Youthful exhibitors from nearly every county in Michigan are preparing more than 4,000 exhibits to bring to East Lansing, August 29 to September 1 for the thirty-fifth annual State 4-H Club Show.

A. G. Kettunen, state 4-H Club leader at Michigan State College, says his staff is preparing to handle more entries, more boys and girls, and a greater number and variety of contests and demonstrations than last year.

Last year rural youth from 79 of the 83 counties brought or sent 4,033 different entries for the event which is held on the campus of Michigan State College. That included 1.343 head of livestock--543 of them dairy animals. More than 1,700 of the 10 to 21 year old boys and girls were housed in MSC dormitory facilities during the four day stay.

Several new events have been added for the show this year. They include: tractor operators contest; public speaking contests and a model business meeting demonstration. Because of the great number of

contestants, elimination contests will be held in four days in mid-August at East Lansing to thin down the number of judging and demonstration entries from the 41 southern counties. Similar eliminations have been held for upper Michigan and the upper peninsula.

Kettunen invites parents and others interested in the achievements of youth to attend the show and see the exhibits and contests. "It is open to the public and is free and we invite all friends of youth to see the results of this training program," Kettunen remarked.



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#### CHEMICALS HELP CONTROL UNWANTED SHRUBS AND TREES

Controlling stands of trees and shrubs or eradicating both completely is of great importance in naintenance of power line, telephone, highway, and ditch rightof-ways, according to Maurice W. Day, supervisor of the Dunbar Forest Experiment Station.

Located at Sault, Ste Marie, this oranch of Michigan State College's experimental facilities gives opportunity to check methods of getting rid of undesirable trees and shrubs.

Day points out that permanent pastures are often reduced in value by the presence of woody plantgrowth. Many kinds of plant rowth are capable of sprouting rigorously from the stump when cut. The only really effective control of these species is obtained through the killing of the croot system.

Control procedures fall into two classes: mecanical and chemical, Mechanical methods, used for some time, include: cutting, burning, disking, plowing, bulldozing, or girdling. All have disadvantages. Cutting and burning result in heavy sprouting and the latter methods result in good seedbed conditions for another stand of trees or shrubs. Girdling is slow and suitable only for larger

Day reports that control woody vegetation by chemical means has developed rapidly in recent years, Most of the procedures involve the use of 2, 4-D and a newer chemical 2, 4, 5-T.

Tests have shown that the products can be used singly, or together, in both oil and water solutions. For the elimination of woody plants, preparations of the various esters of 2, 4-D and 2,4,5-T are usually recommended.

Recently several products containing esters of 2,4-D and 2,4,5-T were marketed as "brush killers" Directions for their use should be followed carefully.
