At our party we waltzed and square danced, exchanged valentines and enjoyed refreshments.

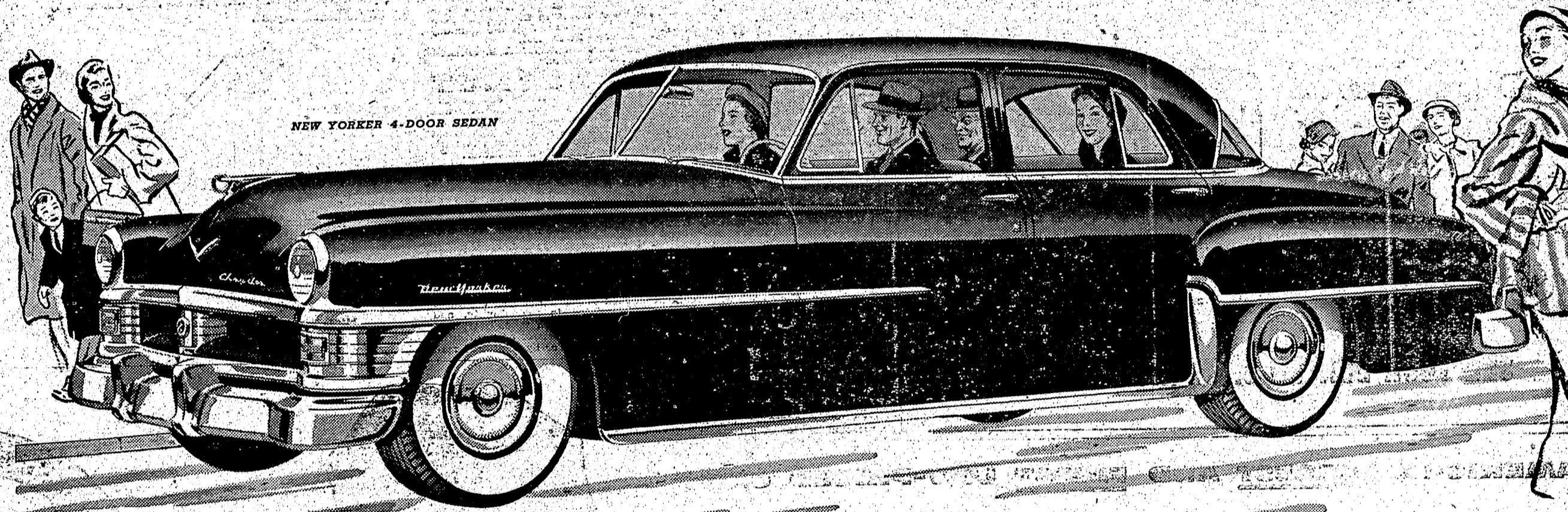

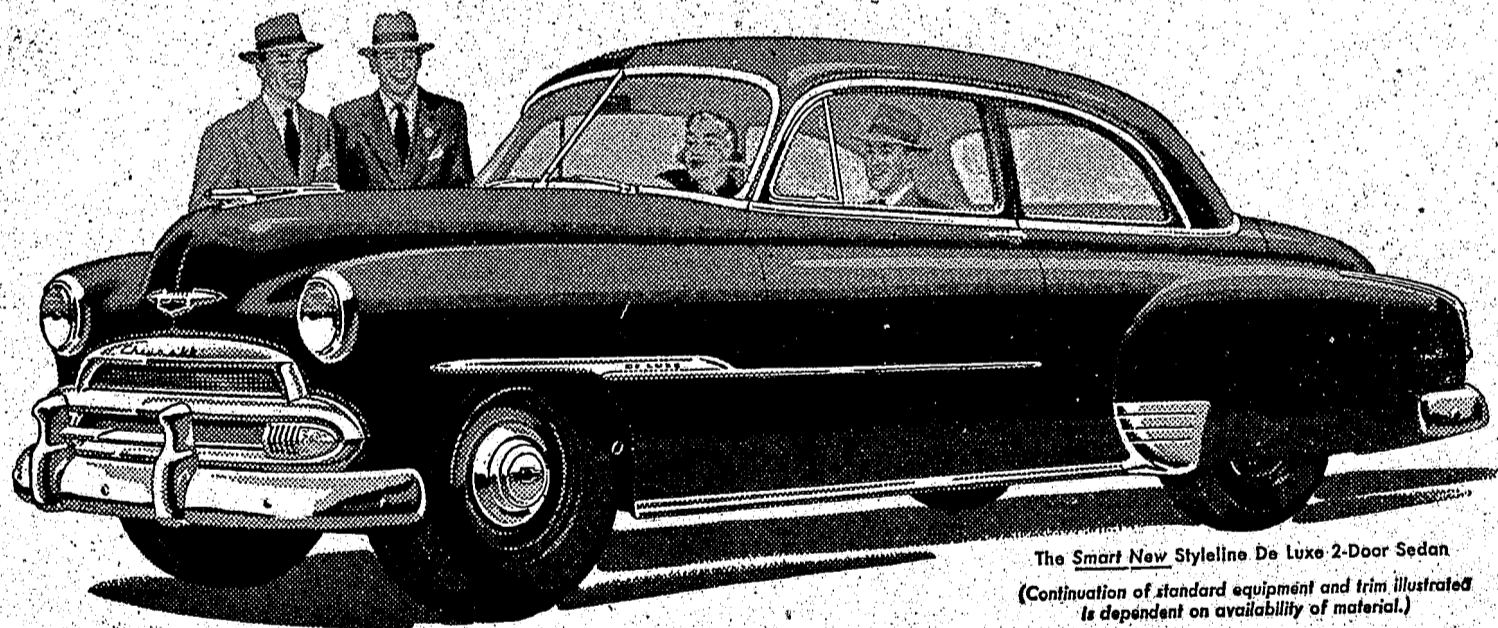

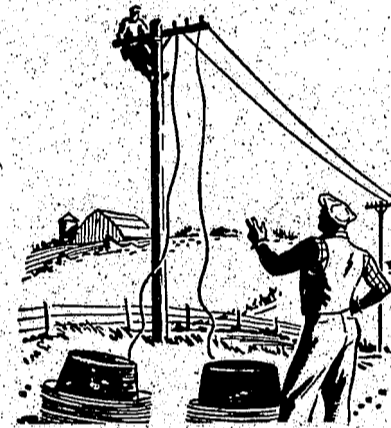
Flash pasteurization spurs Michigan apple juice industry

As a result, a million bushels of Michigan apples should be profitably converted into juice in 1951. 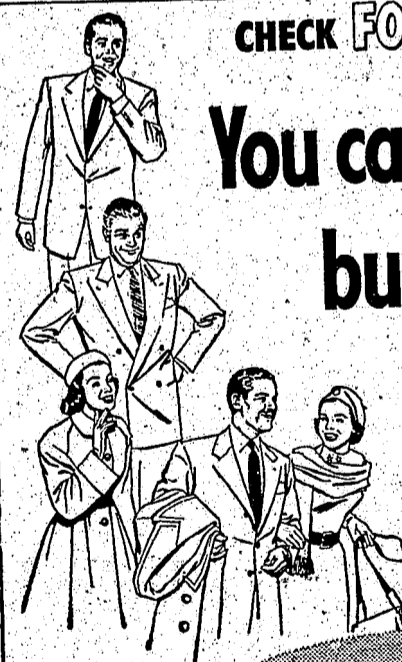

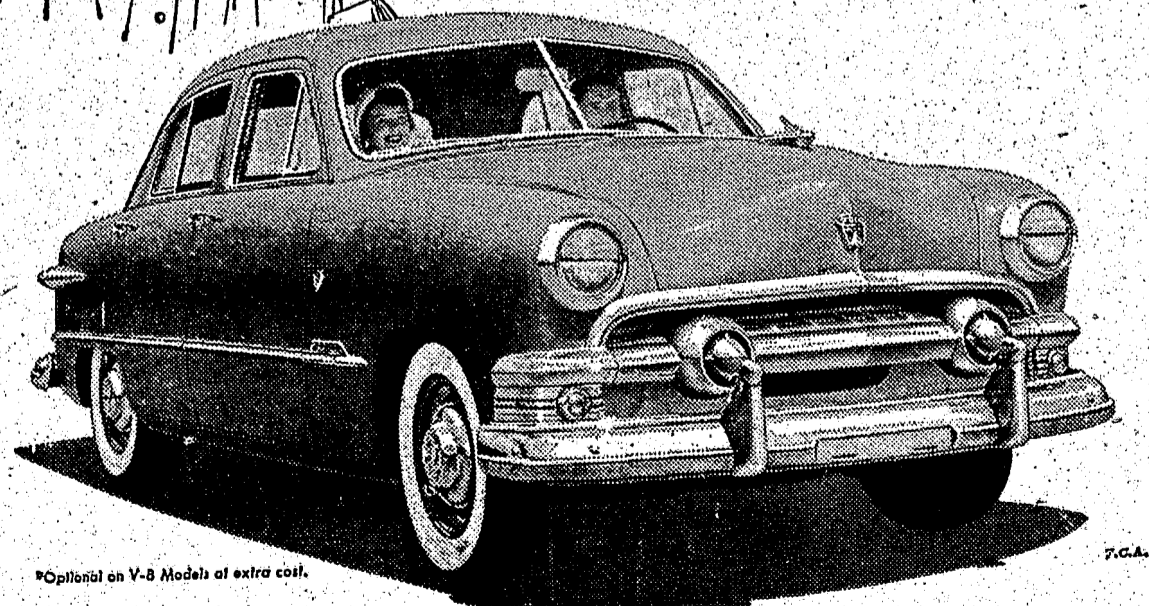
