

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ALL 4-H'ERS GO IN FREE ON 4-H DAY AT CHICAGO FAIR

What promises to be one of the largest gatherings of 4-H Club boys and girls ever assembled in Chicago will celebrate 4-H Day at the Chicago Fair, Wednesday,

July 26th. All 4-H'ers wearing 4-H uniforms, caps, patches, or other identification, will be admitted free. They are requested to enter the Fair at the 23rd Street entrance.

A special 4-H talent program has been arranged by the National Committee on Boys and Girls Club Work in cooperation with County Extension agents and Extension specialists in music in Illinois, Indiana, Iowa, Michigan, Ohio and Wisconsin.

First on the day's program will be a parade of all the visiting 4-H'ers, headed by the Jackson county, Michigan, 4-H band of 40 pieces, from the south gate of the Fair to the Central Special Events Stage, starting at 12:30 p. m.

At the Central Stage, starting at 1 p. m., a 4-H Talent program

will be held, which will include instrumentalists, soloists, duets, trios, quartettes, square dance teams.

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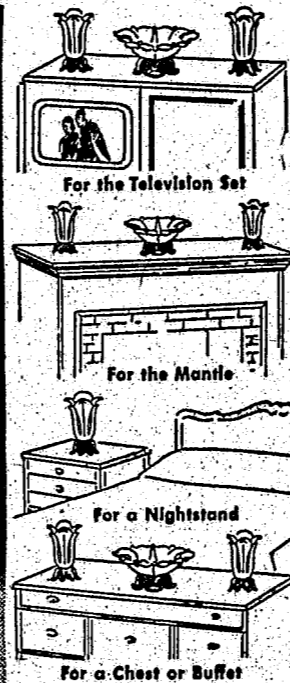
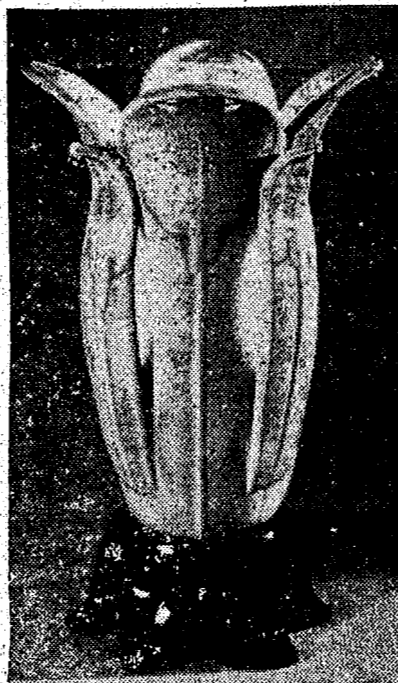
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4H YOUTH TO CAMP AT ISLAND LAKE



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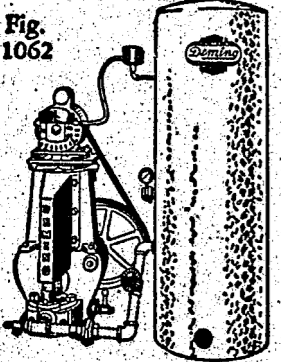

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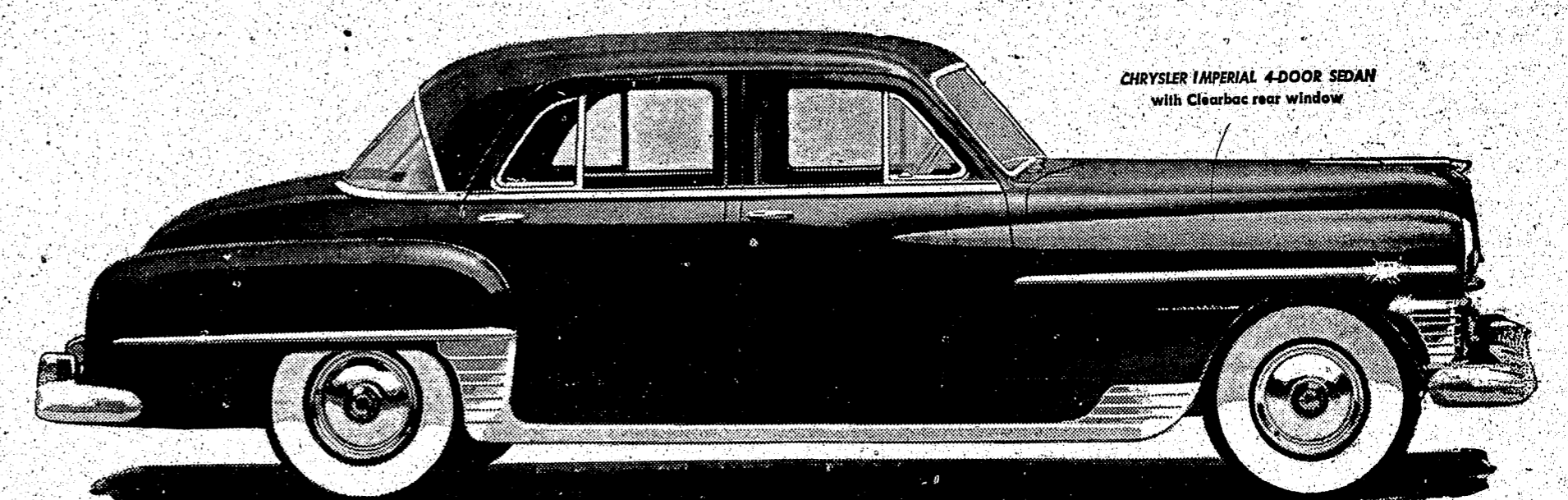

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MSC TO HOLD SECOND ECONOMIC WORKSHOP JULY 26 TO AUG. 15

Between 75 and 100 educators and economists will take another look into some of the nation's toughest economic problems when they journey to Michigan State College July 26th to participate in the second annual Economic Workshop.

Purpose of the workshop will be to continue the work started

last year at MSC's first workshop session. "It has a sort of one-two aim," said Herman J. Wyngarden, Dean of MSC's School of Business and Public Service.

"Firstly, businessmen, educators and economists will be getting together to discuss the best ways of teaching the man in the street fundamentals of economic and social policies," Dean Wyngarden said.

A second purpose is to assist

secondary schools with developing educators, especially those in the youth to a competent understanding of economic citizenship.

A number of prominent educators and economists will address the workshop this year. They include S. Morris Livingston, Chicago consulting economist; Arthur Uppgren, of the school of business administration, University of Minnesota; John K. Langum, vice-president, Federal Reserve Bank of Chicago; and J. C. Davis, member of President Truman's Council of Economic Advisors, Washington, D. C.

The Michigan Council on Economic Education, under the chairmanship of Dr. Eugene B. Elliott, and Michigan State College are joint sponsors of the workshop. The council was organized by a state-wide group of educators from the universities, colleges and city school systems as a result of

last year's Economic Workshop. Major aim of the council is to stimulate and coordinate programs of economic education in the state.

recreation areas must be paid in advance, when camping permit is obtained, for the number of days to be spent in the park, conservation department parks division officials have ruled.

Refunds cannot be made except in case of illness, death in the family or other emergency. Campers who can't stay the whole time paid for, for reason other than emergencies, may make arrangements with the park manager to return to the same park later in the year and be credited for the unused time.

A fee of 50 cents per day is charged campers for water, garbage disposal, and use of toilet buildings. Electricity is an additional 20 cents a day for those who use it.

No fee is charged for admittance to state parks or for any recreational use other than camping.
