

ANN ARBOR-This is how the new Medical Research Building at the University of Michigan will look when it is completed.



Increasing prices of rugs and carpeting are causing many homemakers to take a second look at their old rugs and question whether they might be brightened and used a little longer.

You can revive an old rug and add several years of wear to it by giving it a dye bath, advises Dorothy Washburn, Michigan State College home economist. She believes the results are well worth the effort, that the cost is very little, and that it is not a difficult project.

It takes about six packages of the kind of dye that is boiled to dye a 9 x 12 rug. It is possible to combine colors of dyes to obtain a desired color as you would combine water colors or oil paints. Follow the directions on the package of dye for preparing it, but don't dilute it. Keep it full strength.

CHRISTMAS TREE HARVEST SEASON JUST AHEAD

Although Christmas is about ! weeks away, already work is under way for this season's supply of Christmas trees, which usually amounts to a million evergreen age to 15 inclusive are eligible to trees, states C. A. Boyer, Chief of the Bureau of Plant Industry, Michigan Department of Agri-

> As a protection to land owners the 1933 Michigan Legislature passed Act. No. 124 known as the Christmas Tree Act, which governs the removal and transportation of both Christmas trees and evergreen boughs. This Act prohibits the cutting and/on removal or transportation of such stock without written consent of the owner, which means a legal bill of sale must accompany the evergreens. Such a legal bill of sale shows the number of trees or amount of boughs, the exact legal description of land where they are grown, and must be signed by the legal land owner and two witness-

The Bureau of Plant Industry is responsible for the enforcement of this Act in co-operation with servation officers, county sheriffs, and county agricultural agents. The forms for written consent can be secured from any of these sources. As the holiday season

ing from Northern Michigan, and persons transporting cut Christmas trees, evergreen boughs, etc., are required to stop at these stations and present a legal pill of sale and consent. In addition, free lance inspectors constantly visit the areas in Northern Michigan where Christmas trees are cut and check metropolitan areas where trees and boughs are being offered for sale. Thus, anyone cutting, transporting, or selling Christmas greens must be prepared at all times to show a legal bill of sale for the trees or

These requirements for the transportation of cut trees should not be confused with those for the movement of trees, shrubs or vines with roots attached. To transplant or move trees, shrubs, etc., from one property to another, one must have a certificate showing that the plants have been inspected and found to be free of dangerous insect pests and plant diseases. Arrangements for inspection may be made by writing the Bureau of Plant Industry, State Department of Agriculture at Lansing.

ACID POISONING MAY AFFECT COWS

If any of your cattle begin to stagger as if drunk, they may have been poisoned by prussic acid. Michigan State College extension veterinarians say it pays stockmen to keep a sharp lookout for signs of prussic acid noisoning.

The acid; which contains cvanide, is often present in plants damaged by wilting, bruising or frost. Second growth of grass, following the first frost, usually contains the poison.
