

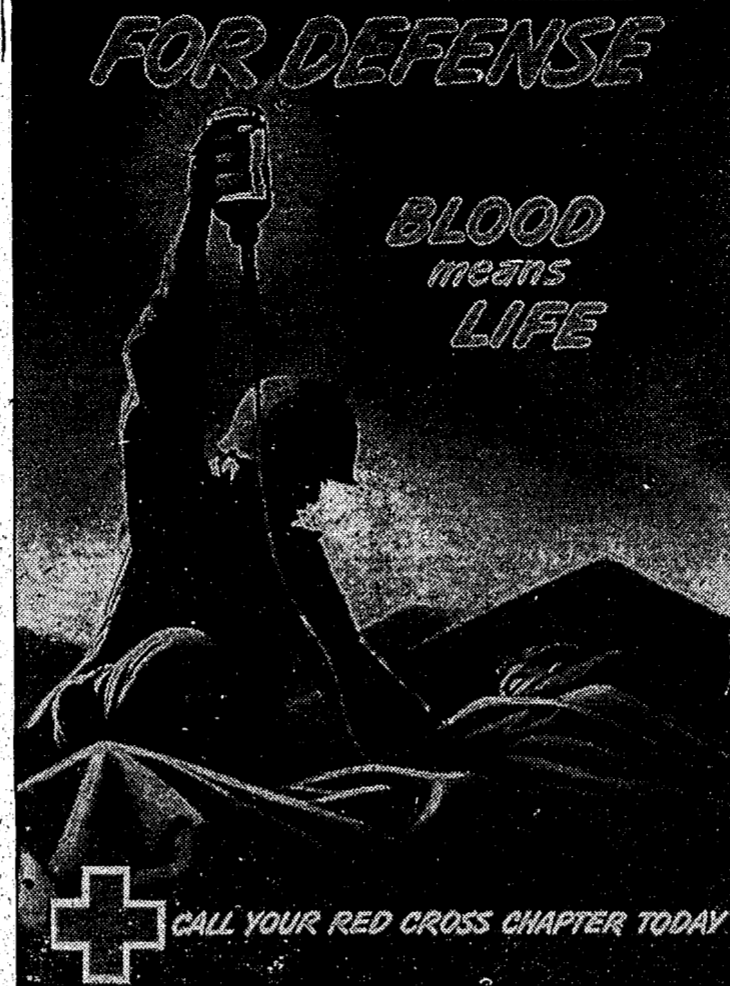

FRUITS AND GARDEN NOTES by Willard E. Bosserman Assistant County Agr'l Agent

SPRAY MEETING HELD

One hundred fruit growers were present at the spray meeting held at Farmington, Michigan, Wednesday, February 7. Karl D. Bailey, District Horticultural Agent, discussed peach spray material and the extent of fruit injury due to sub-zero weather.

C. A. Langer, horticultural specialist from Michigan State College, talked on apple spray material and the 1951 spray calendar. He cautioned against pruning grapes early. He advised waiting until later in the spring when you have more of an idea how much live wood you have. "Bleeding" does not harm the vines as used to be the assumption.

DORMANT OIL SPRAY

A recent letter from Ray Hutson, head of Entomology Department, Michigan State College, stated that dormant oil spray on injured wood may kill the tree.

NEXT PRUNING

Some more pruning will be demonstrated at the Gallagher Orchards on Silver Bell Road, Rochester at 1:30 p. m., Friday, February 23rd. Spray material will also be discussed.

ARTIFICIAL BREEDERS ANNUAL MEETINGS HELD

The three Artificial Breeders' Associations in Oakland County held their annual meetings during the past week. Some new faces appeared on each board of directors. Kenneth Rocker of Wixom being elected to the No. 1 Association, William Edgar of Clarkston was elected to the board of directors of No. 2 Association, and Howard Wilson of Rochester for

No. 3 Association. Each new director was elected for a term of three years.

Stan Culver, field representative for the State Artificial Breeders Association attended all three meetings and told the story of good herd management for better breeding efficiency. Mr. Culver pointed out that two-thirds of the farmers' troubles with breeding difficulties are of his own making and usually are not disease.

Cattle should not be bred for at least seventy-five to ninety days after calving. Four points brought out by Mr. Culver were: (1) Feed and manage your herd carefully; (2) Give the cow at least seventy-five to ninety days rest after calving; (3) Keep accurate breeding records especially the time of calving; (4) Call your local veterinarian when cattle fail to conceive after you have done the above things.

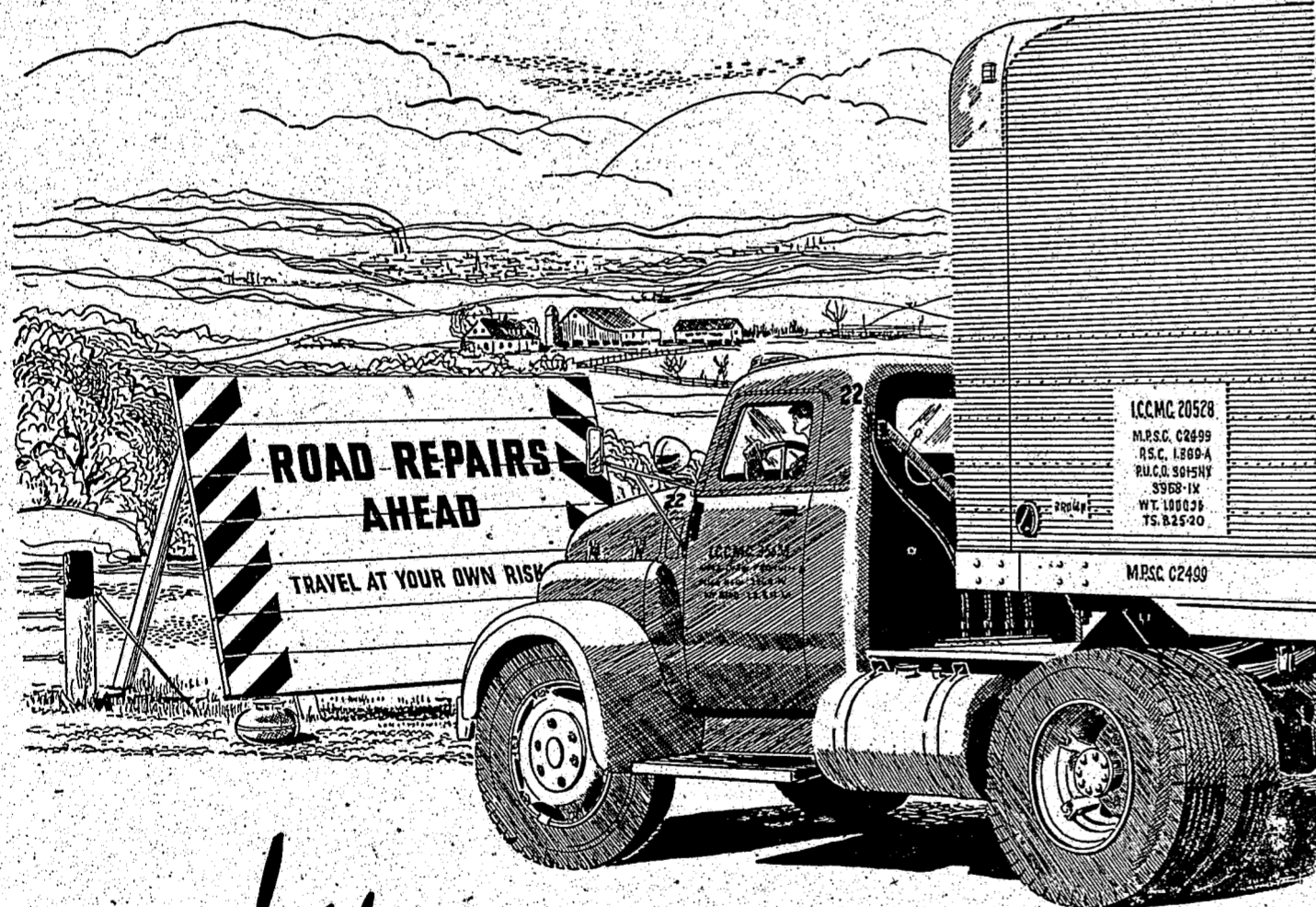

SPRAYS KILL WEEDS IN ASPARAGUS BEDS

Weeds are a problem to most vegetable growers — but the asparagus grower sometimes has more than his share. However, there appears to be hope that his weed-killing job will be easier one next year, thanks to research at the Michigan Agricultural Experiment Station.

lege, has evidence of a new treatment to control weeds in the asparagus beds.

As the asparagus cutting season draws to a close, the weeds are usually allowed to take over. This makes it difficult for the plants to fatten the roots enough for good production the following year.

Dr. Grigsby reports that a cyanamid spray appears to be an effective relief—a killer of both

broad-leaf weeds and grasses while doing the asparagus no harm.

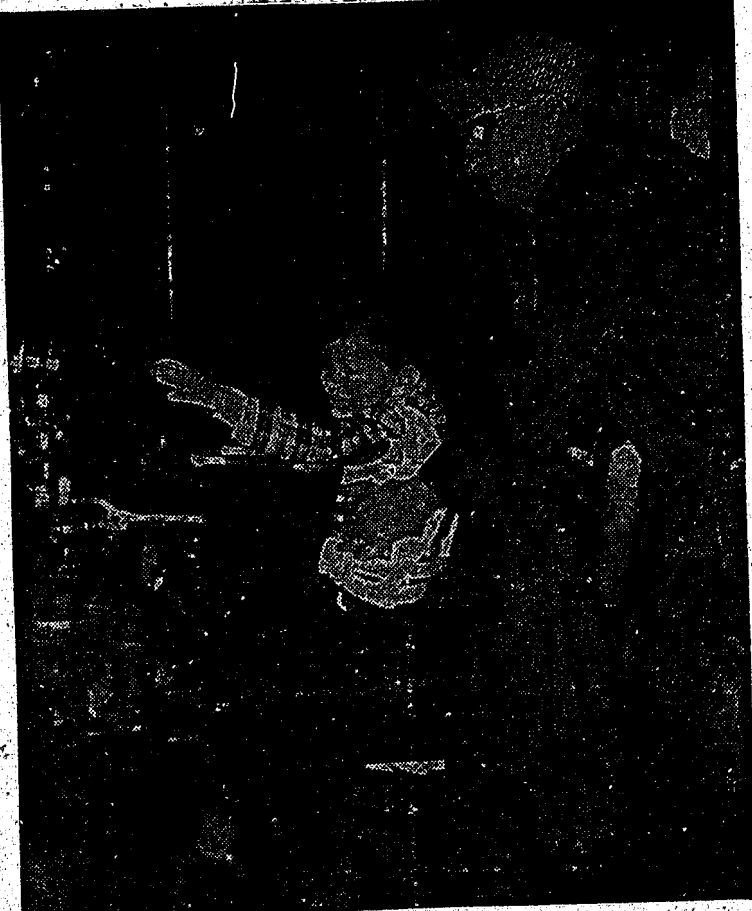
A dusting grade of this chemical used in water is an effective spray. A wetting agent is used along with it—75 pounds of cyanamid, one pound wetting agent, and 150 gallons of water. This amount covers an acre. Put on in the forenoon of a bright, warm day, "within 48 hours all weeds and annual grasses are dead."

According to Grigsby, "the numerous asparagus spears, the start of vegetative top growth, were not injured at all though many were blackened with spray deposit."

Cyanamid has been used to some extent as a dust for killing weeds but was often unsatisfactory because of difficulty of getting it on when dew was on the plant to hold it.

When this cyanamid spray is used, Grigsby says, two factors need careful attention: good agitation in the spray tank, and large enough openings in the nozzles. The asparagus growers should take the screens out of the nozzles and put a screen on the intake end of the hose.

Find Molds For Gel Cookery Dishes in Everyday Kitchen Articles



Successful gel-cookery doesn't call for an investment in elaborate molds. Appetizing dishes made with unflavored gelatine can be molded in containers found in most every kitchen. A coffee can is used to mold a main dish; mixed vegetables go back into their own can container to mold into cylindrical shape. Desserts are molded in an orange shell custard sup, or a fluted paper cup mold.

Basic Fruit Gelatine
1 envelope unflavored gelatine 1/4 cup sugar
1/2 cup cold fruit juice 1/2 teaspoon salt
1 1/2 cups hot fruit juice

Soften gelatine in cold fruit juice. Add hot fruit juice, sugar and salt; stir until dissolved. Pour into large or individual molds and chill until firm. YIELD: 4 servings.

For Tomato Aspic: Omit sugar, increase salt to 1/2 teaspoon; add 1/2 teaspoon onion juice or other seasonings, if desired.

Molded Sea Food: Make Tomato Aspic. When gelatine is slightly thickened fold in 1 cup cut shrimp, shredded crab meat or tuna.

Molded Vegetables: Make Tomato Aspic. When gelatine is slightly thickened fold in 1 1/2 cups mixed cooked vegetables and 1/4 cup diced celery or shredded cabbage.
