

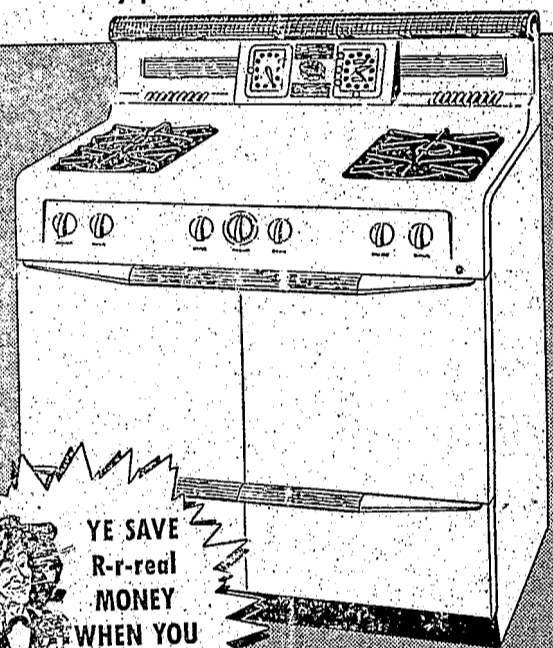

**OLD RUGS CAN BE REVIVED WITH DYE**

Increasing prices of rugs and carpeting are causing many homemakers to take a second look at their old rugs and question whether they might be brightened and used a little longer.

You can revive an old rug and add several years of wear to it by giving it a dye bath, advises Dorothy Washburn, Michigan State College home economist. She believes the results are well worth the effort, that the cost is very little, and that it is not a difficult project.

It takes about six packages of the kind of dye that is boiled to dye a 9 x 12 rug. It is possible to combine colors of dyes to obtain a desired color as you would combine water colors or oil paints. Follow the directions on the package of dye for preparing it, but don't dilute it. Keep it full strength.

Put some of the dye in a pan, leaving the rest on the stove so that it can stay hot. Then take a scrub brush about 10 inches

long and dip it into the dye bath. Scrub it into the nap of the rug, beginning at one end and continuing to the other end. It is preferable to dye it twice.

Let the rug dry thoroughly and then raise the nap with a carpet sweeper or a vacuum cleaner.

In a figured rug it is generally the background color that shows the wear. You can revive the background color by making a dye-bath to match it and using a small brush. An old tooth brush will get into the smaller places successfully.

**CHRISTMAS TREE HARVEST SEASON JUST AHEAD**

Although Christmas is about 9 weeks away, already work is under way for this season's supply of Christmas trees, which usually amounts to a million evergreen trees, states C. A. Boyer, Chief of the Bureau of Plant Industry, Michigan Department of Agriculture.

As a protection to land owners the 1933 Michigan Legislature passed Act. No. 124 known as the Christmas Tree Act, which governs the removal and transportation of both Christmas trees and evergreen boughs. This Act prohibits the cutting and/or removal or transportation of such stock without written consent of the owner, which means a legal bill of sale must accompany the evergreens. Such a legal bill of sale shows the number of trees or amount of boughs, the exact legal description of land where they are grown, and must be signed by the legal land owner and two witnesses.

The Bureau of Plant Industry is responsible for the enforcement of this Act in co-operation with the Michigan State Police, conservation officers, county sheriffs, and county agricultural agents. The forms for written consent can be secured from any of these sources. As the holiday season approaches, checking stations will be established on highways lead-

ing from Northern Michigan, and all persons transporting cut Christmas trees, evergreen boughs, etc., are required to stop at these stations and present a legal bill of sale and consent. In addition, free lance inspectors constantly visit the areas in Northern Michigan where Christmas trees are cut and check metropolitan areas where trees and boughs are being offered for sale. Thus, anyone cutting, transporting, or selling Christmas greens must be prepared at all times to show a legal bill of sale for the trees or boughs that he has in his possession.

These requirements for the transportation of cut trees should not be confused with those for the movement of trees, shrubs or vines with roots attached. To transplant or move trees, shrubs, etc., from one property to another, one must have a certificate showing that the plants have been inspected and found to be free of dangerous insect pests and plant diseases. Arrangements for inspection may be made by writing the Bureau of Plant Industry, State Department of Agriculture at Lansing.

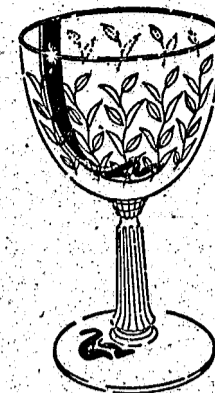
**ACID POISONING MAY AFFECT COWS**

If any of your cattle begin to stagger as if drunk, they may have been poisoned by prussic acid. Michigan State College extension veterinarians say it pays stockmen to keep a sharp lookout for signs of prussic acid poisoning. The acid, which contains cyanide, is often present in plants damaged by winter bruising or frost. Second growth of grass, following the first frost, usually contains the poison.

If in doubt about pasture, the veterinarians suggests you remove all stock from it. Then place a few less valuable animals on the pasture to see if it contains the acid before releasing all stock to graze.

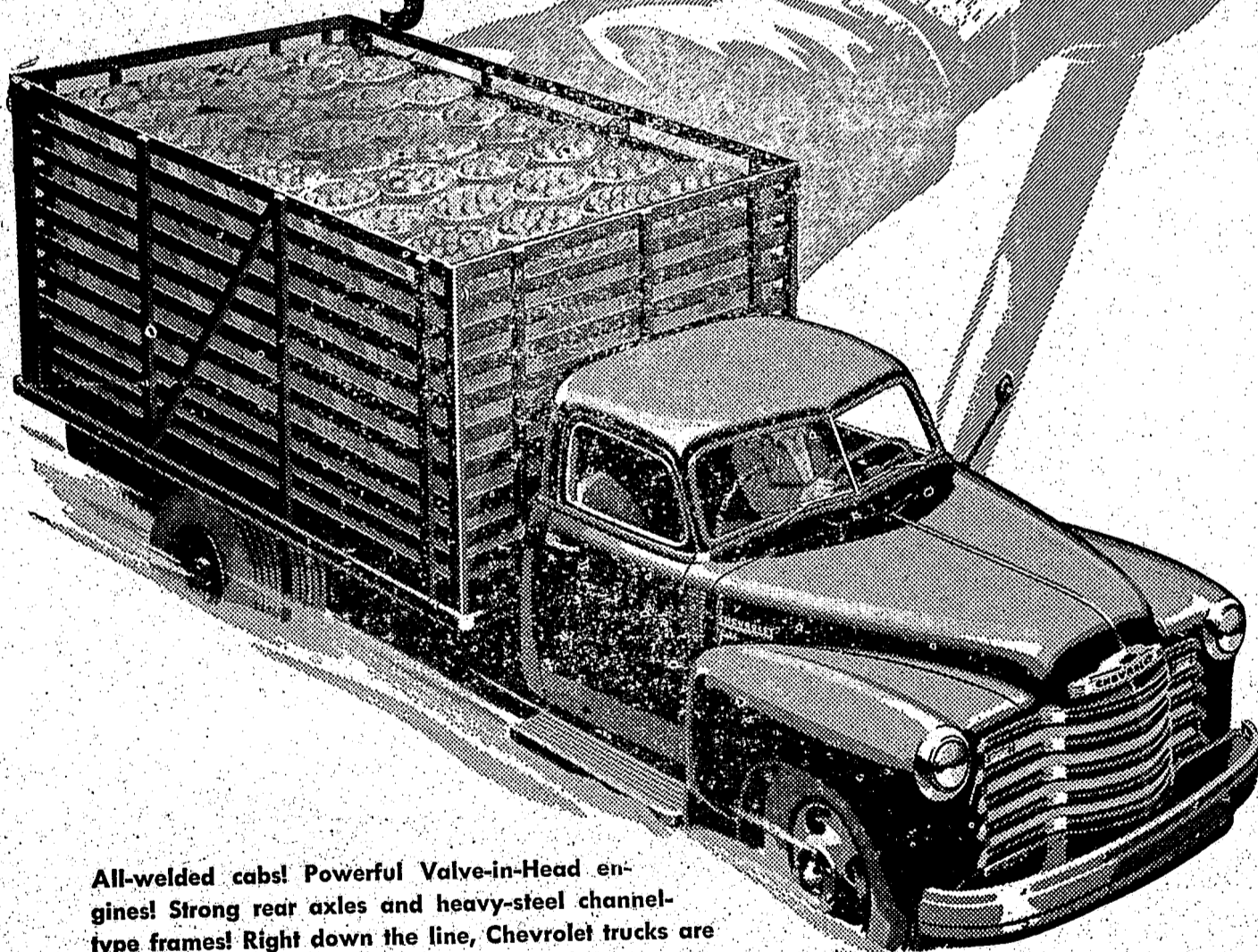

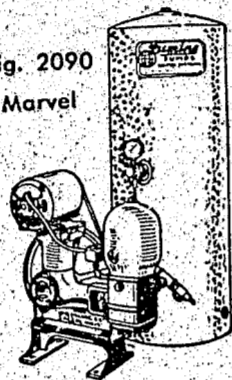

Dale Tutt of Claridge Road is spending two weeks visiting in Tennessee.

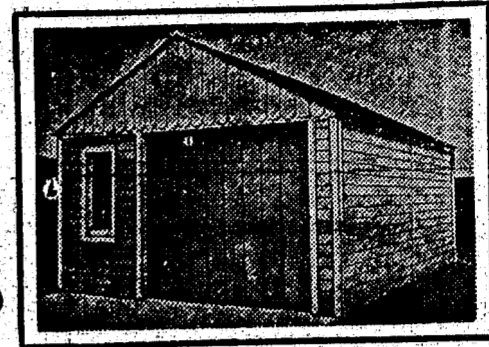
