4-H LEADERS' MEETING TO BE HELD On Thursday, March 30th, a 4-H

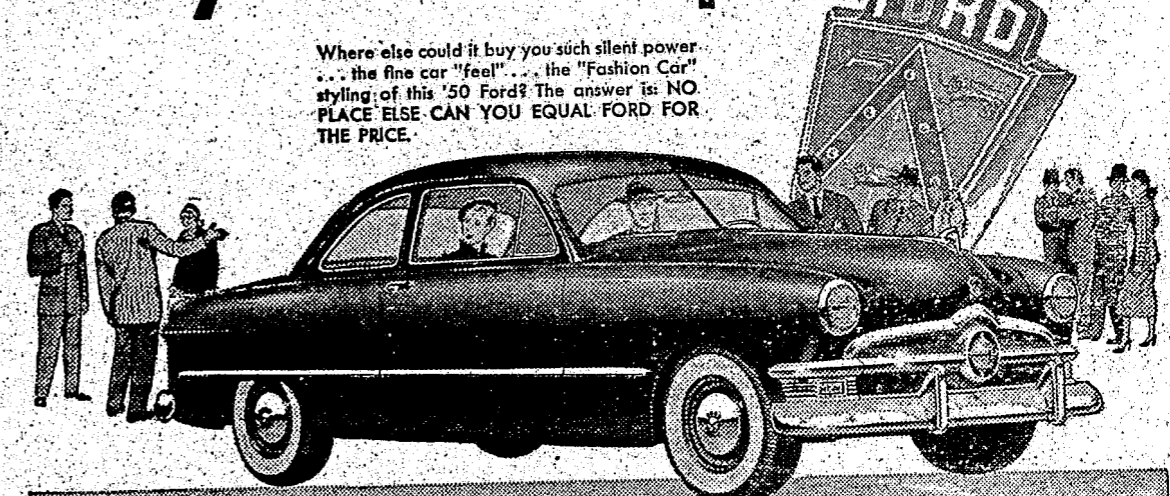

Lemon Angel Pie 4 eggs, separated 1 lemon, juice and 1/2 teaspoon 1/2 cup water 1 1/2 cups sugar 1 cup heavy cream, whipped Beat egg whites until frothy; add cream of tartar; beat until stiff. Add 1 cup sugar gradually, beating constantly. Beat until glossy. Line bottom and sides of 9-inch pie pan with this meringue. Bake in very slow oven, 275°F., 1 hour; cool. Beat egg yolks until thick and light. Add remaining 1/2 cup sugar, lemon juice and peel and water. Cook over hot water, stirring constantly, until thick; cool. Spread half the whipped cream in meringue shell; add lemon filling, spreading evenly; top with remaining whipped cream. Chill 24 hours.

### TUNA TREAT

7 ounces Tuna  
1 can mushroom soup  
2 cup peas  
4 eggs separated  
3/4 cup cheese  
Cook 1 package frozen peas until tender without salt, or 2 cups canned. Heat oven to 400 degrees F. In a 1 1/4 qt. casserole blend with a fork 1/2 cup milk with one can cream of mushroom soup. Add drained peas, and 1/7 ounce can tuna, flaked, oil and all. Toss together and bake for 12 minutes at 400 degrees. Meanwhile separate 4 eggs for the topping. Beat the whites until they stand in soft peaks. Beat the yolks till lemon colored. Grate into the yolks 3/4

to 1/2 lb. cheddar cheese (about 3/4 cup). Fold the cheese into the yolks. Then fold the yolk-cheese mixture into the white. The more delicately you fold the higher the topping. When the tuna mixture has baked 12 minutes turn the egg mixture on top to give a souffle like topping. Bake 20 minutes at 400 degrees. Serve immediately to prevent the souffle from falling. Serve with a tossed salad, hard rolls, fruit and cookies.

### The Grist Mill

County Agricultural Agent  
Everyone is studying their new 1950 seed catalogs, getting ready for their spring garden project. Our hope is that their ambition does not vary inversely with the temperature as the time progresses.  
A couple of hints on getting the garden ready. First of all, a good coat of manure, plowed down (200 lbs. per thousand square feet) will help very much, except for potatoes. Apply 25 lbs. of a 4-16-18 fertilizer per thousand square feet before plowing.  
Get a recommended variety of plants for your garden. Probably one of the greatest causes of failures in the garden is unsuiting varieties. The Oakland County Extension Service Office has a bulletin which recommends the correct variety for each planting.

### KROGER TO AWARD COLLEGE SCHOLARSHIPS

Seventy-eight college scholarships of \$200 each will be awarded to outstanding high school graduates in 15 midwestern and southern states for the 1950-51 school year, Joseph B. Hall, president of the Kroger company has announced.  
The scholarships will be divided between students planning to major in home economics and those specializing in agriculture at 16 land grant colleges. Last year Kroger awarded 77 scholarships, continuing a program started 12 years ago.  
Colleges participating in the plan and the number of scholarships to be awarded at each are: Ohio State University, 12; Michigan State College, 16; University of Illinois, 6; Purdue University,

6; University of Missouri; 6; Pennsylvania State College, 4; University of Kentucky, 4; University of Tennessee, 4; Mississippi State College, 4; Kansas State College, 4; University of Wisconsin, 4; Virginia Polytechnic Institute, 4; and West Virginia State College.  
Winners will be selected by college scholarship committees on the basis of high school scholastic achievement, and evidence of leadership qualities demonstrated in school, church, 4-H clubs, Future Farmers of America, Future Homemakers of America or similar organizations, Mr. Hall explained.  
Graduates of accredited high schools in the 15 states are eligible. Applications for Kroger scholarships may be made and information on the program may be ob-
