

> In announcing enrollment figures for each of Michigan's 83 broadsides at two opinions regarding academic success at the University which seem to have become fairly well established throughout the state.

The registrar cited official reports from the deans and directors of the University's 14 schools and colleges. These show that the University's figure for losses in the freshmen class are among the lowest in the country, he asserted. The reports show that approximately only five per cent of the freshmen is required to withdraw because of scholastic difficulties.

The exceptional success record is attributable in part to the University's system of counselling students, to the housing of freshmen in University dormitories and to their previous success in high school, according to the registrar. To refute the other belief, he cited a 20-year study of the academic records of freshmen students from Michigan high schools.

"This study shows so much variation in the accomplishments of individual students from schools of all sizes that there is no relationship between the size of the high school and academic success

in the University," he declared. Predicts Moderate Drop in Living Costs

Good news while you're worryng about that Christmas time pending is that signs point to a moderate drop in the cost of family living during 1950. It is expected that the drop will be less than in the farm income. Planned spending will pay dividends advises Lucile Ketchum. extension home management specialist at Michigan State College, It may be the time to buy needed equipment but not the time to go heavily into debt.

In spite of bumper crops, the cost of the weekly food supply won't change much, Pork and poultry will be among the less expensive meats. Most cuts of beef will be high. Egg prices will drop some and are not expected to go as high as last year's peaks. Fruit is plentiful and more reasonable than a year ago except for citrus fruits. Farm families will do well to produce their own food supply

Clothing prices are expected to ontinue their gradual downward rend. The greatest drop has been in piece goods. Nylon and some kinds of rayon lingerie are up in

price. Shoe prices are expected to advance. Men's clothing has dropped considerably. Some dealers forecast a break in the price of women's coats and suits.

Large stocks of washing machines, ranges, and radios have peen built up. There was a general price cut in 1949. Prices of deluxe models are most likely to be cut because homemakers are economizing by buying standard models, which usually are the same in basic design and con-

There is an over-supply of small equipment such as toasters, irons, coffee makers and equipment for various specialized jobs. Some of these pieces get into the gadget class and definitely would be luxury items.

Youngsters Need **Driving Courses**

Instruction and coaching are just as important in driving as they are in athletics, music or bridge building, according to Gordon C. Graham, supervisor of safety education for the Detroit Public Schools.

Referring to the 50 per cent aboye average accident rate of drivers under 25, he says "it is unfair to blame youngsters for not being good drivers when they have never received a properly planned course of instruction.

"A teen-ager makes an excellent pupil. However, too many of them are growing to maturity with improperly formed motoring habits because they have never had the benefits of adequate driving instruction," he says.

Graham is one of 12 specialists in youth or traffic work whose opinions on the teenicide problem the tragically high fatality rate of drivers under $2\overline{5}$ — were surveyed recently by Lumbermens Mutual Casualty Company, As part of a continuing program to stamp out teenicide, Lumbermens published a symposium of their opinions this month in a book entitled "Teen-age Drivers."



Cranberry jelly is the easy, flavorful filling of these double-deck pastry tarts.

Look to your cookie cutters and other gadgets to make novel tarts from tender pastry. A star cookie cutter and a small round cutter (from biscuit cutter) were all that was needed to shape the star-bright pastries pictured here.

Different fillings as well as different shapes may be used to vary an assortment of crisp tarts. Bright preserves and jellies, or mince-

Odd pieces of pastry will be left after cutting the tarts. Pile the pieces in layers, about three or four to a layer, as this seems to keep pastry very flaky when it is rolled a second time. Sprinkle rolled-out pastry with a cinnamon and sugar mixture, then cut into individual

Michigan Bell officials said customers could help speed calls by not requesting frequent reports on the progress of delayed calls. Such requests, they point out, require O'Dell Drug an operator's time to find, check and answer. A file ticket made out when a call is first placed insures that no call will be forgotten.

PHONE RATE CASE ENTERS FINAL STAGE

After 12 months, the Michigan Bell Telephone Company rate case has entered what is expected to be in the final stage. The case originally involved

a request for rate increases which would boost revenues \$20,400,000 a year, based upon the volume of business in September, 1948 Last summer, the Michigan Public Service Commission accorded the company a revenue increase of \$4,800,000 a year covering that portion of the request for increased intrastate long distance rates.

The remainder of the company's application would average about 3.4 cents a day per customer for all type of service in the company's territory and about 2.0 cents per day for users of residence

In week-long hearings, the commission denied a motion of the city of Detroit to terminate the hearings and refused to permit a witness of its own staff to designate the company's rate of return. Motion for the termination of nearings was based on the contention that the commission, in effect, had ended the rate case by its toll rate order. Refusal to admit staff testimony on the rate of return was based on the contention that such a proposal invaded the province of the commission itself, Previously, a witness for the state had testified that the cost of money should be regarded as only a "floor" to the rate

of return. Hearings the first week concluded upon a charge by an outside consultant of inefficiency upon the part of the company in carrying out its construction program, citing postwar projects which he claimed to be costly. The company promised to prove that the charges are wrong,
