Yellow colored oleomargarine has been legal for manufacture or sale in the State of Michigan since December 7, 1950. Apparentof yellow colored oleomargarine the legislature amended the oleolaw of Michigan, setting up cerwere permissible in Michigan.

The State law requires that when delivered to the purchaser must have printed, stamped, or stencilled thereon the word "Oleomargarine" in black ink, in ordnot less than 5-line pica (5/6 ingredients not less than pica (1/6 inch) in size in letters of the same size, color and character.

The list of ingredients must include the kind of oil or fat used, and be designated by the name of the plant or the animal from which such oil or fat is derived. It also must include the origin of Fowlerville for dinner. the color in the product by stating whether it is "coal tar color" or vegetable color," and must list the amount of preservative, salt, water, cream. milk, skim milk, or any other ingredients. This information must be printed on the label that is firmly fixed to the package or wrapper.
