> A dusting grade of this chemical used in water is an effective spray. A wetting agent is used along with it-75 pounds of cyanamid, one pound wetting agent, and 150 gallons of water. This amount covers an acre. Put on in the forenoon of a bright, warm day, "within 48 hours all weeds and annual grasses are dead."

According to Grigsby, numerous asparagus spears, the start of vegetative top growth, were not injured at all though many were blackened with spray

Cyanamid has been used to some extent as a dust for killing weeds but was often unsatisfactory because of difficulty of getting it on when dew was on the plant to hold it.

When this cyanamid spray is used, Grigsby says, two factors need careful attention; good agitation in the spray tank, and large enough openings in the nozzles. The asparagus growers should take the screens out of the nozzles and put a screen on the intake



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
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

For Tomato Aspic: Omit sugar, increase salt to ¼ teaspoon; add

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1 envelope unflavored gelatine 4 cup cold fruit juice 14 cups hot fruit juice

Soften gelatine in cold fruit juice. Add hot fruit juice, sugar and salt; stir until dissolved. Pour into large or individual molds and chill until firm. YIELD: 4 servings.

For Tomato Aspic: Omit sugar, increase salt to ½ teaspoon; add ½ teaspoon onion juice or other seasonings, if desired.

Molded Sea Food: Make Tomato Aspic. When gelatine is slightly thickened fold in 1 cup cut shrimp, shredded crab meat or tuna.

Molded Vegetables: Make Tomato Aspic. When gelatine is slightly thickened fold in 1½ cups mixed cooked vegetables and ½ cup diced selery or shredded cabbage.

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

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

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
