Miss Napierski, whose original design was selected from the hundreds of entries from this state, has been awarded a \$25 United States Savings Bond. She becomes ellgible for the final judging of the National winner in her classifica-

Miss Napierski was sponsored by her teacher, Miss B. T. Etzler of the Clarkston High School, who entered the student's garment, made of Simtex Flanlet, in the contest through the Sears, Roebuck and Co., store. The garment was then entered in the national contest, judged in New York City, whare the state winners were selected.

The Simtex National Young Designers' Contest, initiated this year as an annual event, was planned for the purpose of encouraging design and sewing talents among young people. The remarkable design ability shown by students from over 5,000 schools ed Simtex Mills that a tremendous amount of talent is being skillfully trained by sewing teachers throughout the country. The ingenuity and expert workmaship displayed by the state winners of the contest speaks well for the future of American design.

The two national winners, who will be announced this week will each be awarded prizes of \$250 and a trip to New York. HOMEMAKERS CAN SAVE TIME DOING HOUSEHOLD TASKS

Latest advice to homemakers who are interested in applying the streamlined techniques of industry to their chores is to take advantage of the warming up period.

In industry saving time means saving money and studies show that in doing one specific job there is usually an increase in speed from the beginning of the task to the time of greatest output.

Irma H. Gross, head of the department of home management and child development at Micnigan State College, applies this principle to household tasks. For example, if you have four beds to make, it probably will save you time if you make them in succession rather than stopping to dust in between bed making.

In homemaking, there are many different jobs during the daywashing dishes, making beds, cooking, dusting and others... If homemakers realized that every time they changed from one job to another they went through would stay at one job longer.

This same idea applies to cleaning a group of rooms. If all dusting is done in the group of rooms at one time, then the 'vacuum cleaner used in all, there is less loss of speed than using a warming up period in each room.



1/2 cup water
1 cup raisins
4 cups fresh
1 tablespoon grated orange rind cranberries (1 1-lb. bag) cool. Pour cooled mixture into prepared pie shell. Roll out remaining crust and cut into leaf

shapes. Arrange cut-outs over surface of pie and brush with melted butter. Bake in moderately hot oven (400° F.) 35 minutes. Makes one 9-inch pie.


Just before Thanksgiving the usual dressed poultry Bingo was run off and the lucky winners wended their way from the "Casino" with oven-ready poultry. under their arms.

#### HOMEMAKERS CAN SAVE TIME DOING HOUSEHOLD TASKS

Latest advice to homemakers who are interested in applying the streamlined techniques of industry to their chores is to take advantage of the warming up period.

In industry saving time means saving money and studies show that in doing one specific job there is usually an increase in speed from the beginning of the task to the time of greatest output.

Irma H. Gross, head of the department of home management and child development at Michigan State College, applies this principle to household tasks. For example, if you have four beds to make, it probably will save you time if you make them in succession rather than stopping to dust in between bed making.

In homemaking, there are many lifferent jobs during the dayvashing dishes, making beds, ooking, dusting and others. If homemakers realized that every time they changed from one job to another they went through this "warming up period," they would stay at one job longer.

This same idea applies to cleaning a group of rooms. If all dusting is done in the group of rooms loss of speed than using a warming up period in each room.


