

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



In the library, many desks, shelves of books and files are provided for members of the editorial department, enabling them to obtain latest available information about people, places and events. Also included is a reference department where books, clippings from various publications, photographs, zinc etchings and pamphlets are kept, A conspicuous feature of the library is a series of stained glass windows portraying the arts and sciences. Visiting the composing room they saw type set-up and made up into pages. The stereo-typing department, where printing plates for the rotary presses are produced, are among the most highly mechanized divisions of the newspaper plant. Typesetting machines and devices for casting type, rules and borders, prepare copy for printing. Instead the assembled pages are duplicated by the stereotyping process. Under great pressure papiermache impressions of the type pages are produced and these serve as molds from which are cast, by machinery, the semicylindrical metal printing plates which are attached to the rollers of the presses. Long rows of rollers can be seen througout the press room. Papers are completely printed, cut, folded, counted, and delivered to the bundlers. The printing units are actually capable of printing two colors in addition to the black without reduction in capacity. A separate four-color press is employed to print the comic sections of the Sunday edition. Most numerous among Times distributors are the carriers. Trucks rush the various editions of the newspaper to news stands in Detroit and suburbs, and to supply stations where newsboys get their papers for home delivery. It might seem that the short ribs would be the better buy, considering only the price per pound. But check the amount of actual meat or the number of serving portions that come from each type of meat on the pound basis, she suggests.

Short ribs are almost 50 percent waste in the bone that is purchased, so that only two or

possibly three servings come from each pound of short ribs. On the other hand, the ground beef is all meat as it is purchased — there is no waste in the form of bone or excess fat so that you can count

The National Nutrition Council ecommends that a well-balanced day's meals include one fourounce portion of a protein food in the form of meat, fish, poultry or their equivalent in the form of eggs and cheese.

In planning to meet these requirements for a family of four, it would be necessary to purchase a pound of ground beef - but two pounds of the short ribs to furnish an equal amount of meat.

Miss Morr points out that the one pound of short ribs at 49 cents a pound would be the more expensive purchase, for it will take two pounds or 98 cents worth of the short ribs to give the same amount of meat that is purchased in the one pound of ground beef at 69 cents a pound.

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

Holland park leads with 99,500 visitors, Grand Haven is second with 83,600 and Dodge number four is third with 62,500. The Dodge park total is nearly treble that of last year at this time.

Other leading parks are Muskegon with 37,800, Bay City with 35,500 and Island Lake with 33,300. The Island Lake attendance is more than triple that of last year but the Muskegon and Bay City totals are respective decreases of 18,000 and 17,000. Muskegon and Bay City parks are further north than the others menioned.
