### PASTURES GIVE THREE BENEFITS

High quality pastures and forage give us there benefits, says George A. Brown head of the Michigan State College animal husbandry department.

He points out that they help maintain livestock health, increase returns through more economical gains, and reduce labor and tillage costs.

Green pastures provide a liberal supply of protein, vitamins and minerals essential to the rapid growth and development of young animals. Succulent pastures throughout the growing season and well-cured leafy roughage for winter feeding are our best guarantee against nutritional deficiencies, Brown states.

Approximately 80 percent of the feed of beef cattle is grass and forage and improvement of grass and forage means a cut in the cost of production, the livestock authority believes. Most economical beef gains come from the use of good pasture. -

Sheep obtain from 90 to 95 percent of their feed from grass or forage. Under ideal conditions, fat lambs can be produced without the use of any grain.

Good pasture for swine will bring a saving of from 10 to 15 percent of the grain and 50 percent of the protein supplement in swine rations. The risk of losses from parasites and nutritional diseases is also materially reduced by succulent pasture.

Brown urges all farmers to plan on attending the Grass Day prooperative Extension Service and other agencies have planned numerous demonstrations and exhibits for these events - all aimed at encouraging better grass and for-
