

SOIL CONSERVATION NEWS

Reed's Canary Grass is a hardy, coarse, leafy perennial grass which tends to grow in dense bunches and spreads underground by creeping root stalks. It makes its best growth on fertile, moist swampy soils and is especially suited to swampy locations or

lands which frequently overflow. An early spring seeding is preferred along with a generous appli cation of from 300 to 400 pounds of an 0-9-27 fertilizer. In event that you were unable to plant your Reed's Canary Grass last spring or early this fall, late fall seedings can be made at this time and the seed will not start germination and growth until early next spring. Reed's Canary Grass should be sown from four to six pounds per acre. New seeding should not be pastured or cut the first season because the plants establish themselves slowly.
