. Il be remembered that the chool was sold some years after the new school was built and the purchaser, The Ford Motor Company, remodeled the building and spent quite a sum of money to fit it for their use. Now they have no further use for the building and it has been offered to the Township for \$31,500. To pay for the property it will be necessary to bond with costs to the taxpayers of 4 mills or \$4.00 per thousand of assessed valuation. While the law demands that sufficient time be allowed to allow for any delinquent payment of taxes, it is estimated that the actual time will be two years. The question of buying was raised by a petition signed by tax-payers in the township who petitioned the township board to purchase the building to be used for township offices, and for a

community center. The State Board of Education, we are informed, has given the reorganized school district permission to use part of the building for class rooms, for a period not exceeding two years, should the township decide to purchase.

There is ample room for township offices, meeting places for various clubs and civic organizations, such as boy and girl scouts, dance clubs, community - gettogethers and a general community service building. Should the community desire a library there would be plenty space in the opinion of those who desire the purchase.

The present township hall it the purchase is voted for, would then be disposed of as the voters desire at a later time.

Two ballots will be used. One will be whether to purchase or not and the other will decide the question as to whether to bond or not. To secure the building both ballots must carry a 'yes' vote. A third ballot had been suggested as to certain use of sales tax money. However, it was thought best by the board not to use these funds and the question

was withdrawn. While some are uninformed on tion and in their doubt may be wondering just how to vote, we understand that many who have informed themselves as to what it is all about are heartily in favor of buying.

#### TOP PUBLIC RELATIONS HONORS AWARDED MSC

Top award for best press relations with national magazines was presented to the Michigan State College Department of Information Services (formerly the Public Relations Department), at the national conference of the American College Public Relations association held at the Uni-

### Wheat Loan Rate Is Announced

A basic loan rate for 1950-crop wheat produced in Oakland County of \$2.07 per bushel was announced this week by the Production and Marketing Administration county committee. Last year's rate was \$2.03 per bushel.

The basic rate applies to wheat grading U. S. requires that the price of 1950crop wheat be supported to farmers at 90 per cent of the parity price on July 1, 1950, the beginning of the marketing season. Mr. Cook reports that the July 1st wheat parity price \$2.21 a bushel. For the same date last year the wheat parity price was \$2.17 per bushel.

### Conservation News

recreation areas must be paid in advance, when camping permit is obtained, for the number of days to be spent in the park, conservation department parks division officials have ruled.

Refunds cannot be made except in case of illness, death in the family or other emergency. Campers who can't stay the whole time paid for, for reason other than emergencies, may make arrangements with the park manager to return to the same park later in the year and be credited for the unused time.

A fee of 50 cents per day is charged campers for water, garbage disposal, and use of toilet buildings. Electricity is an additional 20 cents a day for those who use it.



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
