"One of the most important post-war checks on food production and distribution in Europe was lack of stability in the value of money," Mauch said, "But," he added, "inflation has been checked to a point where producers are again willing to accept currency n exchange for their products." Food production in these counries is back to about pre-war volume. However, the rapid population increase has left food consumption per person lower than re-war — which by American standards was considered very nadequate, according to Mauch.

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ing action, you can estimate how much to decrease the baking powd er in the original sweet milk re-

For example, if the original weet milk recipe calls for three and one-half teaspoons of baking powder and you substitute one cup of sour milk and one-half teaspoon soda, your sour milk recipe will need just one and one-half teaspoons of baking powder. The half-teaspoon of soda will equal two teaspoons of baking powder.

You can also plan that the mount of baking powder used in recipes will be two teaspoons of rapid-acting, or one teaspoon of double action, baking powder to one cup of flour. And one whole egg will leaven one-fourth cup of flour,

With these few rules you can change your recipes around like an expert and also solve that sour milk problem.

#### INSECT SHIPMENT CALLS FOR CARE

Care should be used in sending nsects to the entomology departnent at Michigan State College, dvises Ray L. Janes, entomology extension specialist.

Though the department is willing to cooperate in identifying insects it is frequently impossible to do so. When people slip the insects into an envelope or between a piece of paper, the bugs frequently arrive at the college smashed into a mass of color, and thus, cannot be identified.

Janes points out that if people would first kill the insects in rubbing alcohol and then put them in a box so they would not crush, the situation would be remedied. He reports that it is almost impossible to tell one insect from another when it arrives

Persons who want to grow scotch pine for Christmas tree stock are advised by the conservation department's forestry division that none will be available for at least two years.

However, plantation owners who desire to use, red, white or jack pine for yule purposes can get these species next fall.

The state conservation commission recently agreed to permit the use of stock grown in state nurseries for Christmas tree purposes.

CHILDREN BY LIMITING BEHAVIOR

Parents may have the idea that they should let a child do just what he pleases and when he pleases and should trust the child's judgment. They feel he will grow in spite of his parents.

This lack of parental restraint is not one of the best ways to give a young child a feeling of sureness; certainty and therefore security, reports Jean Foulkrod, child development instructor at Michigan State College.

A mother who can love her child but at the same time see the need for "putting the brakes" on his behavior at times, is really helping the child grow, according to Miss Foulkrod. For example. a child may want to hit or kick you when you stop him from writing with crayon on the wallpaper. Then you need to tell the child of two "limits" at one time. He may not hurt people - or wall-

The child specialist thinks he may not like you for limiting these activities at the time but now no knows he is not to kick you and that writing paper is better for crayons than wallpaper. He will wonder no longer whether he can get away with these things and you have made him more secure by removing that many uncertainties. He is sure of a few things and knows that someone is helping him make up his mind about things which are a little too big for him.

"Young children need the firm reassuring guildance of parents. They need certain limits they cannot go beyond. It gives them a feeling of security and children need that," Miss Foulkrod reports.
