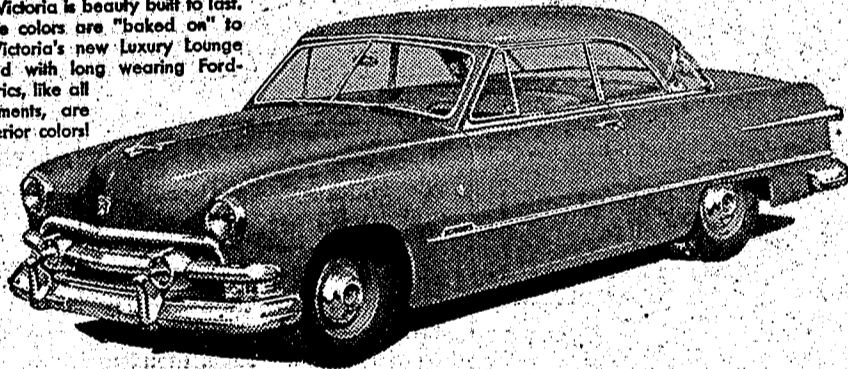

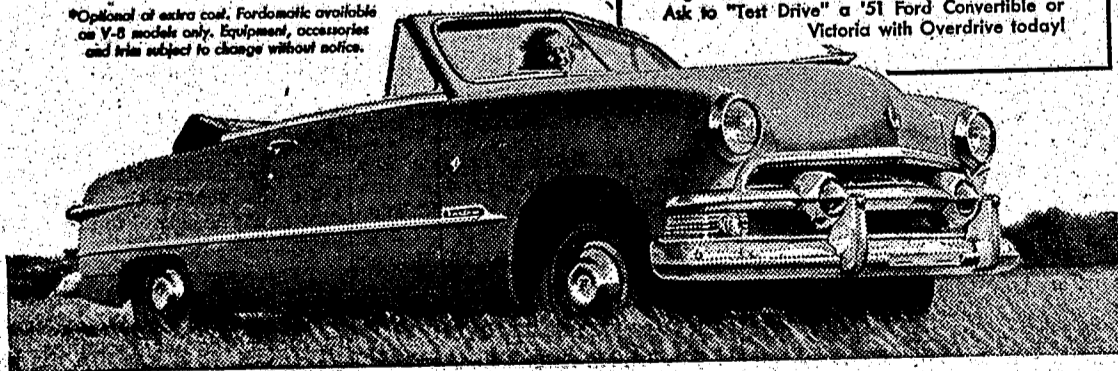

We are sorry to have Chuckle Wasson leave us. He is moving to Florida.

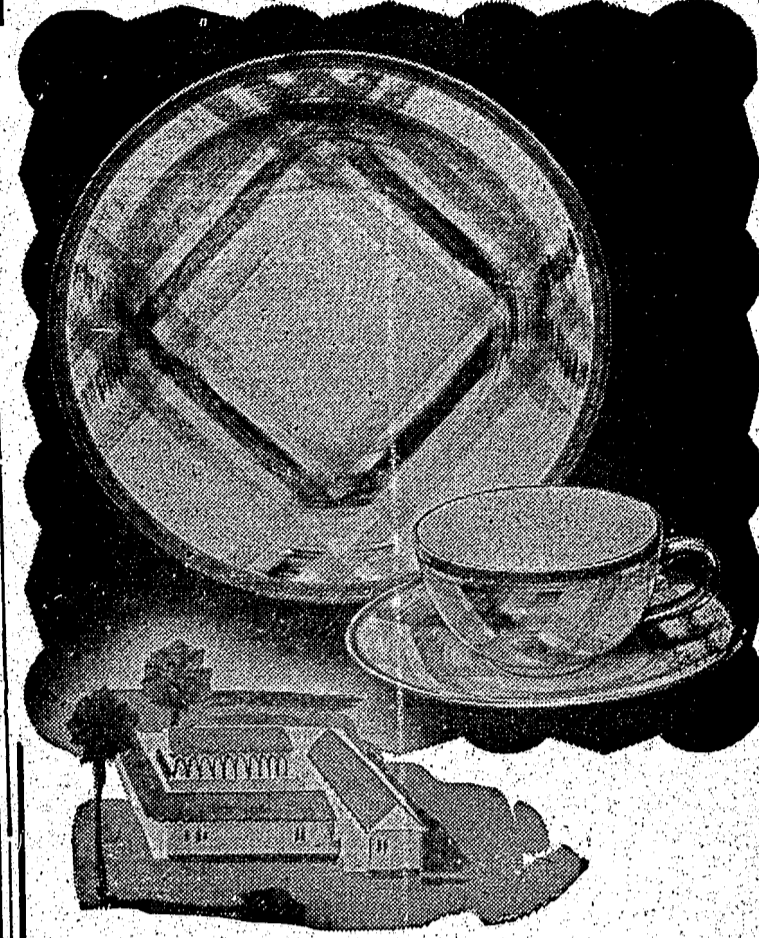

Moved by Megee, "That the following ordinance No. 46 be adopted: AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND SUBSECTION (4) OF SUBDIVISION 3 OF SECTION 4 OF ORDINANCE NO. 34 ENTITLED:

An ordinance regulating and restricting the height and size of buildings, the size of yards, courts, and other open spaces; the density

of population; the location and use of buildings and land for trade, industry, residence and other purposes; creating districts for said purposes and establishing the boundaries thereof; providing for changes in regulations, restrictions and boundaries of such districts; defining certain terms used therein; providing for enforcement; establishing a board of appeals; and imposing penalties for the violation of this ordinance and to provide for a building zone map.

THE VILLAGE OF CLARKSTON ORDINANCES: Section 1. That Subsection (4) of Ordinance No. 34, as above entitled, be amended to read as follows:

(4) YARD SIDE. There shall be a side yard on each side of the lot of not less than six (6) feet in width on all lots. On lots more than fifty (50) feet in width, the side yard on each side of the lot shall be increased three (3) inches for each foot over fifty (50) feet of lot width. Provided, that the requirement for side yards shall not be more than ten (10) feet on each side of a lot under the last mentioned proviso.

Section 2. All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict with any of the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

Section 3. That not less than fifteen days notice of the time and place of a public hearing of this amendment shall be given in the Clarkston News a newspaper of general circulation, published in the village of Clarkston that such public hearing is hereby fixed at the Village Hall in the Village of Clarkston at 7:30 P. Section 4. This ordinance shall take immediate effect from and after the date of its passage by the Village Council of the Village of Clarkston.

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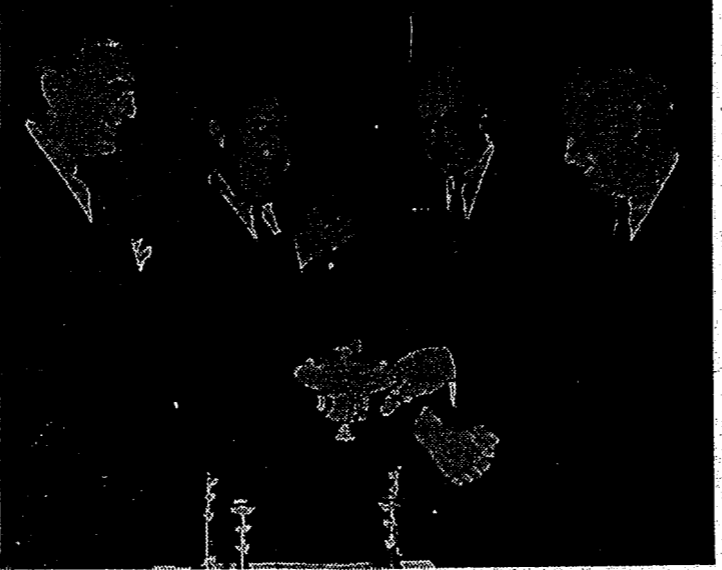

 New President of The Mother Church for the coming year, it was announced, is Mrs. Lora G. Rathvon of Boston.  Key officials delivered progress reports on world-wide activities of the Christian Science church. The crowds attending the meeting overflowed the main edifice of The Mother Church, which seats nearly 5,000, to a smaller auditorium and also a nearby theater building.
