Well here it is: Dearest -

I am very enthusiastic about Army camp life. We lie around set with antique tea services a- in the morning until 5 o'clock. This, of course, gives us plenty of time to get shaved, dressed, make our bunks, etc., by 5:15. Then we stand outside and shiver until someone blows the bugle. After we are reasonably chilled we grope our way through the darkness to the mess hall. Here we have plenty of breakfast, consisting of an unidentified liquid and a choice of white or rve

After gorging ourselves with this delicious repast, we waddle back to the barracks. We have nothing to do until seven o'clock so we just sit around and scrub toilets, moo floors, wash windows and pick up all the cigarette butts within a radius of 150 feet of our barracks.

Soon the Sergeant comes in and says, "come on out in the Company. The representatives sun awhile, kids," so we go out and bake in the wonderful sunhine; of course, we stand in six inches of mud. To limber up we do a few simple exercises like touching your toes with both feet off the ground, or grabbing yourself by the hair and holding yourself at arm's length.

At eight o'clock we put on light pack and start walking to the mountains. The light pack is not to be confused with the heavy coat, the tent poles, rope, tin hat, gas mask and a few other negligible items. The heavy pack has a blanket or two in it. Carrying my pack, I weigh 227 pounds. (I weighed 150 pounds when I left so you can see how easy and agreeable it is to romp in the mountains.)

Our observation cars followed up as we marched and picked up the fellows who fainted.

GIVE TIPS FOR SOFT CORN USE

High moisture content in some of Michigan's corn crop means that special care will be needed tion. for handling and storage, says Michigan State College farm crops specialist, Leyton Nelson,

The farm crops department has compiled a list of suggestions for soft corn. Many may already be known to corn growers, but the agricultural workers believe a review is timely due to the estimated soft corn crop this year. Their general recommendations are as

1. Enlisting both fodder and in small shocks.

2. Sorting and early feeding of soft corn to hogs and other live-

3. Delayed harvesting to allow maximum field drying. 4. Clean husking to eliminate trash that reduces crib ventila-

5. Use of screens on the elevator to remove shelled corn and trash. 6. Good distribution in the crib to avoid pockets of shelled corn and debris where spoilage is most

likely to start. 7. Storage of corn in narrowest cribs to help natural ventilation. 8. Use of adequate ventilators in cribs.

9. Storing of corn in the field

10. Sorting out most immature ears from corn which is to be cribbed. The immature corn should be used before spring.

11. "Hogging-off" or allowing cattle and hogs to harvest corn 12. Use of commercial dryers, available in some parts of the state. Some elevators are equipped to purchase soft corn on a grade basis, less charges for transportation and drying.

13. Consult local elevator manager for information regarding handling soft corn.

CAN SEED CANARY GRASS IN NOVEMBER

To merely scatter Reed Canary grass seed over a plot of ground is a waste of seed and labor, especially if the ground is covered with sedge and cattails, believes Cartes Harrison, of the Michigan State College farm crops department. Dormant seeding may be made in early November.

Only a small amount of seed will grow if the area is lightly worked with disk or other farm tools such as drags, By plowing during the dry part of summer and working the seedbed to destroy competing vegetation your grass will have a better chance,

Fertilizer should also be added if you expect to establish a productive pasture on land which is otherwise of little value, the farm crops specialist maintains. Most mucks are alkaline or nearly so in Michigan therefore no lime is

Seedings made around August 15th generally work out best in Michigan because late fall and early spring weather is usually wet and a difficult time to fit and seed. If the seeding cannot be made in the middle of August, wait until early November and make a dormant seeding. The seed, if scattered on a prepared surface in early November, will lie dorman until growing weather returns next spring.
