The first annual Industrial Engineering Conference will be held September 12-16 at Michigan State College, according to J. M. Apple, associate professor of mechanical engineering, and co-director of the conference.

The conference, titled "Reducing Production Costs Through Industrial Engineering," is designed to enable supervisory, staff and executive personnel to study interest areas as related to their specific jobs.

"Latest techniques of industrial engineering will be studied through lectures and seminars conducted by top men in industry and members of MSC's mechanical engineering faculty," Prof. Apple said.

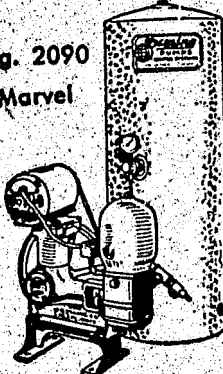
