There's better news for hay fever sufferers this year — at least for 15 of them in a research project at the University of Michigan Hospital.

The group of pollen-plagued patients got complete relief from their symptoms following a course of treatment with the new compounds so effective against rheumatoid arthritis, Cortisone and ACTH, according to Dr. John M. Sheldon, professor of internal medicine, in charge of the hospital's Allergy Clinic.

He reported that Cortisone relieved symptoms in two to three days and ACTH brought relief within a few hours following administration. Patients were given twice-daily injections of the compounds for an average of three to five days in the majority of cases, he said.

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Although the quick acting ACTH can be a life-saving measure in extreme cases of asthma, the compounds must be given under closely supervised conditions, Dr. Sheldon warned. Improper administration can result in skin eruptions (acne), severe blood chemical changes, high blood pressure and still other undesirable reactions, he indicated.

Research at U-M offers hay fever victims some hope. There's better news for hay fever sufferers this year — at least for 15 of them in a research project at the University of Michigan Hospital.

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For these reasons, the compounds must be considered as primarily research tools and not as routinely used drugs, he pointed out. Their real value lies in providing new knowledge about previously poorly understood allergic mechanisms, he stated.

The anti-histamine compounds are still very useful for controlling some patients but they are not the whole answer for treating allergies, he said. They don't affect some symptoms at all, such as a particular type of nasal obstruction, and they should not be used to the exclusion of other types of treatment, the doctor stressed.

FLY CONTROL DEMONSTRATIONS HELD

Four fly control demonstrations were held by Ed Bauman of the California Chemical Spray Corporation in cooperation with the Agricultural Extension Service, September 5 and 6. Four barns were sprayed with isotox-lindane. Mr. Bauman says that first control for flies is proper sanitation and that chemical fly control is only an aid and if manure piles are left standing fly control is almost impossible. He also states that barns which are not screened present a difficult problem in controlling flies. Only when properly applied are chemicals effective in lowering the fly population.

Mr. Bauman used a 1 per cent dust under calf pen bedding. He sprayed the walls and ceilings thoroughly. He explained that the residue would last much longer if the barn is closed when there are no cattle in it, and only the necessary ventilation when cattle are in it. Small crystals from the walls and ceiling drifting through

the air and settling on the livestock as they come in from milking kill any flies within a few minutes after they are admitted to the barn.

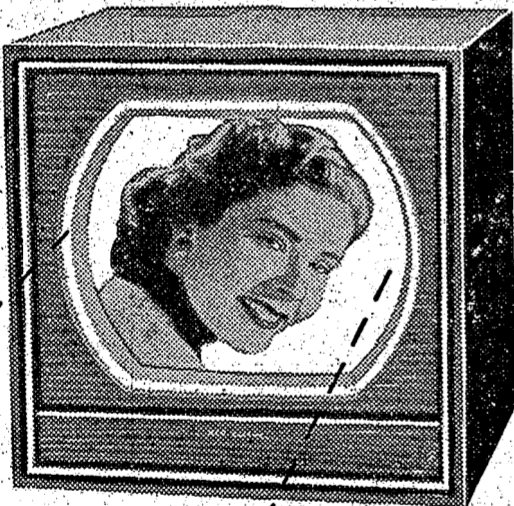
- Chocolate Crunch Cookies 1 1/2 cups sifted flour 1 egg, beaten 1/2 teaspoon soda Few drops hot water 1/2 teaspoon salt 1/2 cup chopped nuts 1/2 cup butter (or shortening) 1 package semi-sweet chocolate 6 tablespoons granulated sugar 1/2 teaspoon vanilla 6 tablespoons brown sugar

Sift flour with soda and salt; set aside. Blend shortening with sugar until creamy; slowly add sugar and continue to work until light. Add egg, and beat well. Add flour mixture and mix, then add a few drops hot water and mix together until well blended. Add chopped nuts, semi-sweet chocolate and vanilla. Drop by teaspoons on a greased cookie sheet. Bake in a moderate oven (375°F.) 10-12 minutes. YIELD: 60 cookies.

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ADAPTED ALFALFA BEATS ALL OTHERS

Values of using adapted alfalfa varieties in Michigan was shown

In demonstration plots on farms throughout Michigan in Grass Day events this summer, Richard Bell, Michigan State College farm crops specialist, says that with-

out exception, the adapted varieties out-yielded Argentine alfalfa.

Michigan farmers who plan to seed alfalfa next spring should start now locating a source of good, adapted seed, the crops specialist advises. Varieties recommended are Grimm, Hardigan, or variegated. He points out that good seed is produced in Michigan, but that much of it leaves the state early and Michigan farmers have difficulty in locating seed the following winter and spring.

On the average, Hardigan seed produced a crop of 17,500 pounds of unweeded hay per acre, compared with 15,000 pounds for the Argentine seed.

Bell says this difference increases greatly in the second and third year because the Argentine variety usually fails to live through Michigan winters for more than one or two years. It often produces little or no hay in its second year.

WATCH OUT FOR KIDS

Dr. Lee Thurston, Superintendent of Public Instruction, today announced the opening of an all out drive against traffic accidents involving children. It is sponsored by the Michigan State Safety Commission and its 69 member Advisory Committee.

During September there will be a large scale public education program in which newspapers, radio stations and moving picture theaters are cooperating. In addition thousands of posters, leaflets and stickers will bring to the public the official slogan "Watch Out For Kids". The Michigan Oil Industry Committee is contributing nearly \$10,000.00 worth of safety educational materials to assist the program.

According to Dr. Thurston there were over four thousand children hit by vehicles last year. 119 of them died and many of the rest were severely injured.

The program is timed to fit the opening of school on September 5th and 6th. On the opening days a million and a quarter children will be out on the highways and byways on their way to school. For 115,000 of this number it will be their first day

in school.

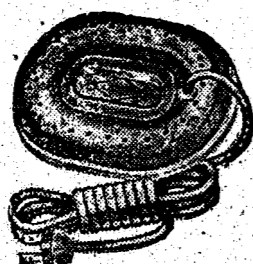

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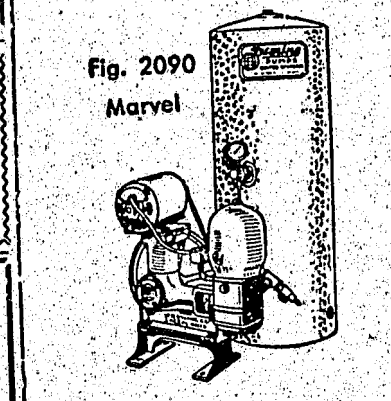
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CLUB TO HAVE BUFFALO BARBECUE

Sperry, J. B. Sperry Company, Port Huron; W. E. To prevent destruction of north
 shore Otsego lake pike spawn-
 ing grounds, the conservation de-
 partment has filed suit in Otsego
 county court here to restrain



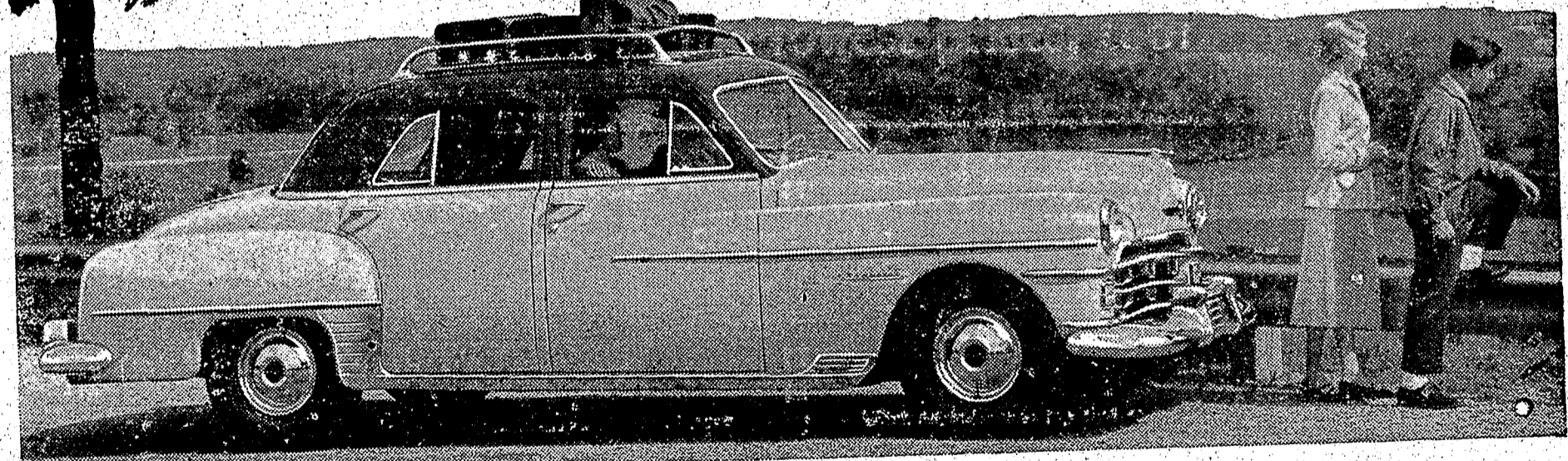
