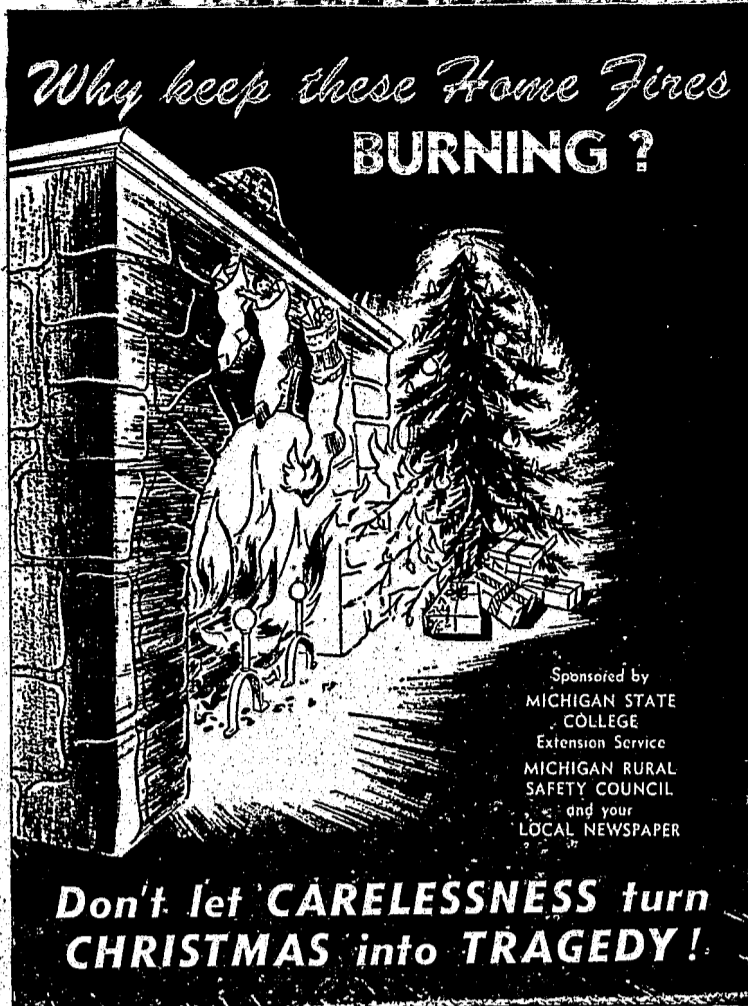

PROSPECTORS HOPE TO FIND URANIUM

As 1950 draws to a close — a year which saw some of the excitement of a junior-size gold rush attending the upper peninsula uranium strike — not a pound of the atomic mineral has been mined.

The conservation department has received a total of 15 applications to prospect for uranium ore on state land, which merited field investigation. Geological

examination has resulted in the cancellation of nine lease requests and four other prospecting sites still are to be checked in Marquette, Dickinson and Gogebic counties. Only two active leases exist, one covering the original 80-acre discovery area in Baraga county and the other for 180-acre tract in Dickinson county.

While the department geologists are just as interested in finding uranium ores in the state as anyone, they cautioned at the time of the first discovery that it only meant that an area in Baraga county had been located where further exploration for mineable quantities of the ore was warranted.

Yet with the uranium fever prevailing, the department received many letters, some with rock samples, from would-be prospectors. In spite of the worthlessness of one set of rock samples submitted, one applicant insisted the department take his \$25 application fee and check his "find" area. The answer still was the same as that sent out to many first inquirers.

TANNAH IS ADVISOR TO POINT FOUR PLAN

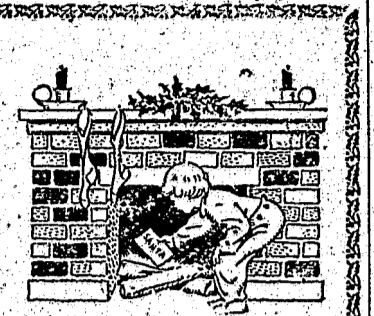

WINTER'S OFFICIAL ARRIVAL DUE EARLY ON DECEMBER 22nd

What happens in the way of weather after 5:14 a. m., Eastern Standard Time, on Friday, December 22nd can be properly charged against Winter.

What has happened thus far was only the forerunner of Winter, according to Dr. Hazel M. Losh, assistant professor of astronomy at the University of Michigan who has consulted the astronomical charts to find the exact moment when winter begins.

"During most of December, the sun will be more than 23 degrees south of the equator but on December 22nd it will reach the most southerly point in its apparent yearly journey around the earth," Dr. Losh reports.

Since it will have its shortest

daily path across the sky, the day will be only nine hours long and the night will last for 15 hours, the shortest and longest, respectively of the year, she points out. But once again, she explains that the conservation of heat by the earth and atmospheric blanket will keep the coldest weather of the season from occurring at the time of the shortest day.

"During December and especially at the Christmas season, some of the most beautiful and colorful stars in all the heavens light the eastern horizon in the evening," she reports. "There is no constellation that equals in splendor and beauty the giant Orion striding majestically across the southern sky."

This constellation precedes and announces the approaching rise of Sirius, the brightest star in the whole heavens. Other bright spots

in the east at about 7 p. m. are the Twins in Gemini, while at the same time during the Christmas season the Northern Cross can be seen standing upright in the west with the bright Deneb marking the top of the cross.

Orion can be spotted quite easily since three bright stars in a row mark the belt that holds the sword of this mighty hunter, Dr. Losh reports. Arranged like steps in the sky, these stars point directly downward toward Sirius, just appearing over the horizon by 9 p. m. and point upwards toward the orange Aldebaran in Taurus.

Two other stars in Orion command attention because of their brightness. Betelgeuse, the star that marks one shoulder of Orion, has the largest diameter of all the stars but is so distant that the light we now see left the star

around the year 1850. Brightest star in Orion is the blue-white Rigel which is so far away that its light has been on its way to the earth since 1400. If Rigel was the same distance from the earth as the Sun, it would be 18,000 times brighter.

Castor and Pollux, the two bright stars in Gemini, are northeast of Orion.

WATER IS BEST FOR TREATING CHRISTMAS TREE

Keep your Christmas tree in water to keep it fresh, green, fire-resistant, and to prevent the needles from falling, advises Worthy Grey, Michigan State College home economist.

Cut trees, like cut flowers, must have water to stay moist and fresh. Foresters advise buying a tree that has been cut as recently as possible, putting it in

water promptly, and keeping it in a cool place until put for decorating.

As soon as you bring the tree home, cut off the end of the trunk diagonally at least an inch above the original cut. Stand it in a container of water and keep the water level above the cut surface as long as the tree is in use. A crosswise brace of wood across the water container can be attractively disguised by covering with the metal foil now sold for kitchen and florists' use.

Buying freshly cut trees and then keeping them in water pays. If the tree stands and dries after cutting, it gradually loses its ability to draw up water. To tell whether the tree is fresh before buying, break off a small branch and see whether the wood under the bark is moist.

Fortunately, the water treat-

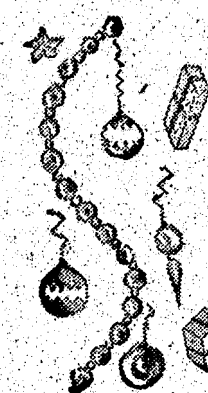

recommend several kinds of equipment to help your child enjoy his play each day. Four and five-year-olds like shovels immensely and a lady's garden shovel with a rounded digging edge and a 30-inch handle will outlast many toy shovels. They can shovel dirt or snow with it and get good exercise doing it.

Six white milk bottle made of wood and in a carrying container are sold in many toy departments and are popular with two-to five-year-olds. The two-year-old likes to carry them around and the older ones use them to make believe they are delivering milk and are milk men.

Have you seen the picture lotto games? Some are called object lotto. Familiar pictures of animals, birds and toys are used. The younger child likes to match the pictures as in a puzzle while those four and five years of age like to sit together socially and draw the pictures from a basket in order to match them with their card.

Perhaps you can surprise your child with his favorite library book for his own collection. A

good photograph record is always welcome. You will want to listen before you buy to be sure the music and voice are clear and pleasant.

VETERANS REMINDED OF HOMESTEAD TAX

Home-owning servicemen and those about to enter the Armed Forces were reminded by the Veterans of Foreign Wars that veterans-homestead tax exemptions could apply to them.

Michigan V. F. W. Commander G. Edwin Slater, of Detroit, stated that many persons being recalled to active duty are not aware of the fact that the law may be of benefit to them.

The homestead exemption provides for a tax exemption of \$2,000 of real estate owned and used as a home by members of the Armed Forces who have enter-

ed service anytime since January 1, 1940. The exemption applies during the period of service and for one year afterward. The exemption can only be granted where the value of the home is less than \$7,500.

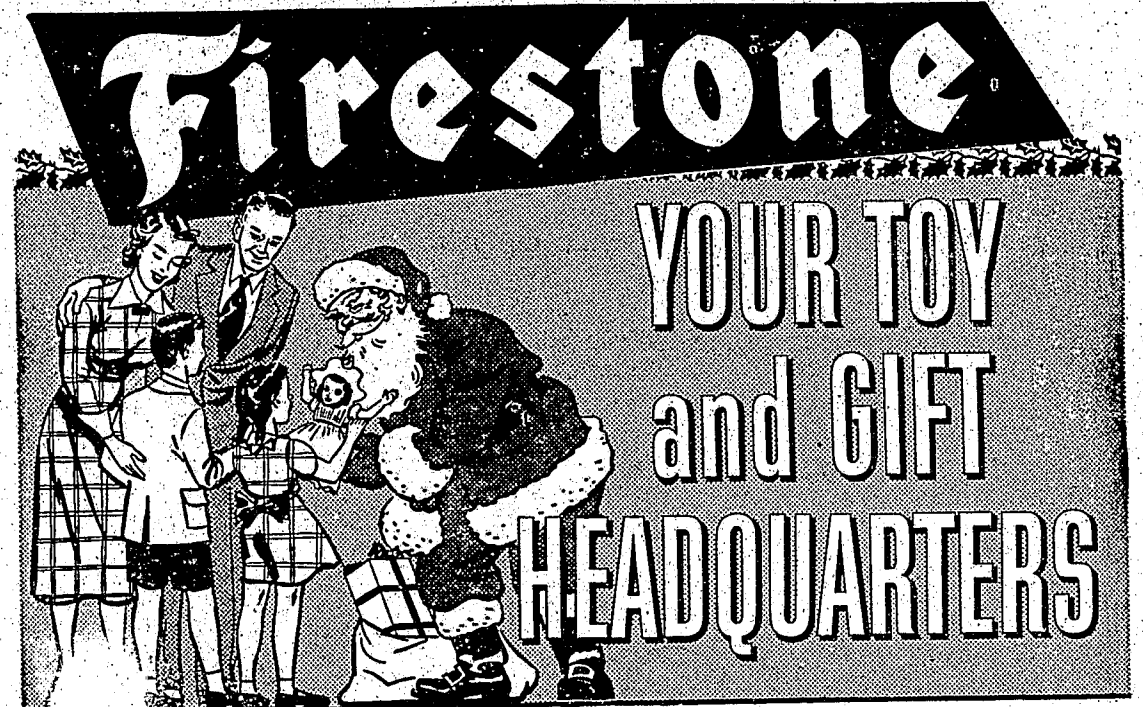

Both Shipman and Storm are World War II veterans and have been with the company about three years.



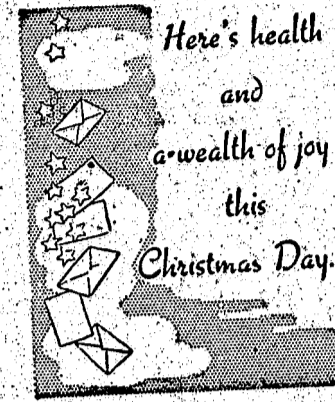
