**OATS** — Seed supply fair, about 100,000 bushels with 90 percent being Eaton and Kent varieties. Remaining seed is Bonham, well adapted in the upper peninsula. All have been developed by the Michigan Agricultural Experiment Station. Quality generally good, germination excellent and color and test weights fair.

**BARLEY** — Limited supply of

both Bay and Wisconsin 38 varieties. Test weight low to fair but color and germination good. Low test weights of 1949 crop caused small supply.

**SOYBEANS** — Fair supply of high quality Hawkeye and Early-ana varieties.

**FIELD BEANS** — Supplies good and certification indicates good quality with high germination. Michelite and Robust available with Robust variety in limited

supply. Seed well sized for planting.

**ALFALFA** — Very limited supply. Only one lot certified and it was excellent. Farmers who plan to plant alfalfa must locate seed at once to be sure of having it available at seeding time.

In answer to another question
it was necessary to explain, too,
that customarily only persons
known to be expert on the sub-
jects before the committees are
called upon to testify. It was point-
ed out, also, that any American
citizen, if he can show that he
has any knowledge or information
of the slightest value to the com-
mittee in the proper handling of
legislation, can arrange to be
heard, either in public or in private.
As chairman of the important
House Public Works Committee in
the 80th Congress, this always was
my own policy.
