held at the Waterford Community Church on July 21st. The husbands are invited. Mrs. Henry Mehler and Mrs. Berg are arranging the program.

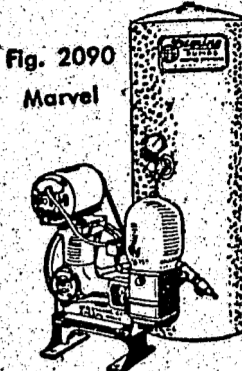
