**LADINO CLOVER GROWS IN FAVOR FOR PASTURE**

Ladino clover is a "natural" for Michigan dairy farmers because of its palatability, quick recovery after grazing, and high producing ability. This statement was made this week by M. B. Tesar, Michigan State College farm crops specialist, to a Farmers' Week audience.

He recommends the addition of one-half pound of ladino clover per acre to a mixture of alfalfa and bromegrass on fertile, moist soils. Such a mixture of alfalfa-ladino-brome is especially suited to rolling land since alfalfa will produce most on the well-drained areas and ladino will be best on the lower areas.

Ladino clover also shows its value in a ladino-brome mixture on low areas too poorly drained for alfalfa, Tesar advises. Being deep-rooted, alfalfa does not survive winter injury on wet soils, where ladino comes through better because of its shallow, fibrous root system.

"Though it has been in use in Michigan for less than ten years, ladino clover is well established as a hay, pasture, and silage legume," Tesar stated.

"Michigan farmers have stamped their approval on this clover by using it in about 100,000 acres of seedings each year," he concluded. "Its popularity will continue to increase as the years go by."

Fishing shanties should be removed from the thin ice now carpeting man southern Michigan lakes, the conservation department warns.

The department also reminds the upstate angler of his legal obligation to take his shack off the lake as soon as the crust becomes unsafe.

Shanties permitted to sink or drift ashore become hazards to trolling tackle, outboard motors and bathers. Besides they create eyesores on summer beaches.

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There's a difference between "water-proof" and "water-repellent." When buying a raincoat, Michigan State College home economists suggest you note the label. Some water-repellent coats must have the finish replaced after

the garment is dry-cleaned. "Scare" buying increases demand and brings about higher prices for food and household needs, Michigan State College home economists advise.

This picture shows the average dimension of—



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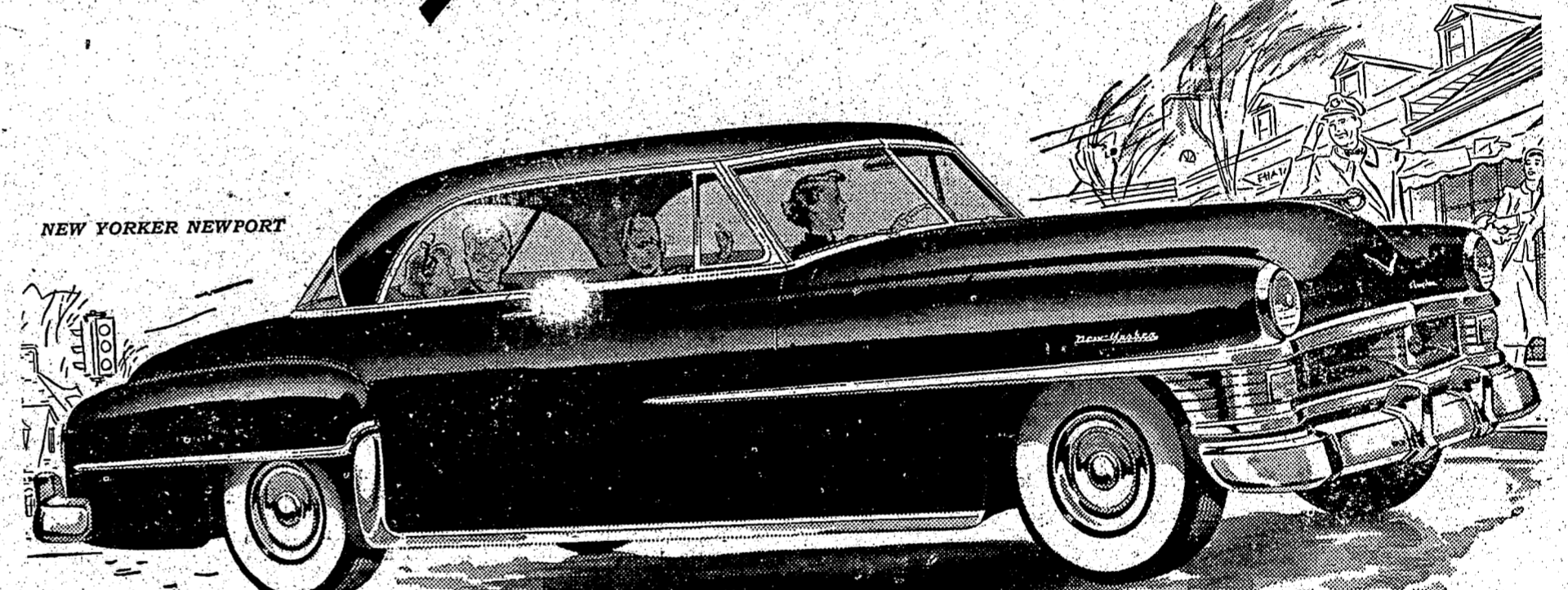
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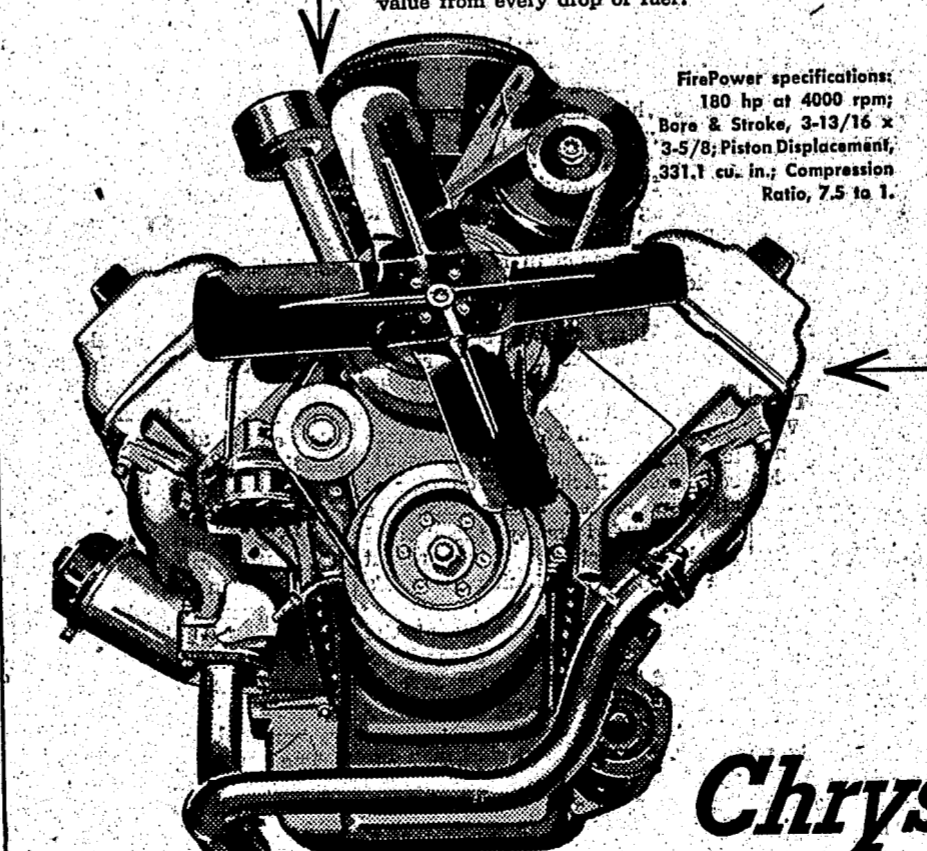

When asked if they think a new elementary school should be built in Clarkston, these teachers answered as follows:

Ruth Sharpe, elementary principal — "Yes, as more room is needed for all grades and then we would be able to have a larger curricula for our high school and elementary grades. I feel that having the elementary school separate from the high school would solve several problems that arise by all being in the same building."

Sigrid E. Clark, kindergarten — "Yes, I believe both elementary and grades would benefit by having separate schools. The way the

kindergarten classes have increased each year in the past few years more room will be a necessity, and with added rooms we could add extra activities and studies we need."

Jeanette Morse, second grade — "Yes, more things could be done for the grade children if they were in a building by themselves. Also, a more complete program for music and art could be given to the children if they had a little extra space."

Maxine Baehand, third grade — "Yes, each year the classes get larger. Much more could be accomplished if there were only one grade in a room."

Anna Gallup, fifth grade — "The elementary grades need a new school so as to enlarge the curriculum to include a definite program in art, industrial arts and music. Also, a place where the children can eat lunches and during the bad weather spend the noon hour."

Sylvia Donay, sixth grade — "Yes, not only to relieve the crowded conditions that exist, but to place elementary grades and the high school in separate buildings, which provide adequate recreational facilities suitable to the pupils age groups."

Patricia Stites, eighth grade and speech — "Yes, the crowded conditions this year plus forecasts of even greater enrollment of students at Clarkston next year make added school space a necessity. Naturally, elementary students would benefit greatly if a new school was built. High school students would also benefit since more room would then be available for their use, and it would then be possible to offer a broader high school curriculum."

Marguerite Bennett, high school mathematics — "Yes, more room is a necessity not only for the elementary grades, but also for the high school grades. With a new elementary school the high school could have more room and enlarge the curriculum."

**CHILDREN NEED VITAMIN D IN DIET**

It's been a long, cold winter and Michigan school children have received little direct sunshine to give them necessary vitamin D. Mary Lewis, Michigan State College foods and nutrition authority, thinks homemakers should be sure the children are getting adequate amounts of the "sunshine vitamin" in one way or another. Vitamin D can be furnished through a source purchased at the drug store or through the use of vitamin D enriched milk. Eating vegetables, breads, fruits, cereals, eggs, and meat will keep them well-fed, but with all these, there is not sufficient vitamin D for good health and growth.

Milk fortified with vitamin D usually costs a cent more a quart than when not, but the nutrition specialist thinks it is a wise investment. Vitamin D milk should not be confused with homogenized milk, however, for they are different.

Parents who prefer to use the drug store source of vitamin D will find it cheaper to purchase the large-sized bottles rather than the convenient capsule form. The old standby — cod liver oil — may be provided at a cost of about a cent a day for each child, the home economist reports.

Many parents keep a source of vitamin D in the Michigan child's diet the year around until he has completed growth. Nutrition authorities believe it is important, especially in winter months when there is little sunshine, to give children this vitamin.

**WATCH OUT FOR KIDS**

Use March — Watch Out For Kids Month — to look out for your own kids in your home to remove the hazards which threaten their lives every day they live, the Michigan Department of Health urged Michigan parents today.

More Michigan children die from accidents than from any disease. More Michigan children are killed in their own homes than are killed in traffic. An adult is responsible either directly or indirectly for almost every childhood accidental death, the Department said.

A child is not safe at home until his home is made safe for him. Home accidents killed 295 of the 608 Michigan children who died by accident in 1949. They injured thousands.

Home fires snuffed out the lives of 107 Michigan children; two-thirds of them under five years of age. Don't leave your small children at home alone — even "for a minute." Remove the fire hazards which you know exist in your home.

Falls in the home killed 17 children, 14 of them under five years of age. Do your stairs have gates? Are your railings strong? Are your open windows screened?

Poisons stored in the home, drunk by mistake, killed ten children, all of them under five years of age. Can your child reach your medicine cabinet or get into your cleaning fluids? Where is your can of lighter fluid?

Scalding fluids killed eight children under five years of age. Don't leave your child alone in the bath tub; he can turn on the hot water. Don't leave kettles of hot fluids unwatched. Turn pot han-

dles toward the inside of the stove. Escaping gas killed eight children. Have your gas equipment checked and teach your child never to touch the gas stove.

Firearms around the house killed six others. Have you any loaded gun?

Suffocation was blamed for the deaths of 103 children, 55 of them under a year of age, and all but two under five years of age. Does your baby have his own bed, his own covers and his own pillow?

During 1949, a total of 128 children under fifteen years were killed by automobiles as they walked, ran or played in the streets or drives. Ten others were killed as they rode their bikes. Hundreds of others were maimed or crippled for life. Teach your child why he must not play in the street, and why he should cross only at crosswalks and only with the light. Show him the safest route to school. Then use special caution when you drive in school zones. Just before or just after school, when you drive near neighborhood stores, theaters, or playgrounds. Keep an eye out for the child who may dart from between parked cars or from behind buses.

Drowning takes the lives of approximately 80 children each year. Give a little thought to water safety and swimming lessons for your children. Fence off dangerous water holes or creeks.

Most accidental deaths of children can be prevented if adults will just "Watch Out for Kids," the Department said.

Dates for Michigan's six Grass Days, sponsored by the Michigan Cooperative Extension Service, were announced this week by Richard Bell, Michigan State College farm crops extension specialist and chairman of the state committee.

Local arrangements for the events are being made by a committee of farmers, county agricultural agents and extension specialists from Michigan State College. Programs will vary slightly in the different areas. The general theme, however, will be the growing, harvesting and utilization of more adapted legumes and grasses.

Dates, counties and farm locations are as follows: Wednesday, June 13th, Calhoun county — Ralph Cook farm near Marshall; Friday, June 15th, St. Clair county — Franklin Kells farm near Avoca; Monday, June 18th, Saginaw county — Matthew Borzenick farm near Erant; Wednesday, June 20th, Montcalm county — Arthur Leitch farm near Stanton; Friday, June 22nd, Manistee county — Flora Doniz farm near Manistee; Monday, June 25th, Oscoda county — Clifford Shantz and Elsworth and Arnold Handrich farms near Fairview.

**MAKE CLOSE CHECK AT FARROWING TIME**

Watchful care at farrowing time can help cut new-born pig losses, say swine specialists at Michigan State College.

They suggest that farmers provide comfortable, clean, warm quarters for the sow and pigs. Sows should be eating regularly — if they don't, find out why, the

swine specialists advise. When the litter is born, help the pigs to suckle, especially the weaker ones. If the pigs are not suckling, or if the sow isn't providing any milk, find out the reason. Watch the sow for any signs of fever, mastitis, or discharge and withdraw the pigs for any sign of unthriftiness, scouring or evidence of disease.

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Special motor fuel, weight and mileage taxes are paid by every commercial vehicle operating on Michigan highways. The total of special taxes paid by any one vehicle varies according to the amount that unit actually uses the highways. Typical commercial hauling units pay sums ranging from \$1500 to \$2500 per year.

Last year, commercial vehicles paid \$30,000,000 to the state in such special taxes—two and one-half times the state's total bill for maintenance of trunk highways.

SEC. 16. The notary public or other officer administering the oath shall sign his name on the line for the signature of the registration officer and designate his title.

**REGISTRATION OF ELECTORS REQUIRED; REGISTRATION ON**

**ELECTION DAY, IDENTIFICATION OF ELECTOR**

SEC. 1 The inspectors of election at any election or primary election in this State, or in any District, County, Township, City or Village thereof, shall not receive the vote of any person whose name is not registered in the registration book of the precinct in which he offers to vote, but the name of a qualified elector may be registered on the day of any election or primary election up to 4 P. M. of said day. Provided, That he shall, under oath, state that he is a resident of such precinct, is at least 21 years of age and has resided in the State for at least 6 months and in the Township or City 20 days next preceding such election, designating particularly the place of his residence, and that he possesses the other qualifications of an elector under the constitution and that, owing to the sickness or bodily infirmity or himself, or of some member of his family, or owing to his absence from the Township or City on public or private business, and without intent to avoid or delay his registration, he was unable to make application for registration on final days set for such registration. Provided Further, That he or she is accompanied and identified by a registered voter known to a member of the election board. Provided Further, That the Board of Supervisors of any County may by resolution duly adopted discontinue the registration of electors on primary and election days and such registrations shall not be taken in such County thereafter on primary and election days unless and until the Board of Supervisors rescinds its action in connection therewith.

**NURSING SCHOLARSHIPS TO BE AWARDED**


Seven Student Nursing Scholarships will be awarded this year at the Osteopathic Hospital of Philadelphia, to deserving young unmarried women between the ages of 18 and 30. Students of Oakland County are eligible to apply, it is announced by Mrs. H. E. Jones, of Auxiliary to Oakland County Osteopathic Assoc., local chairman. Selection is made on the basis of aptitude test, high school record, physical examination, character and personality of the applicant. The nursing course, which starts in September, covers

three years, including ten weeks vacation period. Scholarships are awarded by the Detroit Osteopathic Women's Club and its affiliated auxiliaries. Five of the Scholarships will be awarded in Wayne County, one in Macomb, and one in Oakland County.

Mrs. Jones, of Birmingham, local chairman, said that the 3-year Scholarship includes tuition; maintenance, including room, board, laundry and indoor uniforms; laboratory fee, textbooks and other items. She added that the Nurses' Residence offers attractive living accommodations. The student is expected to provide funds for such personal needs as clothes, recreation, carfare and incidentals. Immediately upon graduation, a nurse is expected to apply for admission to the examinations given by the State Board of Examination for the Registration of Nurses of Pennsylvania. This entitles her to practice as a "Registered Nurse" and to secure reciprocity in other states which accept these credentials. There is official reciprocity with the State of Michigan.
