

A volunteer naval research unit has been formed at Michigan State College with Elbert S. Churchill, MSC bacteriologist, named unit commander.


The unit, under direction of the Federal Office of Naval Research, is composed of former naval officers now engaged in reasearch and teaching at the college.

"Members hope to utilize their experience and fraining in promotion of experimentation and research materials that would in turn be made available to ONR and other research units in the U. S.," Churchill said.






