Enrollment to date in the Clarkston school building is 307 in the first six grades and 392 in 7 through 12. In the kindergarten there are 59; first grade 36; second, 41; third, 42; fourth, 38; fifth, 45; sixth, 46; seventh, 46; eighth, 85; ninth, 85; tenth, 77; eleventh, 50; and twelfth, 49. Study halls are so crowded that pupils are seated in the hallways and other rooms.

The new township building on N. Main street is housing a combination first and second grades with 34 pupils and a third and fourth grades with 36 enrolled. At the Hunter school there are: first grade, 3; second, 5; third, 5; fourth, 4; fifth, 2; sixth, 3.





The anti-histamine compounds are still very useful for controlling some patients but they are not the whole answer for treating Allergies, he said. They don't affect some symptoms at all, such as a particular type of nasal obstruction, and they should not be used to the exclusion of other types of treatment, the doctor stressed.

FLY CONTROL DEMONSTRATIONS HELD

Four fly control demonstrations were held by Ed Bauman of the California Chemical Spray Corporation in Cooperation with the Agricultural Extension Service, September 5 and 6. Four barns were sprayed with isotox-lindane. Mr. Bauman says that first control for flies is proper sanitation and that chemical fly control is only an aid and if manure piles are left standing fly control is almost impossible. He also states that barns which are not screened present a difficult problem in controlling flies. Only when properly applied are chemicals effective in lowering the fly popula-

Mr. Bauman used a 1 per cent dust under calf pen bedding. He sprayed the walls and ceilings thoroughly. He explained that the residue would last much longer if the barn is closed when there are no cattle in it, and only the necessary ventilation when cattle are in it.
