### Funeral Tuesday For Dr. Eugene Allen

The Reverend Eugene Allen, D. D., retired member of the Detroit Methodist Conference, died at his home in Clarkston Saturday November 5th, of coronary thrombosis.

Dr. Allen was born at Addison, Michigan, December 12, 1869, the son of Reverend Charles T. Allen and Elnora Root Allen. He attended the Public Schools of Detroit and Pontiac and graduated from Albion College in 1895. In 1893 he married Minnie McKeand at Pontiac, she died in 1942. In 1944 he married Charlene Robbins Letts of Owosso who died in 1947.

In the active ministry for 37 years Dr. Allen served churches in Burlington and Cedar Falls, Iowa, and Anderson, Indiana. His Michigan pastorates included First Church, Birmingham; Preston, Detroit; Ypsilanti and Owosso.

He was a member of Delta Tau Delta fraternity and an honorary member of Rotary.

Surviving are his daughter, Mrs. William Vliet, Clarkston, with whom he made his home, a son, Edward Eugene Allen, of Akron, New York, and two grandsons, Edward Jr. and James Allen.

His twin brother the Reverend Clarence E. Allen, D. D. died in 1942.

The funeral service was held at the Sharpe Funeral Home in Clarkston on Tuesday at 2 p. m., with the Rev. Walter C. B. Saxon officiating.

Burial was in Highland cemetery, Ypsilanti and the service at the grave was conducted by Dr. William Clyde Donald of the First Methodist Church of that city.

Bearers were Harold Letts and Evan Clark of Owosso, George Elliott, Wallace Ridgley, Robert Jones and Lloyd Megee.

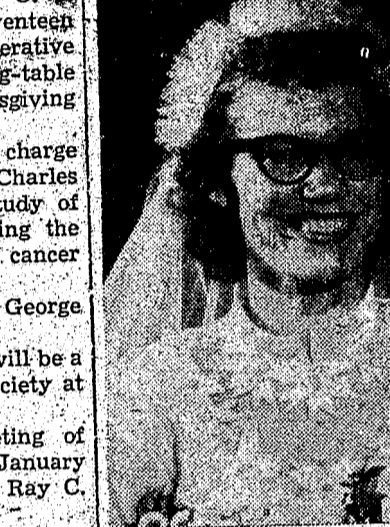
Mrs. Campbell wished to add to the beauty of Clarkston in a living memorial in appreciation for the many kindnesses extended to her by the people of Clarkston.

### Principals Meet College Freshmen

University of Michigan Freshmen — about 1,400 of them — will meet with their former high school principals Thursday morning, Nov. 10th, to talk over problems of college adjustment.

The event which provides the opportunity is the University's 21 annual Principal-Freshman Conference, which will draw principals of 138 Michigan high schools to the campus. Fourteen high schools in four other states, Illinois, Indiana, Ohio, and New York, will also be represented. Deans of nine Michigan junior colleges will be present to interview former students who have transferred to the University.

The first such conference was held in 1927, when, on the invitation of Ira M. Smith, Registrar of the University, 14 principals of Detroit high schools came to Ann Arbor to confer with their graduates registered in the current freshman class. The experiment proved successful. The following year, the other principals in the state were included in the invitation list. Each year has seen an increased attendance. Other universities and colleges in Michigan and in other states have now adopted the idea and hold similar conferences.

At a luncheon Thursday noon for the visiting principals, Dean Hayward Keniston of the College of Literature, Science and the Arts will speak on "Common Goals for Schools and Colleges."

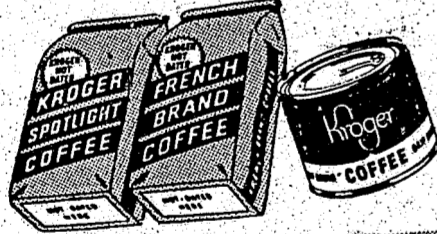

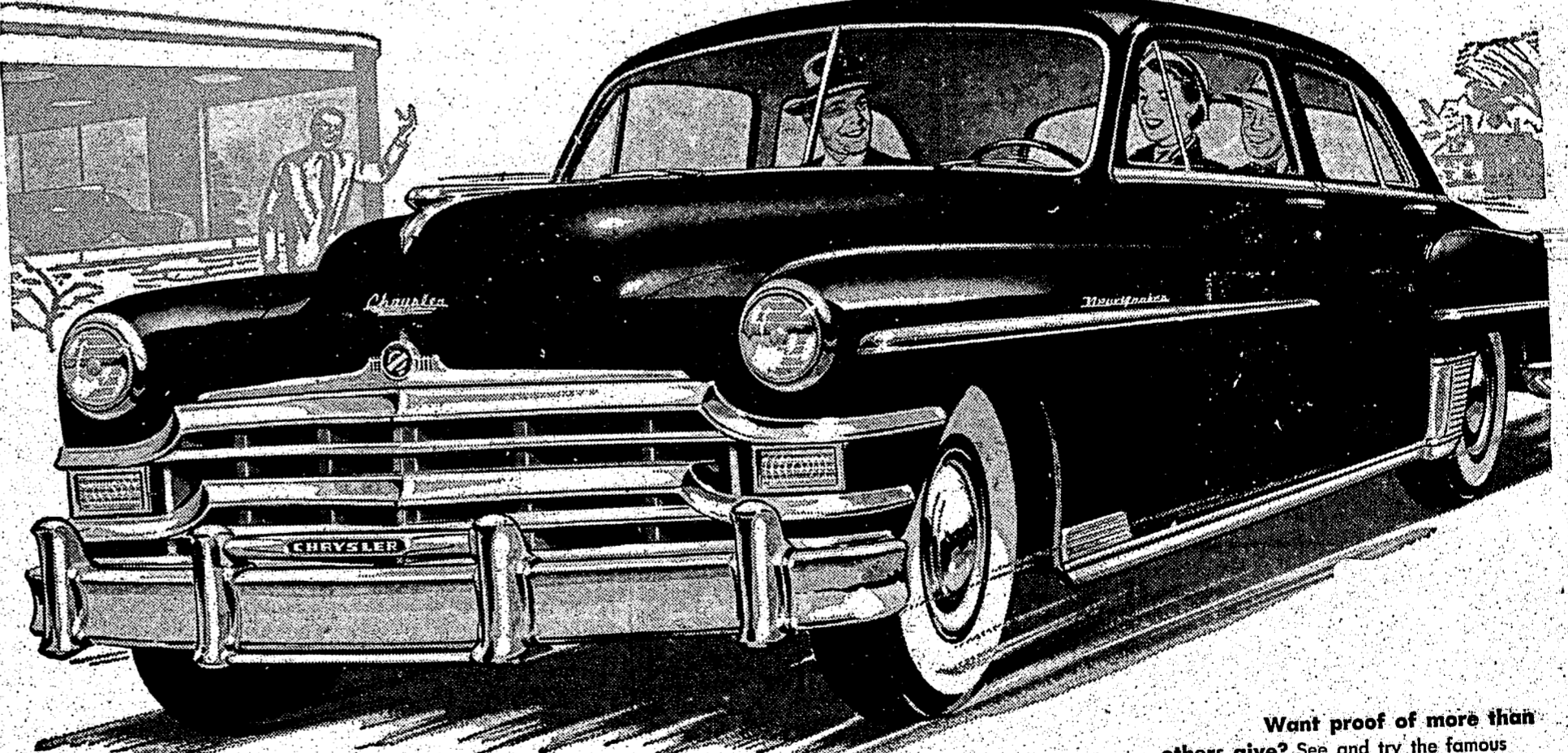
