## World Peace Is Stressed By Rotary International President, Percy Hodgson

In a sincere, confident manner, Percy Hodgson, Rotary International President, brought to those attending the Inter-City meeting honoring the tenth anniversary year of the Clarkston Rotary Club an address pleading for world peace through understanding. The address, delivered in a deep bass tone, often in a conversational style, carried to all present, in the Clarkston High School auditorium, an address of hope that was clearly heard and easily understood.

Over 300 Rotarians and guests assembled at a banquet from all parts of the 22nd district given by the Clarkston Rotary Club on Tuesday, March 14th, and supported by Rotary Clubs from Lake Orion, Milford, Ortonville, Oxford, Pontiac and Waterford-Drayton.

The meeting was called to order by past president Roy A. Alger. The first stanza of America was sung and invocation was given by Reverend Walter C. B. Saxman, of the Clarkston Methodist Church and a member of the local club.

A delightful dinner was served by the women of the W. S. C. S. of the Methodist church under the direction of Mrs. Ralph Kreeger and was enjoyed by everyone.

Following the dinner Lloyd C. (Slip) Megee, general chairman, was introduced. It was said of "Slip" that he not only had been a charter member, and had maintained a perfect attendance for the life of the Clarkston Club but had attended so many other clubs that he had, if possible, a 200% attendance.

"Slip" introduced Joseph V. Brady, past president of the Howell Rotary Club and past governor of this district who acted as toastmaster for the balance of the evening.

The MacDowell Male Chorus of Pontiac, under the leadership of George Putnam, a member of the Pontiac Club, rendered several songs to the vast delight of those present.

Following the chorus, Robert C. Waters, president of the Village of Clarkston welcomed everyone to our village. He stressed the honor given our small but beautiful village by the presence of the head of the vast Rotary International.

Richard W. Morgan, president of the Clarkston Club, welcomed those present and spoke of the pride he felt for his club and himself in having such a distinguished speaker at the evening.

The toastmaster introduced Charles R. Miller, district governor; the presidents of the supporting clubs; Walter Fauser, past president of the Birmingham Club, the mother club of Clarkston, and the man most responsible for the organizing of the local club; Gerald O'Dell, the first president of the Clarkston Club and Alex Moore, of Wayne, past district governor.

The toastmaster also introduced Robert L. Jones, past president of the Clarkston Club, who led community singing, accompanied at the piano by William Ladd, Director of Music in the Clarkston Schools.

Following the singing, Richard (Dick) Hedke, past president of the Detroit Rotary Club and past president of Rotary International was called on for a few remarks. Dick, in turn, introduced the speaker of the evening Percy Hodgson, president of Rotary International. Rotarian Hedke mentioned that the international President had visited with the heads of 45 different countries, had visit-

ed 7 different foreign countries, and had had two honorary degrees bestowed upon him. He had departed from Canton, China, only two hours when the Russians entered the city.

Percy Hodgson began his talk by explaining that as Rotary was international, so the world had become smaller and today it would be wise to consider all nations as one and instead of referring to our "citizenship" we should refer to our "worldmanship". The point was driven home that with our capacity for advancement in learning we could easily accomplish "Education and Catastrophes" unless the people of the world learned to live in harmony with each other.

He explained the understanding that had come from the Rotary

idea of exchanging students with other countries so that when the students returned to their homes they took their new views with them and thus fostered the idea of bringing the people of this earth into a better and clearer understanding of each other's problems and desires for a better world.

In closing, the last stanza of America rang out with real Rotarian enthusiasm.

The school gymnasium was attractively decorated in dignified Rotarian style. A display of flags of the United Nations stood out boldly against the dark blue curtain on the stage. In a prominent place above the flags was the large wheel of Rotary International and other large Rotary wheels were high above the din-

ing table and in the corridor. The wheels were made and painted by Mary Jane Beattie. On entering the banquet hall a spotlight drew attention to a large picture of the Rotary International President, Percy Hodgson, hung high in the south-east corner of the gym.

The dining tables were plain but very effective. Down the center of each table were the Rotary colors, dark blue and gold and the places were marked with place mats and napkins bearing the Rotary emblem. Centering the speaker's table was a pretty floral arrangement.

The opening of the program was very impressive when the Rotarians stood to sing "America" the gym lights were turned out and a spotlight was turned on the American flag which waved from a corner of the balcony.

When the guests arrived in Clarkston they were directed by Jarje, painted signs, the art work of Rotarian Rudy Schwarze. The visiting Rotarians realized they were welcome in Clarkston when they perceived the signs in the "windows in the business district. Ernie Burt and Rotarian President, Richard (Dick) Morgan were responsible for these "welcome" signs.

The Clarkston Fire Fighters assisted by the sheriff's department very ably guided traffic and took care of the parking at the rear of the school. The Boy Scouts were kept busy checking hats and coats. The girls' junior choir of the Methodist Church assisted with the serving of the dinner and are to be complimented for a job well done.

## STUDENTS TOUR GENERAL HOSPITAL

Last Tuesday afternoon the first year home economics class and students from the vocational guidance class, interested in scientific occupations, toured Pontiac General Hospital. Upon arrival at the hospital we assembled in the waiting room where we were divided into three groups, each of which was led by a hospital employee. Our group was first taken to the blood bank where we saw a transfusion being administered to an elderly lady. We were told that the amount of time it takes to administer a transfusion to a patient depends entirely upon the condition of the patient. This particular case took two hours. We were also shown the refrigerator where the blood was kept.

We passed many rooms such as The Basal Metabolism, Electrocardiograph etc., which we weren't permitted to enter. We also viewed the operating room and saw the equipment used in performing operations. Next we visited the laundry where we saw clothes being washed, dried, and pressed. On the way upstairs we saw the emergency rooms. We then inspected the nursery and saw infants ranging from one to six days old. Then we were taken to the kitchen where we saw trays for various diets prepared.

At 2:20 P. M. we met the other two groups and our sponsor, Miss Ethler, in the dining room where we were served cookies and cocoa by our hostess.
