MARCH 15th IS DEADLINE DATE FOR BEAN LLOTMENT APPLICATIONS

March 15th has been set by the Oakland County PMA Committee as the final date for filing applications for a 1950 dry edible bean acreage allotment for any farm in which no beans were pro duced in the past three years 1947 — 1948 and 1949.

Walter R. Cook, chairman of the County PMA Committee, said that bean acreage allotments for 1950 will be established on the basis of the acreage planted to beans during 1947, 1948 or 1949 on each individual farm.

Provisions have been made, however, for the establishment of bean allotment for farms which have not grown beans in any of the past three years 1947, 1948 or 1949. Allotments in such cases will be established only if the owner or operator applies for an allotment to the County PMA Committee and if such application is filed prior to March 15th.

Only those growers who have been assigned acreage allotments and who plant within their assigned allotments will be eligible for price supporting loans and purchase agreements on beans next fall when the 1950 crop is harvest-
