Now don't forget we will be seeing you at the Home Talent Show which will be held February 21st at Clarkston High School.

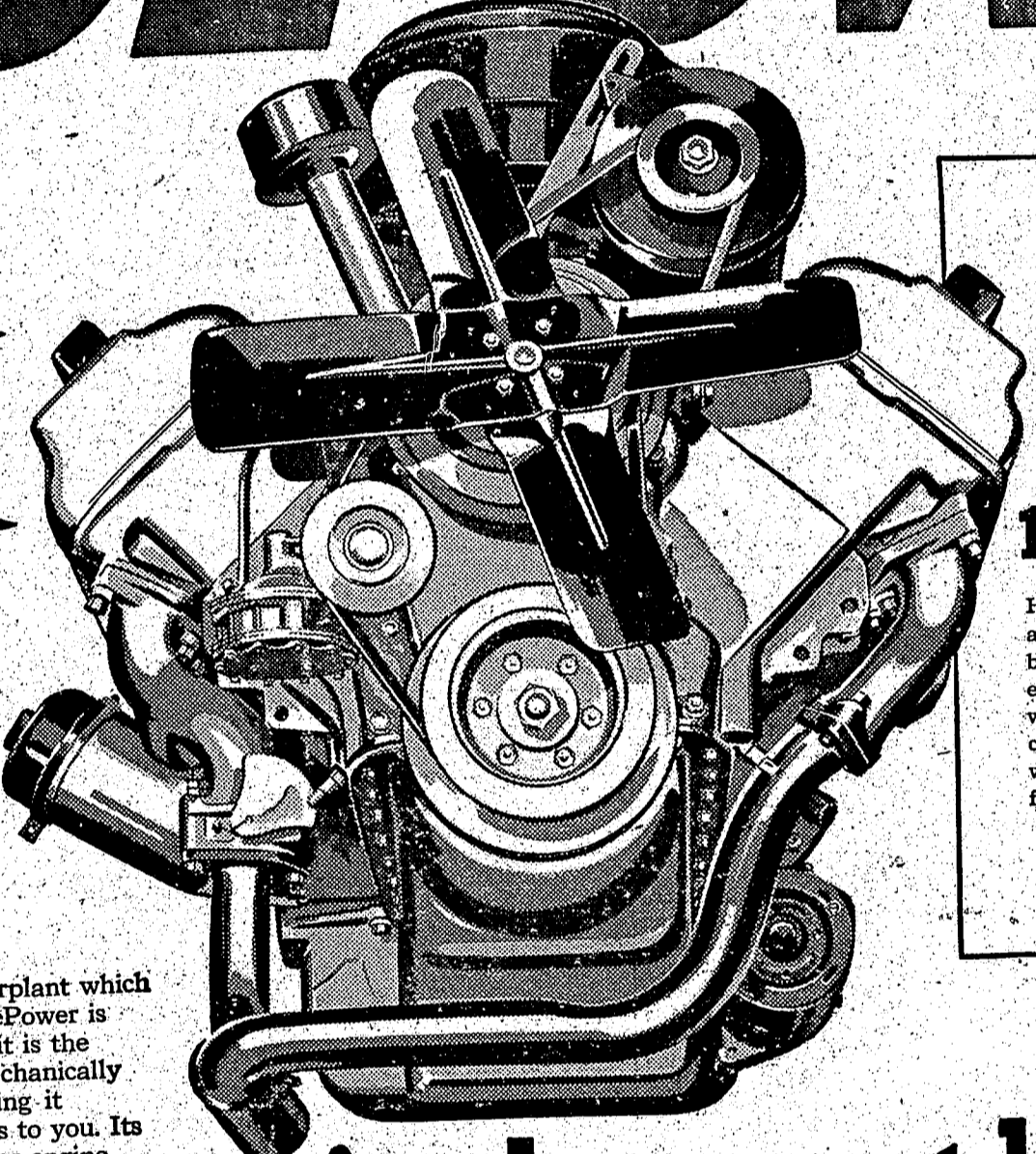

REGISTRATION OF ABSENTEE BY OATH

Part II-A, Chap. I, Sec. 16 — Any elector who is unable to make personal application for registration because of physical disability or absence from the township, city or village in which his legal residence is located, may be registered prior to the close of registration before any election or primary election by securing from the clerk of the township, city or village in which is located his legal residence. Duplicate registration cards and executing in duplicate the registration affidavit before a notary public or other officer legally authorized to administer oaths and returning such registration cards to the clerk of the township, city or village before the close of office hours on the last day of registration prior to any election or primary election. The notary public or other officer administering the oath shall sign his name on the line for the signature of the registration officer and designate his title.

Note — Sec. 151.36 provides that in townships, cities, or villages having a population of 5,000 or less the duplicate "master" registrations may be dispensed with.

All the provisions relative to registration in Townships and cities shall apply and be in force as to registration in Villages.

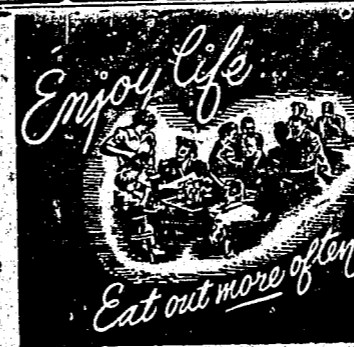
