

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



### RED CLOVER VERSUS ALFALFA

There has been an alarming increase in the amount of red clover planted in Oakland County as compared to a decrease in acreages of alfalfa-brome in the past three or four years. Carter Harrison of Michigan State College Crops Department, says that it does not pay to seed red clover where alfalfa will grow, Reasons for this are that red clover is a blennial crop, dying out after the second year, while alfalfa is perennial, lasting long numbers of years. Even with alfalfa near \$50.00 per bushel and red clover near \$18.00 per bushel, it is still a profitable proposition, due to better yields and longer life, to

plant alfalfa seed. What's the trouble? When talking with farmers about this problem I find their answer to be, "I have too many seeding failures with alfalfa." This need not be. Alfalfa is adapted to most soils in Oakland County. We find by analyzing the soil that either lime r phosphate is usually low on

Reverend Lester of the church out on Hillsboro Road coaches his: Young Peoples' Choir late Thursday afternoons after high school basketball practice lets out.


Buzz Ellis pastures cows next to that church. Around 5 o'clock they used to make a lot of racket about wanting to go home. That made it kind of rough on the choir.



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
