Phone Users To Get New District Service

All telephone numbers in Clarkston and seven other nearby communities will be changed late this year and early next in preparation for the inauguration of district exchange service in January, it was announced today by Robert E. Poll, manager here for the Michigan Bell Telephone Company.

The outstanding number change will be the addition of a central numerals. Clarkston numbers will be preceded by the name "MAple": Other exchanges involved in the hange of numbers and their new

central office name are Pontiac, FEderal; Commerce, EMpire, Drayton Plains, ORlando; Lake Orion, MYrtle; Longacre, MAyfair; Oxford, OAkland; Rochester,

Telephone users will dial the first two letters of the name, then all numerals. New numbers in Pontiac, Com-

merce, Drayton Plains, and the several communities which made up the Longacre exchange, will become effective on December 3. All other changes will become effective simultaneously with the tertainment; Marjorie Billingsley, cutover in January, the exact date daughter's wedding a dress of blue to be announced later.

"It is necessary to change all telephone numbers in the proposed district exchange and adjacent zones such as Longacre in order to establish a uniform seven-digit numbering system," Poll said.

With a uniform numbering system, subscribers in the Pontiac metropolitan area eventually will be able to dial all other subscribers in their extended calling area directly without the assistance of an operator

Poll pointed out that the central office names had been selected after a great, deal of study and Betty Steele and Mrs. Fosdick. testing. The names must be easily remembered, their spelling commonly known, and the dial signals they represent be mechanically correct in relation to all other prefixes.

All new numbers will be included in new extended-area telephone directories to be distributed shortly before the changes.

Clarkston telephone numbers now consist of four digits. These merely will receive a prefix consisting of the central office name and the numeral "5". For exwill become MAple 5-2345. It is sang "I Love You Truly" and the same type of numbering sysand Grand Rapids areas.

District exchange service is a part of Michigan Bell's state wide. extended-area plan which permits telephone users in adjacent exchanges to call each other directly and without toll charges.

It also sets up a system of "message unit" charges for calls to zones within the district exchange not adjacent to each other. This system results in lower charges than if regular toll rates were to apply. The plan was approved by the State Public Service Commission last year. At that time, the commission called the extended-area

looking service." Eventually, the Pontiac district exchange will consist of Pontlac (including Auburn Heights), Clarkston, Commerce, Drayton Plains, Lake Orion, Oxford, Rochester and Walled Lake. Certain of these zones will be able to call the adjacent exchanges of Birmingham, Longacre, Big Beaver,

Utica, Washington and Farmington without toll charge. Under the district exchange plan Clarkston will have extended calling area permitting toll-free calls to Pontiac, Drayton Plains, Oxford, Lake Orion, and Commerce.
